

LIPTON WILL TRY

Once Again He Will Compete for Cup.

WRITES NEW YORK CLUB

Announces Fact on Receiving American Testimonial.

PRESENTATION AT A DINNER

Doughty Yachtsman Greatly Touched by the Mark of Esteem of the American and Makes Characteristic Speech.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Sir Thomas Lipton announced his readiness to again challenge for the America's cup, when the silver service, subscribed for by the people of the United States was presented to him at a dinner held at the Hyde Park Hotel tonight. The dinner was attended by several members of the House of Commons, the members of the London presentation committee, including John R. Carter, secretary of the United States Embassy; Captain Charles H. Stockton, United States naval attaché, and Major John R. Beacom, United States military attaché, and by nearly 100 American residents in London, as well as several who are now visiting here.

Consul-General Evans presided, and in presenting the service said it was unprecedented for such an honor to be paid a foreigner by the people of the United States, but Sir Thomas Lipton had won the golden opinions of those from whom he tried to wrest the America's cup.

Sir Thomas Lipton replying, said he was a proud man to be the recipient of such a splendid gift, adding: "It will be cherished by me as my most valued treasure." Referring in a humorous vein to the value of the gift in "raising the wind," Sir Thomas said he never really had any difficulty in so doing, except at Sandy Hook. He had hoped, he said, to add an interest to the fiscal controversy by increasing British silver imports with that interesting import, the America's cup. Having failed to do so, he found in this silver service a splendid substitute.

Speaking with much feeling, Sir Thomas said that if any action of his had tended to the development of a better feeling between Great Britain and the United States, it would be a source of sincere happiness to him to the end of his days, though what he had done was merely a slight return for the generosity and courtesy showered upon him by the American people. Continuing, Sir Thomas said: "The love which always existed between a true mother and a true daughter, however wealthy and aristocratic that daughter should become, including Duchesses and other Americans, should keep the two countries together. America's progress toward the Southern pole was only hindered by the newly-founded Republic of Panama, and we must work together for the peace of the world. 'Blessed are the peacemakers,' quoted Sir Thomas, who, amid great laughter, finished the quotation, 'for they shall inherit the earth.'"

Sir Thomas said he had sent a letter to the New York Yacht Club dealing with another possible challenge for the cup. He added he was quite willing to have one last try, "provided I have a reasonable chance of success, especially as the next Shamrock will be a lucky four-leaved one."

SOLUTION TO RACE PROBLEM.

Governor of North Carolina Gives Suggestions to Both Races.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 18.—Governor Aycock, of North Carolina, speaking tonight at the banquet of the North Carolina Society of Baltimore, said: "I am proud of my state because there we have solved the negro problem, which recently seems to have given you some trouble. We have taken him out of politics, and have thereby secured good government under any party, and laid foundations for the future development of both races. We have secured peace and rendered prosperity a certainty. I am inclined to give to you our solution of this problem."

It is first, as far as possible, under the 15th amendment, to disfranchise him after that let him alone, quit writing about him; quit talking about him; quit making him 'the white man's burden'; let him take his own skill, quit coddling him; let him learn that he must earn anything he did not himself earn; that character is the outcome of sacrifice and work is the result of toil; that, whatever his future may be, the present has in it for him nothing that is not the product of industry, thrift, obedience to law and uprightness; that he can do much by work; that violence may gratify his passions but it cannot accomplish his ambition; that he may eat rarely of the cooking of equality, but he will always find when he does, that there is death in the pot."

"Let the negro learn once for all that there is an undying separation of the races; that the two peoples may develop side by side to the fullest, but that they cannot intermingle. Let the white man determine that no man shall by act or thought or speech cross this line, and the race problem will be at an end. 'These things are not said in enmity to the negro, but in regard for him. He constitutes one-third of the population of my state; he has always been my personal friend. As a lawyer I have often defended him, and as Governor I have frequently protected him. But there flows in my veins the blood of the dominant race, that race that has conquered the earth, and seeks out the mysteries of the heights and depths. But I would not have the white people forget their duty to the negro. We owe an obligation to the man in black. We brought him here. He served us well. He is patient and teachable. We owe him gratitude. Above all we owe him justice.'"

