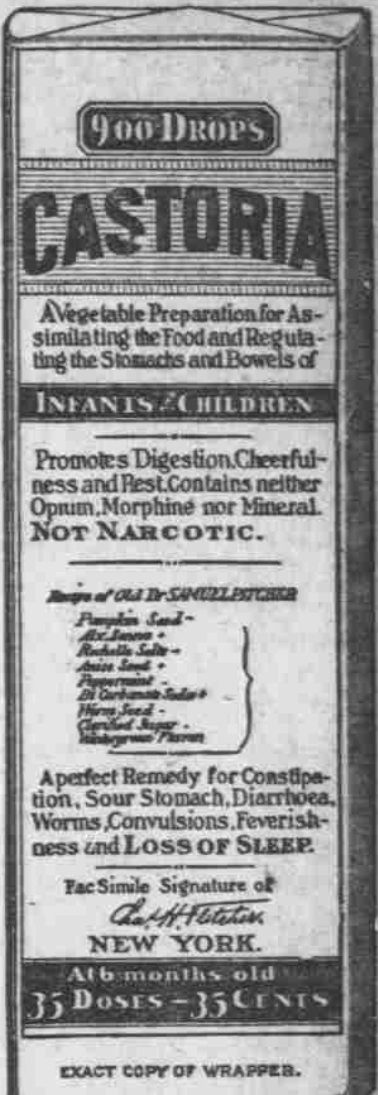
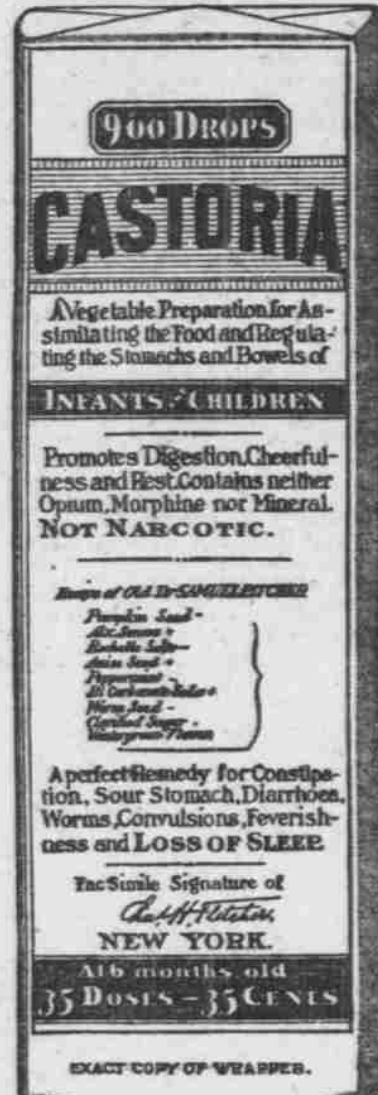

KILLED BOTH MEN

Shockley Confesses Murder of Conductor and Motorman.

PROFESSES GREAT PENITENCE

Wants to Give His Property to the Heirs of His Salt Lake Victims—Did Not Intend to Kill.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 10.—Filled with remorse and broken in spirit by the persistent questioning by the police, John M. Shockley, confessed murderer of the conductor and motorman of the Utah & Northern Pacific train, yesterday afternoon confessed the murder of Motorman Gleason and Conductor Bright, who were shot and killed by a lone highwayman, who attempted to rob them in their car late Wednesday night.

The confession was made to Warden Wright, Chief of Police Lynch and Detective Radey at the State Penitentiary, where Shockley has been confined since Thursday night, when a mob of enraged street men made an unsuccessful attempt to batter down the doors of the city prison in order to get the prisoner and lynch him.

In his confession Shockley declares he had no intention of killing his victims, but they put up such a vicious fight when he attempted to rob them that he was forced to shoot them in self-defense. After the tragedy, he says, he contemplated suicide, but his nerve failed him when he put the pistol to his head.

Shockley says he is heir to considerable property, and he wants to sign this over without reserve to aid the families of his victims. He says his parents live in St. Mary's County, Missouri. Evidence which Shockley placed at the disposal of the officers goes far to prove the truth of his confession.

In a second confession Shockley admits that he participated in a hold-up last July, in which he fired several shots at the conductor.

NO REGRET FOR MURDER.

Californian Deliberately Shoots Man Who, He Says, Wronged Him.

AUBURN, Cal., Jan. 10.—Thomas Gostlin shot and killed Ed Armstrong last night on the eastbound Overland. The only statement Gostlin makes is that he was not sorry that he killed Armstrong, for he had ruined him and broke up the family, that Armstrong had been harassing him for the past two years, and had caused the gray hairs in his head.

The trouble is supposed to be over a mining lawsuit now pending which was to have come off tomorrow. Gostlin went to Sacramento yesterday morning and got on the return train the same evening. He came into the coach where Armstrong was apparently asleep, and without warning fired three shots, two taking effect, and killing him instantly.

YOUNG GIRL'S SUICIDE

BLOWS OUT HER BRAINS WITH PISTOL BULLET.

Was About to Be Taken to a Reformatory on Account of Her Waywardness.

BUTTE, Mont., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Agnes Holland, a beautiful 16-year-old girl, blew her brains out late last night, after being taken from a ballroom by one of the Sheriff's officers and being threatened with a term in the House of the Good Shepherd, a girl's reformatory at Helena. The girl is said to have been of a wayward disposition and beyond the control of her parents, who had twice placed their daughter in the reformatory, and each time she has managed to escape from the sisters.

Information reached the parents' ears that the girl was drinking with men, and an officer was dispatched to the ballroom to get her. When they reached home the girl asked to be allowed to go to her room for a moment. She could be heard groping about in the dark, and then a sound of pistol was heard.

