Date for Fencing Tournament.
NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Delegates from the seven universities composing the Intercollegiate Fencing Association, at their second annual meeting, have decided to hold the annual team and individual championship tournament in this city at the New York Athletic Club, April 1 and 2. The competition will be conducted on the same lines as last year, each man fencing all the representatives of the competing colleges except his own.

Teams will consist of three men, and the one scoring the largest number of victories wins the championship, while the individual scoring the greatest number of wins receives the medal for the individual championship. The delegates present were from the University of Pennsylvania, Cornell, Columbia, Yale, Harvard, West Point and Johns Hopkins. An invitation to the association to send teams for competition in the World's Fair games at St. Louis next Fall during the special fencing tournament arranged by the Olympic games committee was referred to a special committee.

Senators Resent His Words.
Sam Small Has Lively Tilt With Georgians Over Canal.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—(Special).—The Georgia live issue in the Senate marble-room this afternoon, Senators Clay and Bacon and Sam Small, formerly revivists and temperance lecturers, being the participants. Small, in a card to not only himself, but the entire delegation in Congress, Senator Clay bitterly resented this threat. He declared in violent language that he had never before been so insulted. He announced himself ready for the fight of political extinction. Mr. Small threatened Senator Bacon controlled himself, and subsequently reduced Mr. Small's threat to nothing. Mr. Small pronounced the phrasology correct and signed it.

Clark Howell, editor of the Constitution, in a telegram tonight says Mr. Small in no way represented his paper, but assumed his own responsibility when he threatened the Georgia Senators.

Mr. Small has several times today shown a letter from President Roosevelt, which he signed him for the attitude of the Constitution in supporting the treaty, expressing the hope of securing ratification and naming some Democratic Senators who are expected to vote for it.

MANY MEN MADE IDLE.
Railroads Have Laid Off 18,000 in Three Months.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—Fifteen railroads in the General Managers' Association in this city report the laying off of nearly 18,000 employees during the last three months. Twenty-two in all sections of the country report that, while their gross earnings for November last were \$1,233,459 over those of November, 1929, their expenses showed an increase of \$1,014,901, making a decrease of \$218,558 in net earnings.

Many Steelworkers Again on Duty.
PITTSBURGH, Jan. 5.—During the past two weeks over 40,000 wage-earners who have been idle for months have been furnished employment by the resumption of mills in the Pittsburgh district. It is said that the demand for iron and steel products is increasing and contracts are being let more freely than at any time during the depression, which covered a period of nearly four months.

Neutral Zone Is Principal Issue.
PARIS, Jan. 5.—It developed today that the greatest difference between Russia and Japan arises from the proposal made by Russia for a neutral zone shall be established extending from Ping Yang in Korea, on the south, to the Russian frontier on the north. The Russian government has expressed its willingness to recognize the preponderating influence of Japan in the remainder of Korea, and the two powers are agreed respecting the principle of the integrity of China and of Korea.

Japan, however, sees no reason for the establishment of the proposed neutral zone, holding that the entire peninsula should be subject to her preponderating influence.

The attitude of Russia is believed to be due to the fact that if Japan controls Korea she will thereby be able more easily to move Port Arthur as well as Vladivostok. The diplomat who gave the Associated Press the foregoing information expressed himself as confident that Russia in her reply to Japan will give way on this vital point.

Says Woman Robbed Him.
At an early hour yesterday morning Alice Myers was arrested at Fourth and Davis streets on a charge of larceny from the person. F. A. Hall was the complainant. He stated that he was robbed of \$40. Officers Baty and Adams made the arrest, and state that she tried to get them to take the money back and not arrest her.

Killed by a Seattle Street-Car.
SEATTLE, Jan. 5.—Thomas Petrie, while attempting to catch a car tonight, was struck by another car coming in the opposite direction and as severely injured that he died an hour and a half later.

FIGHTS GARDINER TO DRAW

MELVIN HART PUTS UP A GREAT BATTLE AT BOSTON.

Bell Saved Both Men Several Times—Blows Lack Steam at the Last.

BOSTON, Jan. 5.—Marvin Hart and George Gardiner, of Lowell, boxed 15 rounds to a draw at the Criterion Athletic Club tonight. During the first part of the contest it looked as if Hart would win. In the second round Gardiner was knocked down twice, and only excellent blocking saved him from a knockout.

Gardiner came up strong in the third, but could not land effectively. In rounds 4 and 5 honors were even, but in the 6th Gardiner put in some terrible swings which left the Kentuckian groggy, the bell saving him from a knockout.

