

WILL LOSE RANK

Hundreds of Officers
Wait on Congress.

ADJOURNMENT IS DESIRED

If There Is None, Recess
Nominations Expire.

WOOD'S FRIENDS ARE ACTIVE

Administration Will Probably Suggest
That Session End Since Die
Neither Branch Anxious
to Take Initiative.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Unless there is an agreement by both Houses of Congress to adjourn the present session before noon Monday, when the regular session begins, all nominations must fall, and if the present special session ends by limitation, thus preventing the President from sending recess appointments to the Senate, all pending recess appointments must terminate with the convening of Congress in its regular session. These considerations today furnished the incentive for a number of conferences looking to an agreement to adjourn on Monday, or even tomorrow.

Friends of General Wood are vitally interested, and will try to bring about adjournment by current action. Failure of such action would mean General Wood's reversion to the rank of Brigadier-General, and have similar effect on the appointments of 167 army officers advanced by reason of General Wood's promotion, all of whom have assumed the rank and pay of their new appointments in the same manner as though their nominations had been confirmed by the Senate. The situation has also been canvassed at the War Department, and much alarm is felt over the disturbance that will occur regarding officers who were promoted in recess and whose rank depends on the promotion of General Wood and other officers. In view of this situation, it is possible that the administration will suggest sine die adjournment.

Stand of the House.
One reason given by the leaders of the House for not passing a resolution of adjournment was that it would be a discourtesy to the President to adjourn a called session without completing the work for which it is called. Members of the Senate say they were ready to adjourn 10 days ago, and a resolution of adjournment would probably have been sent to the House, if it had not been reported, and not denied, that the House would not give consideration to a resolution of adjournment. The situation is said to be without precedent in the Senate.

It has been argued in the Senate that if the nomination of General Wood failed of confirmation, through the failure of the Senate committee on military affairs to complete its hearing of charges against confirmation, or for other cause, nomination would be again sent to the Senate for action at the regular session. This programme was suggested on the theory that nominations and recess appointments have the same effect. An examination of the rules, however, discloses that a nomination does not carry authority for the President to clothe the nominee with the rank and pay of the office to which he is appointed. In the case of a recess appointment, the appointee is given the rank and pay of the position for which he is named, but under the constitution, the commission continues to the end of the next session of the Senate. The last paragraph of section two, article two, of the Constitution of the United States follows:

"The President shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur during the recess of the Senate by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of the next session."

Argument of Senators.
It is argued by Senators who have given serious thought to the questions involved that, inasmuch as "the Congress shall assemble at least once in every year and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day," (Article I, last paragraph of Section 4) a recess must occur between the termination of the present extra session and the beginning of the next session in order to relieve the embarrassment resultant on failure to confirm the army nominations referred to. The merging of the special session into the regular session would leave only an infinitesimal recess and not sufficient, it is feared, for recess appointments to be made.

Both the Senate and the House will be in session tomorrow, but from present appearances neither body cares to take the initiative and the outcome is uncertain.

The Senate committee on military affairs will convene Monday at 11 o'clock to resume its hearing on the Wood case. If the hearing should continue until one minute after 12 o'clock, the committee would be in the unique position of investigating a matter which was not pending before the Senate.

Senate Handles Routine Work.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The Senate was in session today only 15 minutes. The business transacted was purely of a routine character.

Adjourned until tomorrow.

New House Members Sworn In.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The House was in session today for five minutes today. Hunter (Ky.) and Nevin (O.) were sworn in as members.

CANNON SHOWS HIM TO DOOR

Labor Leader Insulting In Demand for Recognition of Livernash.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Speaker Cannon, resenting what he deemed an insult from John Herman J. Schulte, chairman of the National executive committee of the Knights of Labor, summarily ordered Mr. Schulte from the Speaker's room at the Capitol today, with the parting injunction to the labor leader never to darken his door again. Mr. Schulte made his first call upon

the Speaker several days ago with the demand that Representative Livernash, of San Francisco, be made chairman of the committee on labor, and that Representative Wynn, of the same city, be made a member of that committee. As both these men are members of the minority, Mr. Cannon explained to Mr. Schulte that their assignments would depend on the recommendation of Representative William Hanna, the minority floor leader, but it would be impossible to make Mr. Livernash chairman of the committee, as the chairmanships would go to the majority. When Schulte appeared before the Speaker today he announced in what was taken by the officials to be an offensive manner that the labor committee had been "packed." He renewed his demand that Mr. Livernash be assigned to this committee, announcing that he had defeated Mr. Cannon for election to the Fifty-second Congress, and that unless his request in this instance was acceded to he was going into the Speaker's district in the next campaign.