There was but one accident, Miss Jessie Boyd was struck in the face with a club and her forehead was cut open. She swooned, but a physician who was present dressed her wound, and tonight she is resting easy. There were present about 500 people, and they enjoyed a most pleasant outing.

BUY METHODIST CHURCH.

Regular Priest Will Soon Be Installed at Union—School to Be Built.

LA GRANDE, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The sale of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Union has been closed, having been purchased by the Catholic people of that vicinity. Both denominations are holding services in the building until the members of the Methodist Episcopal Church have made other arrangements.

Father Reade, of La Grande, is holding services at Union until a permanent priest is located at that place, and a Catholic school will also be erected there soon.

POLICE FIND MEN GAMBLING.

CORVALLIS IS HORRIFIED BY DISCOVERY IN Confectionery Store.

CORVALLIS, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The police raided the confectionery store of Small & Son last night and surprised a stud-poker game in full operation. The result is a sensation, as there has been no gambling in Corvallis for years, either in or out of saloons, there being an overwhelming sentiment against gaming in the town.

Grand Ronde Flour for China.

LA GRANDE, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The three large flouring mills at Union County, which are all under the same management, Island City, Union and La Grande, have received orders for 5000 barrels of flour to be shipped to China, which means 15 carloads. The three mills have a total capacity of 200 barrels or two cars per day.

Disciples Regarded With Curiosity.

ENTERPRISE, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—A couple of disciples of the Reorganized Church of Christ of Latter-day Saints have been holding a series of meetings in this town. They are the first of this sect that have ever visited this country and the people regard them as rather a curiosity.

Church Dedication at Centralia.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The new \$5000 Methodist Episcopal Church was dedicated here today as the sequel to exercises held every night last week, since Wednesday. The sermon today was delivered by Bishop J. W. Hamilton.

DEATH BY HIS OWN HAND.

Dependent Youthful Lover Evidently First Tried to Kill Girl and Father.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The mystery of the death of Rand Corley at Tyler yesterday was cleared up today by unmistakable evidence of suicide. The youth was years of age and loved Beside Harris, of Tyler. Parental objection had made Corley dependent, and he had threatened to end his life.

As Judge Harris and his daughter were walking down a side street last night three shots passed close to their heads. Half an hour later Corley's dead body was found behind a building, a revolver still in his hand. His footprints were traced back to where he had evidently shot at his sweetheart and her father.

BOUGHT BY OREGON MEN.

Napa Woolen Mill Will Be Used for the Manufacture of Shoddy.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The Napa woolen mill property, at Napa, Cal., has been sold to J. D. Ladd, of Eugene, Or., and F. Carter, of Portland, Or. The new owners will at once commence equipping it with machinery for the manufacture of shoddy.

Much of the old machinery in the mill, which was sold to the Stockton Woolen mill, has been taken out, so new machinery will have to be installed in its place. It will be several months before the mill is in operation.

ASSAY RUNS VERY HIGH.

Molalla Mine Will Install a Two-Stamp Mill.

OREGON CITY, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the board of directors of the Molalla Central Mining Company, held in this city last night, it was decided to install at once at the company's mine on Ogilvie Creek a two-stamp mill having a capacity of 15 tons per 24 hours. The action on the part of this mining corporation found justification principally in the returns of a recent assay of ore taken from the mine by an expert. It assayed as follows:

Lowest grade, \$18.75; next grade, \$23.94; full test across the ledge, \$30.03; lower half of stratum, \$54.45; selected samples, \$77.11.

CHILD KILLED AT PLAY

STRIKES HEAD AGAINST A SHARP DOOR CASING.

Grant's Pass Girl's Sudden Death While Playing at Hide-and-Seek With Playmates.

GRANT'S PASS, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Edith Mordena died last night, the result of an accident that occurred in the forenoon. The girl, who was about 12 years old, was playing hide-and-seek with other companions at her home, and at the time was running up the porch steps to hide in the house.

BUTTONS FOR MERIT.

System Used With Satisfactory Results in Clark County.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Clark County Superintendent Pritchard says that the schools of this vicinity are in excellent condition. The enrollment is quite satisfactory, and the attendance better than for some time.

In order to increase the percentage of attendance and fix it at a higher standard, there has been established for this purpose two systems which are known as the "button system" and the "diploma system." The results of each of these methods are reported to be highly satisfactory.

In the "button system" five buttons suitable for pinning on the coat lapels are used. Three of these are labeled respectively, punctuality, deportment and scholarship, and are given out to the scholars securing a specified grade in these different branches. A still larger button is given which signifies that the scholar has attained a satisfactory percent in each of the branches mentioned at the same time. When he has been able to wear this fourth button a designated length of time, usually about a month, he is given in return for the one so secured, the largest button of the set, called the "diamond button." In its design is embodied all the other buttons of the set. The scholar who has attained this is termed a "diamond-button scholar," and is allowed to keep this as his own property, the others necessitating his good behavior in order to retain them.

The "diploma system" is upon similar basis, small slips or certificates being issued to deserving pupils, a number of which may be exchanged for a large certificate of merit.

The object of these systems is to stimulate the pupils to create greater self-control and to acquire greater power toward self-government. The results have been so satisfactory with these methods that they may be deemed worthy of a trial by counties which have not established such a system.

BIG SLIDE AT BUGGY CHUTES.

Track of A. & C. R. R. Covered Fifteen Feet Deep for 200 Yards.

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Another big land slide occurred at an early hour this morning on the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad near Buggy Chutes. The track is covered to a depth of 15 feet for a distance of fully 200 feet, and it will be a couple of days before the line can be cleared.

Transfers of passengers and baggage are now being made on every train.
