Kobbe, Next Below Him, Is Picked for Major-General.

GILLESPIE GETS LIKE RANK

Paymaster-General Bates and Chief of Artillery Randolph, With the Rank of Brigadier, Are Advanced and Retired.

Randall were disappointed when the list of Army promotions sent to the Senate today did not contain his name as one of the Major-Generals. Brigadier-General Kobbe, who was next to General Randall in point of service, secured the much-coveted appointment.

CRIME COSTS HIM PENSION.
Ware Holds That Men Sent to Prison Become Legally Dead.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Commissioner of Pensions Ware today decided that a pension is a privilege, not a right, and that a man who is sentenced to prison for a crime is barred by conviction of crime and sentence to prison for life. The decision is made in the case of William B. Marsh, a convict in the house of correction in Detroit, serving a life sentence for robbing the United States mails in Idaho. Commissioner Ware holds:

"A pension is for the purpose of supporting a soldier during his disability, and is a privilege, not a right. In this case the pension is being treated as a right, and taken care of by the Government, it is fulfilling its duty to him already; and, as this is to continue during the life of the claimant for the purpose of supporting him, it is not reasonable to suppose that the case is within the purview of the statutes."

"By conviction of the crime and sentence to prison for life, the man has become civilly dead, and I do not think it is an unfair interpretation of the law to hold that when a man becomes civilly dead, he becomes dead for pensionable purposes; therefore, let the claim be rejected."

APPRaiser REFUSES TO RESIGN

General Thomas Asks Roosevelt to Tell Why He Is Being Ousted.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Although Loman T. Hoy was nominated to succeed General Horace H. Thomas, appraiser of customs at this port, the resignation of General Thomas requested by the Secretary of the Treasury has not been sent in.

General Thomas will appeal to the President to find out why his resignation was asked. In a letter from the Secretary of the Treasury calling for General Thomas' resignation it is said the purpose is not to make a place for another, and there is nothing political in the request; that the office has been temporarily examined twice, and it seems necessary to secure a vigorous administration.

General Thomas, in a reply which he made public today, along with the Secretary's letter asserts that there has not been an administrative examination.

General Thomas, in a letter to the office and they reported adversely, he would resign, but he would not resign under charges which he says he knows cannot be sustained.

POSTAL CHIEFS ARE SUED.

Man Named in Fraud Reports and Wants \$50,000 Damages.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Michael W. Louis, ex-Superintendent of the Division of Supplies in the Postoffice Department, but who was removed October 21 last as a result of the postal investigation, today entered suit for \$50,000 damages against Fourth Assistant Postmaster-General Joseph L. Bristow, Postmaster-General H. C. Payne and the Washington Post Newspaper Company.

The basis of the charge for which damages are asked is an extract from the report of General Bristow dealing with the award of contracts for the division of which Louis was the head, for ink, ink pads, etc., at alleged excessive prices. Suit of a like character for similar amounts also was brought against the Postmaster-General, Mr. Bristow and the

Evening Star, and against the Postmaster-General, Mr. Bristow and the Washington Times.

Convict Factories Are Excepted.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The Commissioner of Internal Revenue has decided that it is permissible for state prisons to manufacture tobacco or cigars for their own inmates, without paying license.

WOOLEY'S CASE PASSED UP.

President Will Decide Whether the Boise Assayer Will Be Reappointed.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 8.—Secretary Shaw is unable, after investigation into the charges that have been brought against H. Smith Wooley, of Boise, to determine whether this man, endorsed by Senator Heyburn and Representative French, should again be nominated by the President as assayer of the Boise office. He has, therefore, transmitted all papers to the President and shirked all responsibility, leaving the decision entirely with the President.

The investigation made by Treasury Inspector Ball was far from convincing, and leaves much to be desired. This report, however, is largely offset by representations made by Senator Heyburn and Representative French, who are confident when the President hears both sides he will reappoint Wooley.

For Relief of Oregon Settlers.

WARSHIPS ASSEMBLE AT COLON

Colombia Must Withdraw Her Troops or Fight.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—A fleet of warships is assembling at Colon, presumably with the purpose of making a hostile demonstration against Colombia, says a dispatch from Panama. The authorities will insist upon the withdrawal of the Colombian Army, now lined up across the border this side of the Atrato River.

Local officers feel certain that it is the intention to compel Colombia either to withdraw her troops or to fight.

All the warships are due at Colon before Tuesday, prepared to start immediately if the fighting begins. It is believed in Colon that the Colombians are ready to fight.

RELATIONS LIKELY TO CEASE.

