

POWERS WAR IT

Colombia Can Expect No Aid if War Comes.

REYES IS DULY INFORMED

Idea of a Brush With America Height of Foolishness.

DIPLOMATS ACT IN ACCORD

Envoy of the Bogota Government Realizes He is Trying to Save a Shipwreck, but Fears People Cannot Be Controlled.

UNITED STATES—Scenes at the several departments greatly resemble those preceding the Spanish-American War; Navy will be in supreme command for the time being.

COLOMBIA—Small detachments of Panamanian soldiers, but American marines are on the lookout.

POWERS—Diplomats show Colombia her cause is hopeless, and it necessary, will bring pressure to bear to prevent war.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Diplomatic pressure will be brought to bear upon Colombia by several European powers to prevent war between that country and the United States. The first move in this direction has already been taken by several foreign powers through their representatives here, who have informed General Rafael Reyes of the utility of any attempt by Colombia to retake Panama, declaring that it will result only in precipitating the Bogota government into war with the United States, and have said to him that the result of such a catastrophe Colombia herself must realize.

If this is not sufficient, the representatives of these countries at Bogota will be instructed to inform President Marroquin that Colombia can expect no sympathy from the European powers in any move she may make on Panama, which would inevitably involve her in war with the United States.

The members of the Diplomatic Corps have been informed that General Reyes himself that he fears he cannot hold his people in check much longer. General Reyes is not talking for publication, but to several European Ambassadors, and has said he is doing everything in his power to prevent an outbreak before the conclusion of his mission, but, although his influence with the army is considerable, he is so far away that it is difficult for him to make this felt as strongly as if he were on the ground and in command.

What Reyes Most Fears.

Diplomats whom General Reyes has approached on the subject say that what he most fears is the result of an announcement at Bogota of the failure of his mission. He himself realizes that the most he can hope from the Government of the United States is an offer to mediate in the moral question to prevail on Panama to assume her portion of the Colombian debt. Frequently General Reyes has been told that he can expect nothing.

"I came to Washington to save what I could from a shipwreck," he said to a diplomat of high rank.

Realization of the true situation, it is said, will not prevent General Reyes from calling on the United States for a reference to the Hague of several of the questions at issue. It is on this point that European diplomats have told General Reyes that he is expecting too much of this Government to submit any phase of the Panama matter to The Hague. Several Ambassadors have earnestly advised the General that he will find the people of the United States have no sympathy from that quarter. It has been further pointed out by these diplomats that the proffered sympathy of several South American Republics can avail Colombia nothing in the event of war with the United States. It is hoped that the receipt of the news in Bogota will lead to calm the feeling there and hold the Colombians in check until General Reyes can return.

Reckons Without Her Host.

Great Britain and The Netherlands have taken pains to let General Reyes know indirectly that Colombia reckons without her host. The interpretation of delay in recognizing the Republic of Panama as an evidence of their sympathy for Colombia, or as due to other than a desire to protect the interests of their financiers, who are the largest holders of government bonds.

It is said here to be improbable that our naval commanders in isthmian waters will go to the extent of dislodging the Colombian troops which have landed on the Isle of Pines. On this point, however, the policy of the Government has not been definitely decided.

AMERICANS NOT TOLD TO GO.

Naval Authorities Decide There is No Need for Reinforcements.

PANAMA, Dec. 21.—There is no truth in the report that Americans have been given 24 hours to leave the Darien district. There are less than a score of Americans in the entire district, and practically all of them are located at Cana, where they are engaged in mining. Cana is about three days inland from Yaviza. The presence of Colombians at Tumaiti, and the discovery of a few men about Cana, supposed to be Colombian spies, decided the miners to withdraw, which they did, passing through Yaviza on the way out.

Torpedo-Boats Await Officers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—The torpedo-boat destroyers Paul Jones and Thetis are lying at the Mare Island Navy Yard, coaled and ready for sea, awaiting the coming of officers from the East. The officers are now on their way to the navy yard, and it is expected that the destroyers will sail next Wednesday for Panama. A crew from the training-ship Independence has been placed on the Paul Jones, and the Thetis also has a full complement. Both vessels, however, lack a number of officers.

Legislature Declares for Canal.

BATON ROUGE, La., Dec. 21.—Both houses of the Louisiana Legislature adopted a resolution requesting the United States Senators from this state to vote for the ratification of the treaty for the construction of the Panama Canal.

Treaty With Brazil Safe.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—Congress has discussed in secret session the treaty recently agreed to between Bolivia and Brazil, says a Herald dispatch from its correspondent at La Paz, Bolivia, who adds that the treaty is safe.

that Captain Butler's company of marines at Yaviza covers both these approaches. The detachment of marines at Yaviza is engaged in securing the entire district, and so far has not reported the presence of Colombian troops. The detachment of marines at Real Santa Maria is provided with four Colt machine guns. Each point possesses two ship boats, and the marines are doing much river exploring in these boats.

