PINE HONEY FROM LOWER COLUMBIA.—A large lot of honey strained into fruit jars, some of it so thick that it was crushed, arrived here on a boat from the lower Columbia yesterday. A dealer who was examining it pronounced it genuine honey, made from wild flowers, and of a richer and better flavor than most of the honey made in cultivated sections in the Willamette Valley. It is very much superior to the honey imported in crates, which looks so nice and clear, but much of which is made by bees fed on sugar and glucose, and which, consequently, has not the flavor of honey made from wild flowers. In the cultivated sections the bees find many weeds, which give the honey an unpleasant taste. In the Tillamook region, along the Coast range, from whence used to be derived the main but supply of Portland, much honey was and is made, and all old residents remember the good quality of Tillamook butter and Tillamook honey. There is still much butter and honey made in that region along the foothills and along the lower Columbia as well. In fact, butter and honey have always seemed to have an affinity for each other, and are inclined to get on the same slice of bread ever since the Holy Land and the Promised Land were described as flowing with milk and honey.

DOG ATTACKS FOUL-MOUTHED BIRD.—There is a parrot kept by a resident at the corner of Eleventh and Market streets, which, from the language it uses, has evidently at some time been exposed to the evil communications which corrupt good manners. Its impolite language got it into trouble Sunday, and caused the loss of much of its plumage. The vile language used by the bird was addressed to a dog passing the house with his master. Whether the parrot had any prejudice against dogs in general, or this one in particular, it is not known, but its perch on the porch it hurled an epithet in the dog's direction. This the dog resented by bounding up the steps, snatching the parrot, and after a few mumbled it and pawing it till the perch was strewn with feathers before his master could call him off. Then the bird, by the aid of its bill and feet, got back on its perch and shouted at the dog, "You foul-mouthed bird," as long as he was in sight, while the dog's master laughed till he could scarcely stand, and the dog looked as if he would like to see the foul-mouthed bird. The owner of the bird is yet to be heard from.

RIVALRY AMONG CABBAGE-YENDERS.—Three rival vegetable gardeners were each trying to sell a big wagon-load of cabbages on Front street yesterday. One had large heads of "flat Dutch," which he, of course, considered the best. The other proclaimed the good qualities of the Danish head, a smaller cabbage, but as solid as a rock. He said the big Dutch cabbages were soft, watery and stringy, and fit only for sauerkraut. The third had the fine "curly," or Savoy, cabbage, which most housekeepers prefer as less rank and more delicate than others. Some of his were large, but most of them rather small, as they are not rank growers. Dealers generally preferred the little, solid Danish head, and bought largely of them to pack in crates for shipping. The big flat Dutch will go to logging camps and workmen's boarding-houses, and housekeepers will dispose of most of the Savoy. Cabbage is not a particularly delicate vegetable, but a very dishing one.

CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS IN POSTOFFICE.—The rush of Christmas mail has commenced at the local Postoffice. Yesterday a wagon-load of presents for delivery in foreign countries was received at the office, and the employees expect to see the flood of packages pour in from now until Christmas time. Postmaster J. A. Hancock has been notified that he may employ extra help for handling the rush of mail, and some extra men will be put on duty today. There will be no money order department, as there is a particular rush upon that department just now, occasioned by the approaching holiday season. Men will be added in the other departments as soon as the mail business increases sufficiently.

REFRIGERATOR CAR MAN BURY.—An agent for a refrigerated car line, circulating about Front street yesterday, expressing a desire to accommodate shipper. He said the car situation is much better than it was a month ago. Some dealers were waiting to ship apples, and some potatoes South, and he was going to get cars for both. When asked how it was with other companies, he said he was so rushed with business for his own company that he had not paid any attention to other lines. A dealer who was asked if this agent was going to provide all the cars wanted, replied: "He says he hopes so."

WANT STIMULUS ADDRESS.—The statement that an adding machine was needed in the City Auditor's office caused Auditor Devin to receive several telephone messages early yesterday morning from parties who were desirous of submitting such machines for trial. It appears that there are several kinds of such machines of various forms and styles, but all producing the same result. An adder which produced a wrong result would probably be such a machine as is mentioned in the Bible, which "biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder," and for which there is no room in the Auditor's office.

NOT ALLOWED IN AMERICA.—Eighteen Japanese were deported on the Portland & Asiatic liner Indravelli when the big steamer dropped down the river yesterday afternoon. Sixty Japanese came over on the Indravelli and 40 established their right to land here, but the deported unfortunate had passports previously used by other persons, and so were sent back to Japan on the Indravelli at the steamship company's expense. Four Chinese were also deported for similar reasons, and 11 other Celestials departed for their native land.

SHIPPING IN CHRISTMAS GREENS.—No one need fret for fear that there will be a scarcity of mistletoe for Christmas decorations, as there is already a carload of the stuff on its way to this city, and another is offered to anyone who wants it. A shipment of sample bushes of the California pepper tree has also been sent by the Western Fruit & Cold Storage Co. all the way from Glendale, Cal., to be distributed among florists and others, in the hope of securing orders for a lot to be used for Christmas decorations. The house, feathery leaves and the small, red berries of the pepper tree are very pretty, but not so pretty as the leaves and berries of the holly tree, which have been closely connected with Christmas celebrations for centuries. Holly trees, however, are not numerous here, and sprays of the leaves and berries come a little higher than many like. The pepper tree is very common in California, and the boughs should be cheap. If there is no change for the worse in the weather, there will be many Oregon roses for Christmas decorations.

