

SETS HANNA RIGHT

Hanna Shows Morgan Error in Canal Matter.

M'KINLEY ALSO INVOLVED

Alabaman Says He Favored Nicaragua Route.

OHIOAN WAS TOLD DIFFERENT

President Urged a Careful Investigation After He Learned the Panama Property Was Available.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—The Panama canal question was again the leading topic under discussion by the Senate, and Mr. Hanna was again the speaker of the day. He continued his review of the history of the efforts to secure an isthmian canal, and declared that to the President's ambition to secure the credit of an unique administration must be credited the favoritism manifested by him toward the Panama route. He asserted that President McKinley had favored the Nicaragua line, and this statement was challenged by Mr. Hanna, who said he knew, of his own personal knowledge, that Mr. McKinley had urged the most careful investigation, after he had learned that the Panama canal was available.

The question of committee assignments was again postponed, as was also the motion to reconsider the vote on the Newlands joint resolution concerning the annexation of Cuba.

Governor Morrison, of Idaho, was among the visitors on the floor of the Senate today.

Invitation From Louisiana.

Immediately after the Senate convened today, President Pro Tem. Frye presented an invitation from the Governor of Louisiana inviting the Senate to attend the ceremonies incident to the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the transfer of Louisiana territory to the United States. He also referred to a question raised yesterday as to whether concurrent resolutions of Congress require the approval of the President in order to render them operative. He said he had never been the practice to send such resolutions to the President, but he read the provision of the Constitution bearing on the subject, which makes no distinction between concurrent resolutions and joint resolutions, and remarked he did not know how Congress had been able to escape from the Constitutional requirements.

The suggestion from the chair led to a discussion of the point by Spooner, Teller, Hale, Platt (Conn.) and Tillman. Without disposing of the matter, the Senate passed to routine business, after which Mr. Hanna resumed his review of the investigation of the Postoffice Department was laid before the Senate, and on motion of Penrose was referred to the committee on postoffices and postroads.

Morgan Continues Speech on Canal.

Morgan was then recognized to continue his speech on the Panama canal question. As on yesterday, he sharply criticized the course of the Administration, and of others who oppose the Nicaragua route. As to Panama, the Senator said, an elaborate treaty had been prepared, a commission sent here, and then sent back again, to create a government with power to ratify a treaty. He charged that the treaty with Colombia had been drawn largely by a corporation lawyer. Speaking of the report of the isthmian canal commission, favorable to the Panama route, Mr. Morgan characterized that report as "the dynamite that has rent in twain the Republic of Colombia."

He said further that the report was a desperate adventure. He declared if Mr. McKinley had lived the protocol with Nicaragua and "the Rice" would have been observed. "But he is dead," the Senator went on, "and a new Richmond comes upon the field, and he seems not to feel the obligation of good faith when a sure victory is within his grasp."

Hanna Challenges the Statement.

Mr. Hanna challenged the statement of Mr. Morgan that President McKinley had been favorable to the Nicaragua route. "I know, of my own personal knowledge," he said, "that when, in 1899, it became known that the Panama Company's property could be purchased, he gave the question serious consideration and investigation, and at his instance provision was made in the river and harbor bill for an appropriation of \$100,000 for the investigation of all routes. That this request was made because of his interest in the Panama proposition, I know of my own personal knowledge. President McKinley had decided to follow the recommendation of his commission, and that is what the present executive is doing; so there has been no change of policy."

Mr. Morgan replied he had spoken only from the public record of President McKinley, and not from knowledge of his private views. "I know," he said, "that he entered into compact with Nicaragua and Costa Rica to secure the Nicaragua route, and there is no record to show that he changed his mind."

House Adjourns Until Friday.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—When the House convened today, Payne (N. Y.) moved that when an adjournment is taken it be until Friday. After some debate, during which De Armond (Dem. Mo.) said the House had transacted the business for which it had been called in extraordinary session, the motion for adjournment until Friday prevailed.

The Speaker then read an invitation from the Governor of Louisiana to the members of the House to be present at the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the transfer of the tract purchased by the United States from France. Meyer (Dem. La.) asked unanimous consent for the consideration of a resolution accept-

ing the invitation, but objection was made. The House then adjourned until Friday.