The presence of ten men was recently reported at Tapala. They posed as rubber-cutters, but it is believed they were Colombian spies. Some of them were arrested by the Panamanian authorities, and were sent by schooner to Buena Ventura. The others scattered, and a few of them appearing later at Cana and at Paya, a small hamlet. Otherwise the Darien district is perfectly quiet.

The authorities believe that Colombia would require a big and well-supported army to do anything effective in the Darien district, and despite the fact that small parties can travel from Yaviza to the Atrato River and to Acand, in the Gulf of Darien, it is not believed that Colombia would make the attempt. Nevertheless the naval authorities are fully prepared for any emergency.

Orders have been given to the commanders of the gunboats in the San Miguel Gulf and to the two outposts to keep a careful watch on Colombian troops to avoid contact or the opening of hostilities with them as far as possible, and to inform the flagship immediately of their presence.

ACTIVITY AT WASHINGTON.

Scenes Greatly Resemble Those Preceding the War With Spain.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Secretary of the Navy Moody this afternoon admitted that preparatory orders had been given General Elliott, commander of the marine corps, to go to the Isthmus and take charge of the land forces.

Hon. Wayne McVagh, special counsel for Colombia, attended a conference today between President Roosevelt and Secretary Hay. Mr. McVagh and General Reyes have requested the Colombian Government to make no overt act. It is believed some headway is being made here toward a partial settlement of the differences, but it is feared the impetuosity of the Colombian leaders may bring about a crisis.

Appearances about the State, War and Navy Offices present many of the aspects of the condition immediately preceding the Spanish-American War. The secret office of the Chief of the Bureau of Navigation in the sub-basement has again been utilized, and conferences are being held several times a day between Rear-Admiral Taylor and his lieutenants. Cablegrams are translated there under conditions most private. These quarters were used regularly during the war that gave Cuba her freedom.

The office of the Quartermaster is the scene of the greatest activity. This is due to the belief that a clash with Colombia is inevitable. Proposals are being submitted in person by the agents of the railroads and steamboat lines for the transportation of troops.

The stress is such at the Department of State that it has been found necessary to call attention to the fact that Thursday is diplomatic day, in the hope of relieving the official pressure as much as possible. Only Ambassadors have the privilege of calling upon the Secretary of State under these conditions. The announcement is made that important information is, of course, to be communicated at any time.

COLOMBIANS INVADE LAND.

Small Detachment Embarks on Island in Panama.

COLON, Dec. 21.—Information has been received here that about 100 Colombian troops have landed at the Island of Pines, northwest of Cape Tiburon, which is situated at the western entrance of the Gulf of Darien. The island is in the Panama territory, and is the only island along that coast which is wooded, peaked with mountains and also well watered, thus offering every facility for camping and being used as a base of observation.

It is significant in this connection that the United States auxiliary cruiser Mayflower left this harbor yesterday bound in the direction of the Island of Pines to obtain information of the report.

The United States ship Bancroft is still on that coast in the vicinity of Nombre de Dios. The cruiser Nashville has returned to Colon from Boas del Toro. Rear-Admiral Coghlan has transferred his flag to the auxiliary cruiser Prairie.

Thirty-five of the United States auxiliary cruiser Prairie's marines were landed today, and took a train for Bas Obispo station, near Emperador. They will occupy the canal company's houses at Bas Obispo.

NAVY OFFICIALS IN CONFERENCE

Instructions Are Submitted to Moody for Approval.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Rear-Admiral Taylor, chief of the Bureau of Navigation, and executive head of the General Naval Board, today was in conference with Captain John E. Pillsbury, assistant chief of the bureau. Captain William Swift, chairman of the general boards committee on the fleet; Commander Winslow and Lieutenant Belknap, of the Bureau of Navigation, in the secret office of the Bureau of Navigation. Several cablegrams which arrived from Rear-Admirals Glass and Coghlan over Sunday were taken up for consideration, and instructions in reply were prepared and submitted to Secretary Moody for approval.

Nothing official regarding the conference was announced except that it concerned the isthmian situation. A long cablegram was received today from Rear-Admiral Coghlan, commanding the force at Colon, in which he requested that crackers instead of bread be dispatched to the isthmus, as the latter food molds quickly in the tropical climate.

Navy Will Control Matters.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Under the impression that war is surely to occur between the United States and Colombia, the Quartermaster-General of the Army has been besieged by railroad and shipping men desirous of transporting troops. It was pointed out today that while the landing of marines on foreign soil occasioned but little comment and is only an episode in the disturbed condition of affairs, the embarkment of troops puts a different aspect on the situation. For this reason the Navy will be permitted to control affairs in isthmian waters for the present, at least, or until matters reach a stage necessitating the co-operation of the Army.
