FIRST PRODUCTION OF "PARSIFAL" IN NEW YORK

Wagner's Great Religious Opera Played at Metropolitan Opera-House—"Victims of Parsifalitis Pay to Be Bored," Says Alan Dale.

THE first American performance of Wagner's "Parsifal" at the New York Metropolitan Opera-House December 24, has attracted great interest in this great religious opera. The New York and Chicago papers print reviews varying in praise and criticism of the production: Mr. Conried's reproduction of Wagner's "Parsifal," admirable as it is, even surpassing beautiful in many ways, proved definitely that it is impossible to reproduce in the Metropolitan Opera-House the mystic-religious atmosphere this work demands to make it a true representation of its creator's genius.

This is not the fault of Mr. Conried, who spent an immense amount of energy, thought and money on this production, but it is simply evident beyond all manner of doubt that the New York opera-house is not a suitable place for "Parsifal." Like a picture the frame of which has been designed by the painter himself, "Parsifal" requires a framework built on the plan of the Bayreuth Opera-House—only this can be the atmosphere Wagner spun about his great poem, that mystical, intangible something which distinguishes the work in Bayreuth from the reality of the stage mechanism, be reproduced.

From a scenic point of view, last night's performance must be considered a great success, although there were slips—slips that they should be so irresistible in the Metropolitan Opera-House! The shifting scenes, for instance, began to move too early in the first act, and as the temple of the Grail was revealed, some of the pillars in the foreground were brought out too far from the wings and had to be hauled back. This not only interfered with the musical accompaniment, and undoubtedly marred its effect upon the audience.

In considering the musical performance those who appreciate the value of hearing "Parsifal" at all and realize the almost insurmountable difficulties which its production offers should give the greatest thanks to the conductor, the orchestra and the vocalists. More than any one person has this man labored and worked incessantly to bring about artistic results, and in the main what he accomplished was highly creditable. There were points in his interpretation, it is true, with which one could find fault. Not infrequently his readings lacked breadth in the passages illustrative of poignant spiritual suffering. There was a tendency to exaggerate tempo, to hasten in the crescendo with a resulting translation of yearning religious sentiment into mere human passion. This was apparent in the first and last acts. But what a superb reading of the second act Mr. Hertz gave—New York Press.

There is no accounting for taste. But it was impossible to resist the conclusion that had "Parsifal" been given without an advertising word, a protest or a splurge, there would have been no convulsions, but an audience amazed, yet bored—a gathering agitated at the notion of turning religious emotionality to theatrical account, but finally lethargic at the presentation itself.

Another inevitable conclusion: Why should ministers object? People who enjoy "Parsifal" must revel in church services, and the hopeless problem of churchgoing apathy seems to be solved.

I find the thing detestable beyond words of mine to express, disgraceful to those who participate in any way in its presentation, and sacrilegious on the part of those who go to witness it. As a faithful imitation of the act of Judas Iscariot, who traded on the Lord's blood to the winning of 30 pieces of silver, and so far as relates to those who go to witness the performance, it is the silver that motivates the Judas traffic.

The one really poor feature of the performance was the chorus in acts I and III. It was woefully weak and lacking in rhythm, and showed a constant tendency to wander from the pitch. The chorus of knights came to grief completely in their first entrance, and in order to complete the disaster the orchestra had to stop playing for about ten bars.

The scenery is, in part, wonderfully effective, but the lighting can be much improved. But I am forgetting myself in demanding Bayreuth on Broadway.

Why not, then, give "Parsifal" frankly as an opera with opera performance beginning at 7:30, the same as any other long opera in the repertoire of the company? Why an affection of Bayreuth, with the "beginning at 5 o'clock" and the trumpet fanfare and the intermission of an hour and a half and all the other humbug of imitation?

These are but externals and cannot reproduce the Bayreuth spirit. These are but a mockery of that ideal which Wagner tried to rear in that far away little country town and which we who starve in great cities can only long for as young Parsifal longed for a sight of the Holy Grail in his long wanderings—Walter Damrosch in Chicago Tribune.

His work this evening had moments of undeniable charm and profound feeling, but he often overacts the part and occasionally sentimentalizes it.—Chicago Chronicle.

MAD RUSH AT FIRE

Chicago Hotel Destroyed and Three Lives Lost.

SOME GUESTS HAD RETIRED

Several Women Make Their Escape by Sliding Down a Plank—One Hundred People Were in the Building at the Time.

CHICAGO, Jan. 1.—Three persons were killed, and four others injured, tonight in a fire that destroyed the Louvre Hotel, 2611-2623 Lake avenue. Nearly 100 guests were in the hotel at the time the fire broke out, several of whom had retired for the night. The remembrance of the fire, the horror of fresh in their minds, all persons in the place became panic-stricken and rushed madly for the streets as soon as it became known that the hotel was on fire. All had been overcome by smoke, and had hurried to escape, but in the upper stories of the building the smoke was so thick that they had great difficulty in finding the exits.

IS STRONGLY ANTI-AMERICAN.
Appointment of Archbishop Nozalea Causes Much Comment.

AGAINST ALLEGED BOODLERS.

Missouri Shows Her Hand in Prosecution of Baking-Powder Magnate.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Jan. 1.—Assistant Attorney-General Jeffries and Judge Thomas B. Hays, of St. Louis, who represent the State of Missouri, in the tradition matter of William Zeigler, of New York, wanted here to stand trial on a charge of bribery, today sent briefs to Governor Odell. The briefs are accompanied by arguments of the attorneys, who say they do not seek the arrest of a citizen of New York for a trivial offense, but for a serious crime, which, in its effects is destructive of the very existence of the sovereignty of the state in corrupting and debauching her Legislature, whence must emanate the laws needed for the protection of property and the lives of its citizens. They quote the President's message on bribery and comment on it.

Novel Plea for '04 Fair Exhibit.
ROME, Jan. 1.—The Italian Ambassador to the United States, Signor Mayor Desplanches, in his efforts to arouse interest in Italy's participation in the St. Louis Exposition, of which he is general commissioner for Italy, has published a pamphlet, in which he shows that, after Germany, the United States is the best customer for Italian trade by the Dingley tariff. The Ambassador thinks that the pamphlet will have much effect in making Americans wealthier and, therefore, they are more ready to pay for foreign products.

Cyclist Seriously Hurt.
Walter Munroe, a messenger boy in the employ of the City Messenger Company, was badly injured last night by a fall from his bicycle. The bicycle was thrown overboard, and he was thrown head first to the hard pavement, as he rounded the corner of Thirteenth and Morrison streets. He was rendered unconscious, and was carried to the office of Dr. J. D. Fenton. It was found that his nose was broken and his face cut and bruised almost beyond recognition.

Wintry Weather in Rome.
ROME, Jan. 1.—The year's end in Rome was marked by most inclement weather. In the North heavy snow storms block roads, and villages are in danger from avalanches. In the South, however, the persistent rain, and hail in some parts.