Reyes Is Only Awaiting Reply of America to Colombia.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—General Reyes is still awaiting the State Department's reply to his request that the correspondence between him and the Washington Government regarding the Panama incident be sent to the United States Senate. General Reyes has advised from Colombia that the feeling there continues to run high against the United States, and while preparations are being made for hostilities, General Reyes has been able thus far to restrain his people from an outbreak.

It is quite probable that upon receipt of the State Department's reply to his last note, General Reyes will leave immediately for Colombia. In that event, Dr. Herran, the Colombian charge, will close the Legation and return home, thus marking the breaking off of diplomatic relations between this country and Colombia.

Dixie Lands More Marines.

COLON, Jan. 8.—The remaining force of marines from the cruiser Dixie was landed here today and will be trained by Basco. All the warships now patrolling the coast are expected to assemble in the harbor of Colon early next week.

Squadron Sails for Panama.

PENSACOLA, Fla., Jan. 8.—The Atlantic training squadron, composed of the Minneapolis, Columbia, Hartford and Yankee, sailed this afternoon for Guantanamo, from which point they will proceed to Panama to relieve vessels now stationed there.

REBELS NO LONGER HOLD OUT

San Dominican Port Taken by Government and Again Opened.

SAN DOMINGO, Republic of Santo Domingo, Jan. 4.—The town of San Pedro de Macoris has been recaptured by the government forces and again declared an open port. The insurgent troops in the suburbs of this city today sent a message to the authorities here, proposing a compromise on honorable terms. The message was answered, and the proposition was not accepted. The news received from the interior is apparently more favorable to the government.

America Prevents Bombardment.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The Navy Department today received the following cablegram from Commander Dillingham, of the cruiser Detroit, dated at Puerto Plata, Santo Domingo, January 5:

"Morales' gunboats delivered ultimatum and threatened to bombard Puerto Plata, after 24 hours' notice. With concurrence of Captain Rodgers, the USS Oregon, USS Falgout, made such representations to both sides that they have agreed, the one not to bombard, and the other not to fire on the gunboats. All fighting will be confined to land side of town in future. United States' interests secured. Have small parties landed at Sosua and at Consuelo in Puerto Plata."

MAYOR IS GUARDED

Attempt to Assassinate Harrison Is Feared.

THE HORROR WON'T DOWN

Some Hold the Executive Responsible for Countenancing Violations of Ordinances That Caused the Terrible Disaster.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—(Special).—The fact that a number of "plain clothes" policemen spend their time at night closely guarding Mayor Harrison's home in Schiller street has led to the circulation of a rumor that the life of the city executive is in peril as a result of the Iroquois fire. The Mayor denies he has received anonymous letters charging him with responsibility for "countenancing violations of ordinances that caused the disaster."

The presence of policemen in Schiller street, however, has caused neighbors of the Mayor to speak significantly of the fact. It is believed relatives of victims of the fire thought the Mayor responsible, and no one would be surprised if he were attacked.

NO PRECAUTIONS AGAINST FIRE

Engineer Swears Theater Was Practically Destitute of Equipment.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—No evidence of importance which has not been made public was obtained at the Coroner's inquest over the victims of the Iroquois fire today. The most important witness of the day was Engineer Murray, of the theater, whose testimony showed the theater was practically destitute of protection against fire; that no precautions had been taken, and no instructions had ever been given to any of the attaches.

Two more names were added today to the list of victims of the fire, Nellie Dawson, 27, and Estelle Muir, 21 years, both died in hospitals. The deaths today make a total of 566 fatalities due to the fire.

Engineer Murray declared there was one stamper on the stage, two in the basement and one in the smoking-room. There was no hose attached to any of them.

Although there was hose in the building, it was not used. The hose in the building consisted of one coil, and was locked in the smoking-room at the front of the building. The only way in which an alarm could reach the first department was by the use of the telephone.

Ruth Michael, a school girl, testified that when she and other members of her party noticed sparks dropping from above the stage they started to go out, but a gentleman sitting in the front row rose and said he would knock their heads off if they did not sit down. The girls sat down and remained in their seats until the fire broke out.

Madeline Dupont, one of the girls in the double act, which was on the stage at the time the fire broke out, was positive in her statement that the curtain which was lowered was the asbestos curtain. This curtain was painted with red stripes, and the curtain which had upon it an Autumn scene and which previous witnesses had declared was the asbestos curtain, was the curtain that burned.

Miss Dupont was emphatic in her evidence that the curtain which was lowered did not burn, but the bandits, with instructions to "shoot to kill," four crack shots of the Police Department were on guard in the Criminal Court building to prevent any attempt to rescue the street-car hand.