CHANGED FRONT TOWARD IT.

Large Firm Did Not Know at First Schwab Was in Ship Combine.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—When the hearing in the United States Shipbuilding receivership case was resumed today Mr. Untermyer continued his examination of Charles B. Alexander, of the firm of Alexander & Green. It is recognized by counsel that the hearing will extend well into next year. Mr. Untermyer saying he has a number of witnesses yet to call in addition to Messrs. Schwab, Fane and John W. Young before the defense begins to present its case.

The hearing opened with a tilt between Messrs. Guthrie and Untermyer. Mr. Guthrie rising to state for Mr. Alexander that none of the cablegrams which he sent from abroad during the Summer of 1902 in regard to the receivership referred to shipbuilding, and if Mr. Untermyer desired to "pry into Mr. Alexander's private business affairs" the cablegrams will be opened to his inspection. Mr. Untermyer presented the phrasing of the statement, and the examination then proceeded.

The examination continued along the lines of Mr. Alexander's correspondence to New York and financial condition, the progress of the Paris negotiations. Mr. Untermyer read a number of expressions from the letters that entertained the audience greatly. It was brought out that the attitude of Morgan, Harjes & Co., unfavorable at first to the shipbuilding proposition, was changed completely after the receipt of the July 20 cablegram from G. W. Perkins announcing that Schwab and his friends were interested and would be glad of as favorable a view of it as possible.

Object to His Going Bankrupt.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Two protests were filed in the United States District Court to the discharge in bankruptcy of Daniel Leroy Drexler & Co. in behalf of the First National Bank of Boston and the Cambridge Trust Company, of Cambridge, Mass. The protests charge that the books of Drexler & Co. were so fixed as to conceal its true financial condition, and that many accounts of two members of the firm known to be worthless were carried at full value.

Nearly Corner Powder Business.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 18.—The International Smokeless Powder & Chemical Company, which is controlled by the Mardian Company, has passed into the hands of the Dupont International Powder Company. This deal, it is said, gives the Dupont Company 50 per cent of the powder business in the United States.

Suit to Break Railroad Charter.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 18.—Suit to oust the Hocking Valley Railway Company from its charter was filed in the Circuit Court today by Attorney-General Sheets, it being alleged in the petition that the company is endeavoring to create a monopoly of the Dixie route from Columbus, Valley in violation of the anti-trust law.

HEAD OF MARINES TO GO.

ELLIS, Will Soon Sail for Panama if Present Conditions Continue.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—After a conference today between Secretary Moody, Rear-Admiral Taylor, Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, and Brigadier-General George Elliott, Commandant of the Marine Corps, it was decided that if present conditions on the Isthmus of Panama continue, General Elliott will sail for Colon on the Dixie from Philadelphia, when that vessel goes south with the battalion of marines, which has been ordered assembled at Philadelphia for dispatch to the Isthmus of Panama.

WAR AS A LAST RESORT.

Columbia Will Rely on the Latin Republics to Aid Her.

PARIS, Dec. 18.—The "United Colombian Committee" here gave out the statement today saying that Colombia would first seek through a commission to induce the United States to recognize Colombia's rights under the treaty of 1846; second, if the Commission fails, Colombia will ask for the submission of the question to the Hague Arbitration Court; third, if its submission to The Hague Court is refused, Colombia will go to war and rely on the Latin republics to come to her aid.

Petrol to Do Patrol Duty.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—The Navy Department is informed that the submarine Petrel left San Francisco yesterday for Acapulco on her way to Panama, where she will be assigned to patrol duty with the other vessels of the Pacific squadron, commanded by Rear-Admiral Gihlan.

AID OF WOMEN IS ASKED.

Society Working for Expulsion of Smoot Issues an Appeal.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 18.—The executive board of the National Union of Women's Organizations, which is carrying on a campaign for the expulsion of Senator Smoot, of Utah, held its second meeting in this city today. Representatives were present from the National Women's Christian Temperance Union, the International Council of Women, the New Jersey Congress of Mothers, the Pennsylvania Congress of Mothers and various local women's clubs. A resolution was unanimously adopted calling upon "all patriotic women throughout the country, and all patriotic women, to petition the Senate of the United States for the expulsion of Reed Smoot from their honorable body."