Schulte did not have time to finish telling the Speaker what he would do to him, as Mr. Cannon at this point gave his peremptory order for the man's election from the room, stating as he did so that there was no chance of the committee's "being packed" by Schulte. Just as Schulte went out Sidney Heber, the fire marshal for the District of Columbia, entered, bearing a miniature brass cannon. As he placed the cannon on the Speaker's desk he remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, it sometimes takes a little cannon to protect a big cannon."

Representative Livernash tonight denied that Mr. Schulte had ordered him from his seat. He said he had no knowledge whatever of the incident, nor of Schulte, not being acquainted with the latter, so far as he could recall.

CALLED IN THE WOOD CASE.
Assistant General Manager of Associated Press to Testify.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The first witness to be heard on Monday by the Senate military affairs committee, which is investigating the nomination of General Leonard Wood to be a Major-General, will be Colonel Charles S. Diehl, assistant general manager of the Associated Press. Major Runcie will be here Monday. He will be examined concerning the contradiction of some of his testimony by Ray Stannard Baker, the magazine writer. The committee has under consideration the question of summoning witnesses to testify as to the condition of General Wood's Santiago accounts for 1898. For this purpose it is likely that General Tasker H. Bliss, of the general staff of the Army, will be called, and that subpoenas will be issued also for N. Nathan, W. H. Lancashire and Lieutenant Brooke, all of whom are said to have had a hand in auditing the accounts.

It is more witnesses will declare that when the accounts were first audited they were found to be in a condition which was afterward excused by the War Department as justifiable, because they were made at a time during war, when everything was in a state of chaos. It is said Senator Hanna will contend that the reading of General Wood's accounts furnished a precedent for the reading of Major Runcie's accounts to the Senate, that the latter was prepared under identical conditions.

Another witness who probably will be subpoenaed for early next week is M. C. Posner, the postoffice inspector, who investigates the charges of postal frauds in Cuba and who is said to have written to J. L. Bristow, Fourth Assistant Postmaster-General, making arrangements for the translation of Bristow's report on Cuban postal conditions. It is declared the request for the translation came from Carlos E. Ortiz, who presided in the postal cases. It is the purpose of opponents of General Wood to show he had a hand in bringing about the translation, and that he used his influence with Judge Ortiz.

CONTRACTOR DEFENDS WOOD.

Denies He Was Given Paving Work at an Exorbitant Figure.

HAYANA, Dec. 4.—The Cuban newspapers are devoting much space in reporting the hearing before the United States committee on military affairs at Washington of the charges made against General Leonard Wood, ex-Military Governor of Cuba, for alleged favoritism while acting in the latter capacity.

In a long interview published in an evening paper today, B. L. Gallagher, managing the Cuban interests of the contracting firm of J. Condit Smith, refutes the allegation made against General Wood that he granted a contract to Mr. Smith in connection with the repavement of Havana street. According to the charges, General Wood was charged with granting a contract to Mr. Smith for the work at an exorbitant figure. Mr. Gallagher states the engineer of the department was paying about \$2 per cubic meter for North River trap, delivered here, when a company composed of several North American trust companies and other New York capitalists received a contract for \$2.50 for Cuban stone of a superior grade.

According to Mr. Gallagher there had been a low bid received by an outside firm, but this was rejected because the samples submitted were poorly crushed.

Insular Cases Are Considered.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The United States Supreme Court heard arguments today in the case of Isabella Gonzales, the Porto Rican woman whose lawsuit at New York was refused by the Immigration officials. The case of Czarkow, McDougal & Co., was submitted without argument, and the case of F. Warner, Barnes & Co., with a brief statement of fact. The two last cases relate to the collection of duty on goods shipped into the United States from Porto Rico and the Philippines, and constitutes an effort to reopen the insular tariff question.

Another Crank Sent to Asylum.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—Kalman Foldesey, who was arrested here during President Roosevelt's visit last week for writing threatening letters, was committed today to the State Hospital for the insane.
