

NOT ALL HIS SAY

Ware Unsatisfactory in Pension Office.

AT OUTS WITH SUPERIORS

Construed Indian War Law to Suit Himself.

SADLY LACKING IN JUDGMENT

He is Universally Unpopular With Senators and Representatives, and is Receiving Unlimited Scorn and Ridicule.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 26.—The announcement that Pension Commissioner Ware intends to resign next year, "because he is tired of his job," is somewhat misleading. The forthcoming retirement is not entirely voluntary. Mr. Ware, during his year and a half in office, has brought down upon his head wholesale condemnation and unlimited ridicule and scorn. He is universally unpopular with Senators and Representatives; he is a mystery to pension attorneys; he is a source of constant annoyance to his superiors in the Interior Department, and of late has become a laughing stock because of his ridiculous administration of his office.

Commissioner Ware is a man of lofty ideals, a man of honest purpose, but a man utterly lacking in discretion and good judgment. Not long ago he undertook, before the public, to determine the constitutionality of a certain pension law passed by the last Congress. He refused to grant pensions authorized by that act, because he held the law to be unconstitutional. His rulings on Indian War pension cases—many of the cases arising in Oregon—have been in direct violation with explicit instructions issued to him by the Secretary of the Interior, who placed a liberal construction on the Indian War Veterans act, and instructed Commissioner Ware that that act was intended to pension all men who actually served 90 days in the early Indian wars. Ware has utterly disregarded the instructions of his superior, and continues to administer this act to meet his own personal views.

What he has done with regard to Indian War Veterans he has done in other instances, and in this way has made himself particularly obnoxious to his superiors. In this respect Ware is uncontrollable. He overestimates the importance of his position, and has no regard whatever for the orders of officers who outrank him. He has become a considerable burden to the Administration, and his retirement will take place with the distinct understanding that the Administration wants some other man for his office.

Of late the press generally has been making light of Ware's method, and has been holding him up to public gaze as the Don Quixote of the Administration. This is the true reason why Mr. Ware is to return to his law practice in Kansas.

ARGUMENT FOR STATEHOOD.

Governor of New Mexico Shows Territory is Rapidly Advancing.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—The annual report of Governor Otero of New Mexico makes a plea for the admission of the territory to statehood. The report says that during the past year the building of railroads continued with unabated vigor, and capital made extensive investments. The finances of the territory are in excellent condition, and so are those of the counties and cities, with a few exceptions, caused by loose methods, and the result of which methods the counties are making every effort to correct.

The territory, as well as most of the counties, is reducing its indebtedness, while several counties are refunding their indebtedness at a reduced rate of interest. The assessed valuation of New Mexico shows an increase of about \$1,000,000 over that of the preceding year, but as the assessed valuation is only about 20 per cent of the real value, the actual increase of taxable valuation, owing to the elimination of double assessments reported in former years, is almost \$3,000,000. The collections for the past six months by the territory exceeded that of the same period of previous years by about \$400,000.

CARTER A FREE MAN TOMORROW

Noted ex-Army Captain, Who Was Convicted of Embezzlement.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Nov. 26.—Oberlin M. Carter, ex-captain of Engineers, United States Army, who has served three years and seven months of a five years' sentence in the Federal prison at Leavenworth, was passed out of the gate of the prison today morning as a free man. He intends going directly to Chicago.

Carter positively declines to be interviewed by newspapermen, his attorney, H. G. Stone, of Chicago, warning him to say nothing whatever.

ACCIDENT TO CONGRESSMAN.

Richardson Loses His Footing While Alighting From Car.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Representative James D. Richardson of Tennessee lost his footing while alighting from a hotel car today and was thrown head-first to the ground. His right hip was sprained, and he was severely shaken up. Mr. Richardson was resting easily at his home tonight, where it was said the extent of the injury could not be told.