KANGAROO SAIL AWAY.—The family of kangaroos mentioned a day or two since as having been contracted for by the City Park has been taken to the collection of animals there, as the ship on which they were has gone down the river. This is to be regretted, as they would have made an interesting exhibit, being a male and female young one born on the passage from Australia here. The young one was still carried in the pouch, which is one of the chief characteristics of the kangaroo and other marsupial animals. The purchase of the animals fell through on account of the captain of the ship making a bluff at the park committee to get more than he had agreed to sell them for, and the committee could not permit this to be done, as it was dealing with public money. The kangaroos will regret the matter more than any other animal, as they must be tired of a life on the raging deep and the fare on ship board, and will feel homesick in France, not knowing the French language.

W. D. FLETCHER TO BUILD.—The removal of the Postoffice to Sixth and Alameda has occasioned an increase of business on Sixth street, below Washington, that has made it worth while for property-owners to improve the district. The Omnibus and Stage Transfer Company and Russell and Blyth buildings, at the corner of Sixth and Oak, are to be followed by a six-story brick on the east side of Sixth street, between Sixth and Oak. The building, which will be the property of William D. Fletcher, will have a 50-foot frontage. Bids for the work are now being taken. Bids are also being taken for a three-story brick on the same ground, in case it is not found convenient to build the six-story structure. All bids are to be in by Saturday, when they will be opened.

SEARCHING FOR CONNELL'S HEIRS.—Search is being made for the heirs of James Connell, the aged man who was found dead in the Barr Hotel Sunday. He left only a memorandum statement of how he wished the property divided. As this was not dated nor witnessed, it will not probably stand in court. Connell was a business man, and his estate is valued at several hundred dollars. He was last seen Friday. Before that he had been employed in a blacksmith shop on Davis street.

FEDERATED TRADES COMMITTEE TO MEET.—A special committee from the Federated Trades Council will meet this evening for the purpose of discussing its agreements with employers for the coming year. The committee is composed of a representative from each union connected with the Building Trades. At the meeting this evening they will upon the scale of wages to be asked for the coming year, and also upon the working rules of the various unions.

FEAR HE HAS BEEN SHANGHAIED.—Col. Fisher, 19 years old, has been reported at the police station as missing. It is believed that he has been shanghaied, as he had been serving as a sailor before he came to this city. He was last seen Friday. Before that he had been employed in a blacksmith shop on Davis street.

INSTALLATION OF REV. A. W. WILSON.—Rev. A. W. Wilson, pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church, Sixth and Montgomery streets, will be formally installed this evening at 7:30 o'clock. Rev. W. P. White, of Albany, will preside and preach, the sermon. Rev. Alex McCracken, of Albany, and Rev. J. A. Speer, of this city, will assist in the service.

RED MEN ELECT OFFICERS.—Chinook Tribe, No. 5, Improved Order of Red Men, at its wigwag on Monday evening, elected the following chiefs for the term: Sachem, A. J. Osborn; senior sagamore, Jay House; junior sagamore, C. Mienier; prophet, A. G. Kerns; chief of records, Robert Holman; keeper of wampum, Lew Hall; trustees, George Klingensland, Dr. S. L. King.

VISITORS AT HISTORICAL SOCIETY.—From 30 different states visitors registered on the entry book of the Oregon Historical Society during the month of November. There were 361 of these visitors from outside states. Twenty-three came from foreign countries as well. In all, 1,182 visitors looked through the rooms of the Historical Society during the past month.

CHINESE GAMBLERS FINED.—Eleven Chinese proprietors of gambling-houses paid into the Municipal Court yesterday morning the sum of \$250. The regular proceedings were not interfered with by any representatives of the Municipal Association. The Chinese gamblers running two games were fined \$200 each, while the smaller houses paid but \$50.

 Portland Kid, Parti-Colored Cocker Dog, Gets Prize at San Francisco.
 Portland Kid, the beautiful parti-colored cocker spaniel dog entered by E. F. Willis of this city, at the San Francisco bench show, will bring five silver cups home when he returns to Portland. Portland Kid is one of the four dogs from this city that made such an enviable record at the San Francisco show last week. Yesterday Mr. Willis, owner of the prize dog, received a telegram from San Francisco, stating that Portland Kid had won the special prize silver cup offered for the best parti-colored cocker in the show, of grounds and also the first prize cup for the best cocker dog in the show. In addition to this, he won first in the novice, first in the limit and first in the winner's classes, making five first prizes in all. This is the first time that Portland Kid has entered out of the city and the promising pup was handled by a stranger, but his bench show instincts were with him in San Francisco and he took every first in every class in which he was entered.

TORN TO PIECES BY LIONS.

Children of Performer Are Among Those to See Their Parent Killed.
 DESSAU, Germany, Dec. 7.—Frau Fischer, a liontamer, was torn to pieces today by four lions in a menagerie cage and in sight of a great crowd of people. She was trying to make a lion shrink through a hoop, and struck it with a whip, whereupon the animal leaped upon her and dismembered her at one stroke. The woman shrieked once and the three other lions joined in the attack on her, and fought among themselves for fragments of the woman's mangled body. Finally the liontamer's assistants armed with iron rods, clubs, and spears, succeeded in dragging the animals from the woman's mangled body. The children of Frau Fischer were in a box witnessing the performance when their mother was killed.
