

NOT AFTER HUNT

Inquiry Into Money Slot-Machine Deal

BY COUNCIL COMMITTEE

Effort to Furnish Mayor With Specific Facts.

NOT A VOTE IN OPPOSITION

Committee to Inquire Into Fire Protection at Theaters—High License for Theater-Ticket Scalpers—Memorial to Cardwell.

WHAT COUNCIL DID YESTERDAY.

CHIEF HUNT—Appointed a committee of five members to investigate the complaints of slot-machine men against the Chief of Police.

THEATERS—Appointed a mixed committee to investigate fire protection in theaters and public buildings.

TICKET SCALPERS—Passed an ordinance requiring all scalpers to pay a quarterly fee of \$100.

INDIGENT VENDORS—Passed an ordinance doing away with permits for indigent hawkers and vendors.

EXPLOSIVE TOYS—Referred to health and police committee an ordinance prohibiting firing or selling of toy cannons, loaded canes, toy pistols, etc.

SEWERS—Recommended to Executive Board construction of sewer on Fourteenth, between Savier street and river front.

MEMORIAL—Adopted memorial to the late Councilman Byron P. Cardwell.

Without one dissenting voice the Council yesterday passed a resolution instructing a named committee of five to investigate the complaints of the slot-machine men that they have been bilked out of \$200 through the actions of Chief of Police Hunt.

Messrs. Albee, Fiegl, Sharkey, Sigler and Rumelin compose the committee as named in the resolution, which was presented by the committee on health and police. These five Councilmen joined in the concerted statement made to Mayor Williams last week by nine slot-machine men to the Council to the effect that they considered the removal of Chief Hunt advisable. Two Councilmen did not express their opinion last Thursday. Yesterday whatever objections Messrs. Merrill and Fowler had to the resolution were locked within their breasts, for, like the others, they did not answer the roll call, thus completing a unanimous acquiescence.

The committee on health and police is composed of Messrs. Sigler, Whiting and Albee. No Councilman's name was attached to the resolution, but it doubtless emanated from those instrumental in bringing nine Councilmen to that state of mind whereby they told the Mayor most plainly that the time had come for the dismissal of Chief Hunt.

"They might as well bring the Chief up here and hang him right now," said Merrill, after the session, to several members. "That committee will do it anyhow." And that was as near as Merrill came to objecting to the resolution. The resolution is appended. The committee on health and police is composed of Messrs. Sigler, Whiting and Albee. No Councilman's name was attached to the resolution, but it doubtless emanated from those instrumental in bringing nine Councilmen to that state of mind whereby they told the Mayor most plainly that the time had come for the dismissal of Chief Hunt.

To Guard Against Fires.

Another committee was appointed to investigate the exits of theaters and public buildings, with a view to perfect fire protection. This committee consists of A. K. Bentley as a Councilman; H. W. Goddard, as a member of the Executive Board; R. Martin, Jr., as president of the Architects' Association; J. B. Bridges, as president of the Master Builders' Association; and Chief Campbell, of the fire department. These were named by the Council and the appointment made by Mayor Williams.

Scalpers and sidewalk dealers of all kinds in theater tickets must pay a quarterly license fee of \$100. This ordinance was passed over the "noes" of Messrs. Bentley, Fiegl and Merrill.

Councilman Albee introduced an ordinance by request prohibiting the discharge of any weapon, whether loaded or not, within the city limits. Blank cartridges, loaded canes, loaded anvils, toy ramons, giant crackers and any preparation of chemicals are included in the list.

Prohibits Toy Pistols.

The second section prohibits any dealer from exhibiting or selling or offering for sale any toy pistol, blank cartridge or loaded cane, etc. The list of fireworks and other Fourth of July disturbances includes almost every device on the market. It is understood that H. W. Goddard, of the Executive Board, was instrumental in preparing the ordinance, which was referred to the health and police committee.

No more permits to indigent street vendors and hawkers will be issued. An ordinance repealing the former law was passed unanimously.

"The indigent permits work a hardship upon the dealers and are the cause of the greatest annoyance to the department," said H. R. Albee, of the license committee in fathering the ordinance.

An ordinance was introduced and referred to the ways and means committee, which specified the salary of the proposed building inspector at \$125 a month. The ordinance also includes some provisions of the new building ordinance.

A sewer on Fourteenth street, between Savier and the river front has been covered with filled-in soil and has broken, flooding the basements of the surrounding dwellings. Councilman Rumelin stated that it would cost more to repair the old sewer than to lay a new one, so the Executive Board was asked to expend the necessary money for a new sewer and a surface pipe.

The Mayor's annual message to the Council was read and referred to the ways and means committee. The list of Councilmen at Large, Sanford Whiting, upon the committees of which the late Councilman Cardwell was a member.

A Superfluous Committee.

Councilman Sharkey woke up at the mention of the street-lighting committee, which, since the formation of the Executive Board, exists more upon paper than in reality.

"Why is there a street-lighting committee?" he asked of the Mayor. "Every time any one from out in the cow-laying districts wants a new street light he

comes to me a-runin'. Then when I tell him that the Council hasn't anything to do with the rights he thinks that I am a selfish politician." But the objectionable committee remains on the list, despite Mr. Sharkey.

Councilman Rumelin, as chairman of the street committee, made a kick about the remonstrances against improvements on the East Side.

"The East Side seems to be always remonstrating," said he, as he moved that two remonstrances be placed on file. But the very next remonstrance was against an improvement on Morrison street, and the East Side representatives had the laugh for the moment on the delegate from the First Ward.

Memorial to B. P. Cardwell.

When the session opened Mr. Bentley moved that all business be suspended until the memorial to the late Councilman Byron P. Cardwell was read. Then by a rising vote the members adopted the touching tribute to their late colleague as prepared by City Auditor Devlin.