Hart showed his superiority in the 7th. At the opening of the 8th Gardiner, by holding, prevented his being knocked out, while at the end of the round the bell alone saved Hart. From the 9th until the 12th round the fight lagged, but then Gardiner put in some hard punches. The 14th was fast, but both men were tired and their blows lacked steam. In this round Gardiner had a slight advantage, the bell apparently saving Hart. Both boxers put up a game exhibition in the final round, and Referee Buckley decided the match a draw.

Shot by Labor Leader.
SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Jan. 5.—Simplicio Dazo, the former of a large cigar factory at Aguas Buenas, was shot and killed last night in the presence of a large crowd. The murderer was Basilio Forastero, a labor leader, who was arrested at his inability to foment a strike of cigarmakers. Forastero glories in his crime, and predicts that there will be more killings within a few days. A number of letters were found in Forastero's pocket.

Lady Maccabees' Row Decided.
LANSING, Mich., Jan. 5.—The State Supreme Court has reversed the decision of the Michigan Circuit Court in the case of the Great Hive, Ladies of the Maccabees, vs. the Supreme Hive, Ladies of the Maccabees. An order was entered by the Supreme Court enjoining the Great Hive from competing for the Supreme Hive outside of Michigan, by the use of the same ritual, secret work and other paraphernalia.

Milton Manuscript to Go at Auction.
NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—It is understood, says a Herald dispatch from London, that the Baker manuscript of Milton's "Paradise Lost," around which great controversy was waged recently, will be put up for auction January 12, at the rooms of a private having failed. Several offers were received from the United States, but it is said the highest was \$25,000, and not \$250,000, as some reports had it.

Firemen Assigned to Theaters.
NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Acting on a report made by Assistant Foreman Linehan, who has been investigating New York theaters, Fire Commissioner H. H. Smith has assigned 15 additional firemen to duty at many theaters here. He declares more men would have been stationed in the playhouses but for the law, which limits them to two men under normal conditions.

Burglars Enter House.
When H. A. Mills, 409 Chapman street, returned home last night, he discovered that burglars had been in the house. He at once notified the police, and Officers Vaughn and Hoggaborn were sent to make an investigation. Nothing was missing from the house. The entrance had been effected through the back window by means of an ax that was found.

China Supplying Its Warships.
SHANGHAI, Jan. 5.—All of China's effective warships are being supplied with ammunition and provisions, and the Chinese navy is now an effective fighting force.

Remembers Colleges in Will.
SYRACUSE, N. Y., Jan. 5.—The will of ex-Congressman James J. Heiden disposes of an estate valued at \$300,000. Local institutions are beneficiaries. The Syracuse University will receive \$100,000 and the Syracuse College of Medicine \$200,000. One million dollars is bequeathed to the widow.

Another Victim of the Fire.
CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—The fire which claimed a fresh victim today, making the total number of deaths 591. Miss Josephine Spencer was one of those severely burned during the fire. She was found by relatives and taken to her home, where she died today.

Gunboats Reach Colon.
COLON, Jan. 5.—The United States gunboat Torpedo and the torpedo-boat destroyers Dale and Stewart arrived here today. The Dale is now alongside the dock discharging stores and provisions, preparatory to the landing of mines, which probably will take place tomorrow.

Conviction Is Reversed.
CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—The conviction of John H. Dalton, who was charged with swindling nearly 700 newspapers throughout the country, has been reversed by the United States Court of Appeals.

Peasants Slay Hungarian Soldier.
BUDAPEST, Jan. 5.—Paul Brensis, a Liberal member of the Hungarian Diet, was murdered at Nagy Kikinda today by two peasants. The motive was revenge for the loss of a lawsuit brought by the father of the murderers against Brensis.

Fire Losses Establish Record.
NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—A record of loss by fire in the United States and Canada for the year just closed, compiled by the Journal of Commerce, shows a total of \$184,136,700. This is the greatest sum since 1883, with the exception of 1920 and 1921.

Cashier Charged With Forgery.
ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Jan. 5.—J. E. Marcell, cashier of the Bank of Highlands, Kan., was arrested on a Grand Island train last night at Troy, Kan., charged with forging notes aggregating \$30,000.

Associates of W. L. Garrison.
MIDFORD, Mass., Jan. 5.—Richard Price Halliwell, an abolitionist, and associate of William Lloyd Garrison, died here today.