WILL FIGHT WOOD IN SENATE.

Opponents of His Promotion Expect Committee to Report Favorably.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Two sessions were held today by the subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Military Affairs, which is investigating the charges against General Leonard Wood, nominated by the President to be Major-General. An adjournment was taken until 11 o'clock Friday, when Major Runcie will be the first witness.

It was stated at the close of the last session that probably more than two weeks would be occupied in hearing the witnesses the committee already has determined to summon. Then, as is generally believed, a committee is named to go to Cuba, an adjournment probably will be taken until some time next March, which is considered the best time to visit the island.

Opponents of the confirmation of General Wood openly express the opinion that the military affairs committee will report the nomination favorably to the Senate, but declare that when this course is taken some charges will be presented to the Senate which the committee has excluded from the testimony.

From the attitude of Senators opposed to the confirmation of General Wood, it is certain that a demand will be made for the appointment of a subcommittee to go to Cuba to inquire personally into several of the charges.

Major Rathbone today reiterated his determination to go to Cuba at the same time for the purpose of pointing out sources of information which form the basis of many of his charges.

The subcommittee consists of Senators Proctor, Quarles and Pettus. Major Estes G. Rathbone resumed his testimony in explanation of his personal charges. He also asked the committee to subpoena Major E. J. Ladd, United States Army, and interrogate him concerning the expedition of General Wood's Santiago accounts in 1898, when he was acting as Auditor of Cuba.

Major James L. Runcie arrived in Washington today from Havana and will appear before the committee Friday. He visited the Capitol and talked with several members of the committee.

Brigadier-General Bliss, of the general staff, was heard by the subcommittee for an hour and will again be called. He was asked for certain information he is said to possess concerning the charges made by Major Rathbone that General Wood accompanied E. G. Bellairs, from Havana, to New York in 1900, with some knowledge that Bellairs was an ex-convict. General Bliss has been Chief Collector of Customs for Cuba with headquarters at Havana during that time, and he will be asked also in regard to the charges that presents for General and Mrs. Wood were admitted to Cuba without payment of duty.

WANTS NAMES IN LAND FRAUDS

Stevens Offers Resolution Calling for Full Information.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Representative Stevens, of Texas, today offered a resolution directing the Secretary of the Interior to report to the House the result of the investigation into the land-fraud cases. The resolution recites that it is currently reported that the United States has been defrauded of vast tracts of public lands by means of fraudulent entries under the stone, desert, timber and homestead acts, and that public officials have entered into unlawful arrangements to obtain possession of the public lands. The resolution, reciting the fact that the existence of land frauds is officially admitted, calls for specific details, including names, dates and places.

Cuban Matter to Be Reinvestigated.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—The treaty between the United States and Cuba for the adjustment of title to the ownership of the island of Pinar has been returned to the Senate committee on foreign relations for an inquiry concerning the interests of American citizens before action is taken. The treaty was reported favorably by the committee yesterday, and in executive session today Senator Bacon called it for ratification.

By the terms of the treaty the United States relinquishes its claim to Cuba all claims to title to the island and receives in consideration grants of coal and naval stations in Cuba.

Rathbone Demands Investigation.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—E. G. Rathbone, who was convicted in Cuba on charges involving his administration of postal affairs in Cuba during American occupation of the island, today sent a letter to Senator H. Platt, chairman of the committee on relations with foreign countries, demanding an investigation of his administration.

Senate Confirms Nominations.

JEERS WILL CAUSE FIGHT.

Utah Troops Told to Take No Insults at Strike Scene.

SALT LAKE, Nov. 24.—A special train of seven cars left this city shortly before 7 o'clock tonight, bearing the state troops which have been ordered into Carbon County, the scene of the disturbances between the striking coal miners and the Utah Fuel Company. En route the train will take aboard the local guardsmen at Bountiful and Provo. Altogether, the soldiers number about 400, and are prepared to stay in the disturbed district an indefinite length of time. Two galling guns are included in the equipment taken from this city. The train is expected to reach the scene of the trouble about daybreak. Upon arrival, camps will be established immediately. Brigadier-General Cannon will probably establish his headquarters at Scofield, the two mines near that town. Winter Quarters and Clear Creek being the special objects of protection by the state troops.