After giving a comprehensive sketch of the life of Mr. Cardwell, the memorial concludes as follows:

He was a man who observed closely, read carefully and remembered accurately. He was possessed of a comprehensive knowledge of his country and the current events of his time. He was qualified for all the positions of trust and honor to which he was called. He was deliberate in both thought and action, and just in his conclusions. His whole life bore evidence of simple tastes, sturdy virtues and clean, wholesome citizenship, which makes largely in its community influence and in the building of a nation's strength and life.

It is with a knowledge of his worth that the members of this Council represent the city he served, we mourn his loss, and in token of our respect for his memory, be it

Resolved, That the foregoing memorial be entered upon the records of this Council and an engraved copy thereof, under the seal of the City of Portland, be furnished to the family of the deceased, also that copies of the foregoing be furnished to the daily papers.

The ways and means committee was instructed to advertise for bids for \$100,000 improvement bonds. At the meeting of the committee Monday an attorney, supposedly representing a large department store company, tried to induce the committee to sell all the bonds to his clients in a lump. Several small prospective bidders were present and they objected. City Attorney McNary finally decided that the bonds should go to the bidders in the old-fashioned way, that is in small lots, according to the demand.

URGES CONGRESS TO AID.

Chamber of Commerce Indorses Lewis and Clark Fair.

At a meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon, resolutions urging Congress to pass the appropriation bill for the Lewis and Clark Fair, were adopted. Copies of them will be forwarded to Congress and to Oregon's representatives in the great law-making body.

The resolutions are as follows:

Whereas, The Lewis and Clark Centennial and American Pacific Exposition and Oriental Fair will be held in Portland, Or., in 1905; and

Whereas, We believe it will promote and further the trade relations between the United States and the Orient, and also develop and advertise the resources of the Pacific Northwest; and

Whereas, The people of Oregon, individually and through their Legislature, have subscribed nearly \$1,000,000 for this Exposition; and

Whereas, We believe it to be of National Importance and desiring the assistance of the National Government, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we hereby respectfully request Congress to pass the bill now pending before it appropriating \$2,125,000 for this Exposition.

The resolutions were adopted unanimously, and copies were ordered sent immediately to Congress and Oregon's delegation.

While the meeting was in progress the directors took advantage of the opportunity to select delegates to represent the Chamber, in the National Livestock Convention this month. The following were

chosen as delegates to the convention: B. W. Bryant, H. W. Goddard, J. B. Bridges, J. F. O'Shea, C. J. Miller, J. C. Alden, W. H. Goode, C. E. Ladd and M. D. Wisdom.

PREPARE FOR ELECTION

JUDGES AND CLERKS MUST BE NAMED THIS MONTH.

Primaries Probably In March to Allow Sixty Days Before Election—Provisions of Law.

Within the next three weeks, the reigning forces in Multnomah County will choose judges and clerks of election. The appointments will serve both in the next primary and in the next general election. The primary election has not been set by County Clerk Fields. The general election will be held June 5.

It's a pretty big job to pick out the required gentlemen to preside over the polls. Already the chiefs of the organization have turned their minds to it. They are holding frequent conferences these quiet winter nights and days. But they pretend that they have given the matter hardly so much as a single thought as yet.

The County Court is required by law to name the judges and clerks this month. As the Mitchell influence predominates, it is a foregone conclusion that gentlemen will not be chosen against the Mitchell interest. At least one judge and one clerk in each precinct must be a Democrat.

The county this year contains 83 precincts, each of which must have at least three judges and three clerks. For precincts that cast 100 or more ballots, the last general election, the County Court may appoint an additional board of judges and clerks. In the last election 10 out of 79 precincts cast 100 or more ballots.

L. R. Webster, County Judge, said yesterday that the County Court had not yet taken up the matter of judges and clerks, but that she has required their appointment this month.

The date of the primaries is yet to be fixed. The law requires County Clerk Fields to fix the date at least 90 days before June 5 and to give notice thereof at least ten days beforehand. Consequently the primaries must be held on or before April 6 and the County Clerk must give notice of the date, on or before March 15. Two years ago the primaries were held March 15.

The judges and clerks who are to be appointed will serve for the next two years. The law reads as follows:

The County Court shall, at the regular term in January preceding a general election, appoint three judges and three clerks of election for each election precinct, to serve for the period of two years and until their successors are appointed. Said judges and clerks shall each be duly qualified electors, within the precinct for which they are appointed; able to read, write and speak the English language; not a candidate for an elective office to be voted for at the ensuing election. No more than two judges and two clerks shall be members of the same political party, and they shall be appointed from two political parties which respectively cast the highest and next highest number of votes for the Presidential Electors at the last general election, or in which the County Court believes that many ballots will be cast at the next general election, the County Court may likewise, at said January term, appoint a second or additional board, consisting of three judges and three clerks for each precinct.

N. Gates, A. King Wilson, J. N. Teal, J. B. Ryan, Charles J. Schaefer, Colonel A. Miller, of Oregon City; C. E. S. Wood and Richard Wilson.

Three or four hundred of the faithful are expected to attend. Nobody is invited to attend, for everybody is welcome, whether he be a member of the Jacksonian household or not.

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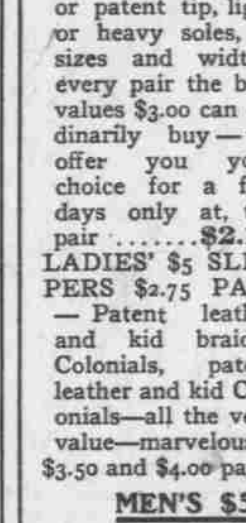
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