Cubans Again Urge Tariff Bill.

HAVANA, Dec. 18.—Since the settlement of the reciprocity question by the passage and signing of the treaty at Washington, Cuban business interests have been urging upon the government the early passage of the long-projected general tariff bill so as to have it take effect, as nearly as possible,

GIRL CHASES BURGLARS OUT.

Theater Tickets, They Took Among Other Things, Cause Capture.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Having surprised burglars ransacking the home of her father this afternoon, Miss Isabelle Cameron, daughter of Roderic McLeod Cameron, of Madison avenue, and a granddaughter of John Roderic Cameron, who died several years ago, chased the robbers out of the house. They carried with them quite a lot of booty, but were obliged to drop some of it in order to make their escape. The fact that among the articles stolen were two tickets for a play now in the Madison-Square Theater led to the detection of the thieves. Miss Cameron remembered the numbers of the seats she had engaged for the performance tonight, and as soon as she ascertained that the tickets had been stolen with other things valued at thousands of dollars, police headquarters was communicated with and detectives were sent to the Madison-Square Theater to watch at the door and arrest anyone attempting to use the Cameron tickets. Shortly before the curtain went up two young men entered and offered the tickets to the detectives who were looking. They were arrested.

Steals \$200 per Day for Months.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—While working on a salary of \$3 a week, Gus A. Grigsby has robbed his employers at a rate of \$200 per day, according to Manager David L. Rose, of M. L. Barrett & Co. When arrested \$250 worth of costly vanilla beans were found concealed in Grigsby's clothing. In the few months but his meager salary has kept him attached to the firm it is believed he has stolen between \$12,000 and \$15,000 worth of stock. Grigsby has held the position of chemist's helper for the past nine months. After his arrest Grigsby admitted his pecuniary needs had been made during most of that time. "I need a little ready money," was the only explanation he gave.

Broker Pawned Many Diamonds.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Claims thus far aggregating \$104,000 have been presented against Hyman Gattie, a diamond broker who disappeared last July. Bankruptcy proceedings brought against Gattie have disclosed, it is alleged, that he had procured from dealers in Amsterdam, Holland, Utica, New York, and other places diamonds worth more than \$200,000 in the memorandum plan and had pawned the goods. Pawn tickets showing a face value of \$175,000 have thus far been turned in, but it is said \$30,000 worth of stones cannot be located. The creditors assert Gattie kept in good standing for several months by making the first payments to the dealers, who allowed nine months for the balance.

Dangerous Counterfeiters Caught.

BOSTON, Dec. 18.—United States Secret Service Agents arrested in Boston today two men who they say are as dangerous a pair of counterfeiters as the Government has had to deal with. The men under arrest are Fred T. Wilson and Edward D. Wiggins. The photographic counterfeit money alleged to have been made by them was seized from the impounding of Government paper that it was readily accepted as genuine by most of the banks through which it passed.

Says Councilmen Wanted "Rake-Off."

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 18.—The strongest testimony yet admitted to the grand jury, Kas., grand jury was given today by John Boddington, a brick sidewalk contractor, who testified, it is reported, that Councilmen demanded a "rake-off" of 50 cents per thousand on all brick used in paving streets. He told the jury that the brick companies paid the Councilmen for their votes and paid them well.

Bloodhounds Unable to Trail Men.

NEWCASTLE, Colo., Dec. 18.—Bloodhounds were unable to follow for the trail of the men who blew up yesterday five buildings here occupied by striking union coal miners. The dogs were used and no clew to the perpetrators of the crime has been found.

Fined for Lynching Negro.

BELLEVILLE, Ill., Dec. 18.—In the Circuit Court today, of the men indicted for complicity in the lynching of the negro school teacher, David S. Wyatt, June 6, entered a plea of guilty to the charge of rioting, and were each fined \$50 and costs.

King Edward's New Carver.

HEARSE DRIVERS OUT
Funerals in Chicago Have to Be Postponed.