Before leaving this city General Cannon addressed the guardsmen, giving a general outline of the manner in which they should conduct themselves while on duty. "We are not to be led by the nose," he said, "and we don't propose to stand for anything of that kind. You are expected to be firm in purpose and quick in action in quelling any disorders or violations of the law. Soldiers on their beats are to submit to no insults or intimidation. We propose to see that this uniform is respected, and any soldier who allows it to be insulted is unfit for duty."

Concerning the strike situation and the necessity for calling out troops, Governor Wells said today:

"The calling out of the militia was a step I was extremely loath to take, and only decided to do so after full investigation. A large number of miners are perfectly satisfied with their wages and their hours, but the strikers, led by so-called organizers, won't let them alone, but are threatening them with bodily harm if they continue to work. I have been informed of instances of personal violence and threats to kill and burn persons and property. We were foremost to legalize the eight-hour day in Utah, and instead of being applauded and assisted and respected for it, these agitators are seeking to

INFERNAL MACHINES IN MINES

Colorado Troops Discover Plot to Wreck Five Plants.

DENVER, Nov. 24.—A special to the Rocky Mountain News from Cripple Creek says the Coroner's inquest in the case of the two men killed by the explosion in the Vindicator mine was begun today. The evidence produced demonstrated conclusively that the explosion was the result of a plot to blow up the mine, but nothing of a definite character developed to indicate the guilty persons. At 5:30 o'clock the inquest was adjourned until 2 o'clock Friday afternoon. This afternoon Adjutant-General Bell stated that a large amount of evidence had been secured for the trial of the men suspected of the outrage. The General also stated that infernal machines ready to be exploded had been found in two other mines, and that there was positive evidence that the plot included five mines in all.

Colorado Troops Arrive.

TELLURIDE, Colo., Nov. 24.—Six companies of infantry and two troops of cavalry of the United States army arrived here about 9:00 men, under command of Major Zeph T. Hill, reached Telluride this afternoon. The train, in four sections, was run very slowly, great precautions being taken to prevent any disaster. Miners will now attempt to reopen their mines and mills with nonunion men.

Vigilance Committee Is Formed.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 24.—A special to the Post from Cripple Creek says that in consequence of the recent attempt to wreck a train, the Vindicator mine explosion and threats against nonunion miners, a vigilance committee, to be known as the committee of 40, is being organized for the purpose of seeing that no one is guilty of violations of law and order.

Colorado Situation Unchanged.

DENVER, Nov. 24.—The coal strike situation in Colorado shows little change. Governor Peabody denies the rumor that the operators have asked for troops. The hearing of the suit brought by the officers of the Miners' Union at Trinidad against the Vindicator Company began today, and is expected to last a week.

CUBANS TAKING TO IT.

Annexation Agitation Gives Cause for Serious Alarm.

HAVANA, Nov. 24.—The question of annexation is again being agitated throughout the island, and the bill recently introduced in the United States Senate by Senator Newlands, of Nevada, is being discussed at length in the clubs and hotel corridors. That the matter is causing grave concern to the operators of the island is evident in their activity to pacify the malcontents.

The extent of the feeling was shown to President Palma today at a conference in executive chambers between himself and General Enrique Collazo. The latter represented the Cuban Veterans' Association, and he demanded the President's denial of the fastidious. It is charged that certain Cuban officials have not been sincere in endeavoring to hasten the matter, and there is a disposition to fear the treaty will be defeated. This being so, it is not surprising that a secret petition has been in circulation for several days, favoring annexation, has received numerous signatures, and among them are some of the names of the best citizens of the island.

If the United States Government would signify an intention to take care of the present Cuban National Guard by finding it a place in the ranks of the regular army, and would also guarantee the war claims, the annexation project would be favored by more than two-thirds of the residents of Cuba. In fact, many of the leaders of the younger element are now discussing the advisability of entering the United States service in the ranks of the Philippine constabulary, while still others have offered their services to the new Republic of Panama.