Mineowner in Jail for Deal.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26.—Frank D. Quayle, a mine owner of Douglas, Ariz., and Sonora, Mexico, who arrived in New York several days ago, was taken to the Ludlow-street jail last night on an order of arrest by Judge Dickey. Quayle is held on the complaint of the Cochise & Sonora Mining Company, which charges that Quayle agreed to sell to that company several mines that he received \$2500 on account and then arranged to transfer the mines to another corporation.

DETIMENT TO INDIANS.

Right to Sell or Lease Lands Not the Success Expected.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 26.—The poor Puyallup Indians, living on the outskirts of the City of Tacoma, seem unable after years of association with the white neighbors, to look after their property, now that title vests in themselves. Up to March 3 of the present year, these Indians were under control of the Puyallup Commission, and could not sell or lease their lands except by authority of that commission. Since that time, however, the Indians have enjoyed the same right to dispose of their land as is enjoyed by any citizen of the State of Washington. And the old story is apparently repeated.

In a report to the Indian Office, Puyallup Commissioner Snowden last June stated that the removal of the restrictive clause upon the sale of the Puyallup lands under the laws above cited has been a detriment to the Indians, and will result disastrously to them. As was to be expected, the more worthless of the Indians were ready to sell their land for less than it is worth as soon as permitted to do so. Some of them did this promptly. One family, for instance, sold 40 acres for \$300 that was easily worth \$2000. Two others traded their half-interest in a 40-acre tract worth at least \$100 per acre for a saloon, ran the saloon one night, were arrested by the police at midnight, and next day what was left of their stock of liquors was seized by the Sheriff. There is no law to prevent an Indian or a white man from throwing his property away if he desires to do so.

Several things have occurred which embarrass the Indians in the sale and lease of their lands, preventing them from getting full value, and sometimes from making any sales or leases. Titles to their lands are clouded, and the groundwork for much litigation is being laid. Such things give designing people increased means of taking advantage of them.

The case of the Puyallup Indians illustrates the fact that it is bad policy to remove the restrictive clause from the sale of Indian lands and permit allottees and owners to sell them without any Government supervision. These Indians are disposing of their lands for an inadequate consideration, and are being defrauded and swindled. I am of the opinion that Indians in all cases should be aided and protected by the Government in making land sales.

Life Insurance Company Gives Up.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 26.—The suit filed recently by a New York insurance company to cancel a life policy amounting to \$50,000, held by James L. Blair, formerly chief counselor of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Company, has been withdrawn.

It was alleged that Mr. Blair had made two attempts to end his life. Mr. Blair is still ill at a local hospital.

Offer China Troops.

LONDON, Nov. 26.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph cables that the Viceroy and Governors of 12 provinces outside of Chi Li have offered the Chinese throne 50,000 foreign drilled troops to fight Russia for Manchuria.

Woman Trainwrecker Sentenced.

STAUNTON, Va., Nov. 26.—Mrs. Ellen

Brady was found guilty today of planning the wreck on the Norfolk & Western Railroad at Greenville, last December, and her punishment fixed at ten years in the penitentiary. Her son, James Brady, and Joseph Kennedy have been convicted of wrecking the train. Brady was condemned to serve 18 years, while the jury in the case of Kennedy brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree.

Daring Mariner Again Sails.

GIBRALTAR, Nov. 26.—The Columbia II, a sailing vessel 19 feet long and 6 feet beam, in which Captain Ludwig Elsen-

baum left Boston on August 11, alone for Marselles, sailed from Gibraltar this afternoon for its destination.

Tattooed His Eye.

Philadelphia North American. A unique surgical operation was performed today by an oculist on William Summers, of Gretna, Wyo. The picture of an eye was tattooed in different colored India inks on Summers' right eyeball. This was done to make it match its mate in color. For a good many years the eye has been white, and Summers wants to surprise his family when he visits them

in the South next week by having perfectly matched eyes. When Summers was a youth he was poisoned by poison-oak. When a finger was swollen with the poison, he rubbed his eyes with his knuckles, and the poison was communicated to the eye. It became colorless at once and the sight was lost.