TROUBLE OCCURS AT ONE
Pickets Compel the Men to Desert Their Posts While Services Are Being Held—Strike Is for Increased Wages.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—Sixteen hundred livery drivers, backed by every teamster's union in Chicago, struck today for better wages and improved working conditions. Several meetings were held between committees representing the livery owners and the drivers' union, but the employers refused to make any concessions, holding that business did not warrant the paying of higher wages in view of the inroads by automobiles. Nearly 400 livery stables are completely tied up.

Drivers of hearses went out with the carriage drivers and as a result funeral processions will be curtailed. The first trouble occurred when an attempt was made to conduct a funeral at West Eighteenth and Alport streets. An undertaker secured enough conveyances to take the body and mourners to the church, but while the services were in progress pickets compelled the drivers of the hearses and carriages to desert under threats of violence.

Some of the 15 funerals scheduled for today were postponed in the hope that the strike would be settled. Many funerals, however, took place, the bodies being carried to the cemeteries in undertakers' embalming wagons. Only 700 cabs and carriages—those used by licensed cabsmen, who are pledged not to handle any of the funeral business for liverymen—were operated today. The cabsmen belong to a separate union.

Only the presence of a large police squadron prevented strike sympathizers from attacking a funeral today. While the police stood guard about the hearses, union pickets and strike sympathizers crowded the street and threatened violence to the nonunion drivers of the carriages and hearses.

LABOR LEADERS ORDERED TO GO

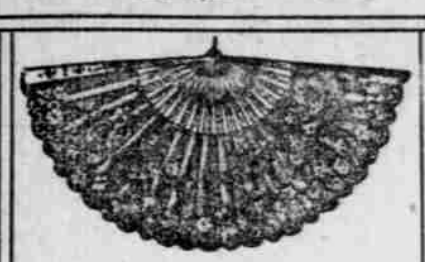
Colorado City Council and Police Back Up Command.

PUEBLO, Colo., Dec. 18.—The City Council and Police Department tonight ordered Max Malich, of Denver, a prominent labor leader, and President Moyer, of the Western Federation of Miners, to leave the city on the first train. Both obeyed the order.

The action on the part of the Council was due to a meeting held last night, when a union of smeltersmen was organized with 183 members, and at which a riot was threatened when a former Cripple Creek miner criticized President Moyer's course. It is asserted that practically none of the present employees of the smelters here joined the union. Before leaving, President Moyer expressed the intention of proceeding against certain officials in the courts for their action.

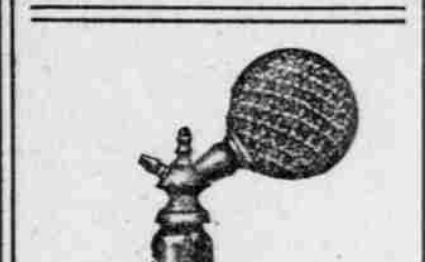

WOMEN AS JURORS

Precedent in the History of America Is Established.

Called in Chicago Case

Probation Officer Tries to Have Child Taken From Mother, but Her Touching Story Outweighs Adverse Testimony.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—(Special.)—For perhaps the first time in the history of the United States, as far as local records show, a jury composed of six women sat on a case before Judge Honan in the Juvenile Court today. The jury passed on the petition to have little Mary McGann, 8 years old, declared delinquent and placed in an institution. Mrs. Ann McGann, the mother, declared the child had been with her all her life, and would die if taken away from her. The jury sympathized with the mother's feelings, and returned a verdict that mother and daughter should be sent to Dunning.

The verdict was concurred in by a jury of six men to make the verdict legal. They also listened to the case, and agreed with the jury of women.

The jury was composed of probation officers as follows: Mrs. Elizabeth Meyer, Miss Minnie Jacobs, Miss Caroline Blinn, Mrs. Jane B. Skinner, Mrs. Elizabeth Peavey and Mrs. Emma Quinlan.

The women were not sworn in the regular manner. They were simply summoned to the jury box and took their seats. Probation Officer John Sherrock declared the McGann home at 322 Aberdeen street was not a fit and proper place for the rearing of a child. He declared the home was in an unsanitary condition. Other witnesses were heard, but in the end the feminine jury gave the mother her child.