In a prominent hotel in Havana tonight one of the advocates of annexation declared it was bound to come in a short time, and that recognizing the truth of this fact, President Palma would be selected as the first United States Senator from the "State of Cuba," while his associate would be Senator Montoro. While this is the view of an extremist, there is little doubt that, if annexation ever becomes an accomplished fact, the two men named will be sent to Washington in a legislative capacity.

Will Be Urged for Archbishop.

ROME, Nov. 24.—The report that the congregation of the propaganda has decided to propose to the Pope the appointment of Bishop Messmer, of Green Bay, Wis., as Archbishop of Milwaukee, Wis., in succession to the late Archbishop Katterer, is confirmed.

REBEL FORCES TRIUMPH

PRINCIPAL OF SANTO DOMINGO AGREES TO SURRENDER.

Articles of Capitulation Are Being Drawn Up, and the Change Will Occur Today.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—In a cablegram received here today from Minister Powell, dated Santo Domingo, November 23, he announced that the president of Santo Domingo has agreed to surrender the city to the revolutionaries. The articles of capitulation are being drawn up. The surrender, the cablegram said, will occur tomorrow.

Insurgents Make Own Terms.

SANTO DOMINGO, Monday, Nov. 23.—President Wos y Gil requested the Ministers of the United States, Belgium, Hayti and Spain to intervene in behalf of the government. The insurgents refused to accept the terms offered and demanded the immediate capitulation of the city.

United States Minister Powell informed the revolutionary chiefs that periodical revolutions ought to cease, because they interrupted commercial relations with other countries and augmented the debt of Santo Domingo, which was without means to pay foreign credits. The Minister said further that these periodical revolutions endangered the peace of the Government and of the governments of

other nations, and the present revolution, if continued, would imperil the sovereignty of Santo Domingo. Last night passed quietly.

PRINCESS WHO ELOPED.

She Has Ardent Temperament and Her Husband Is Cold-Blooded.

BERLIN, Nov. 24.—It now appears that the Princess Alice, wife of Prince Victor Frederick Ernst, of Schoenburg-Wallenburg, left her home at Gaueritz three months ago, taking her son, 13 months old. Her former coachman, Emilio Materni, also disappeared some time ago. The Princess supposedly is in Italy. The Princess' sister, the Princess Elvira of Bourbon, eldest daughter of Don Carlos, the Spanish pretender, eloped with an Italian painter, Folchi, several years ago, and lives with him at Milan. Prince and Princess Victor Frederick Ernst had lived apart for some time. The Prince had also broken off relations with his father, and is now hunting in Styria. Princess Alice is described as being small and pretty, with bewitching eyes and of an extremely ardent temperament. The coachman, Emilio Materni, is reported to be unusually handsome. He was married to a German girl, but the Princess' liking for him was well known at Gaueritz, where he occupied a position of confidence.

Prince Frederick, of Schoenburg-Wallenburg, is described as an unsympathetic soldier. Princess Beatrice, another daughter of Prince Albert, married Prince Massimet di Roviano and 18 months ago jumped into the river on account of jealousy, but was rescued and celebrated her

reconciliation with her husband in a theatrical manner.

CITY TO FIGHT LIGHT TRUST.

Chicago Proposes to Put in an Electric Plant at Once.

CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—Mayor Harrison today declared that the city would enter the electric lighting field at once in competition with the gas trust and the Chicago Edison and its subsidiary companies. The Mayor believes he has found a solution for the problem of regulating and reducing the prices of light to the householders of Chicago. The attempt to enter the field by selling to corporations and private individuals current made in the municipal plant will, it is expected, result in an appeal to the courts by the big lighting corporations. This, Mayor Harrison declares, is what the city would invite, as it will determine its right to deal in public necessities.

Earthquake Shocks in Salt Lake.

SALT LAKE, Nov. 24.—Two distinct shocks of earthquake were felt in this city early this morning. No serious damage was done.
