JOIN PEACE MOVE

Members of Congress Form
Arbitration "Group."

BILL WILL BE INTRODUCED

New Organization Will Lend All Sup-
port to the Union Now Work-
ing for a Treaty Between
America and Britain.WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—An American
"group" to be affiliated with the Inter-
Parliamentary Union for international
arbitration was organized tonight at a
meeting held in the lobby of the
House of Representatives. About 40 mem-
bers of the Senate and House of Repre-
sentatives became members.The session was called to order by Rep-
resentative Bartholdt, who was elected
chairman. The United States, he said,
was the only nation not having a "group"
of parliamentarians affiliated with the In-
ter-Parliamentary Union for international
arbitration. This Union, he said, had de-
cided to hold its 12th annual conference
at St. Louis during the first week in Sep-
tember next. It was, he said, not only
fitting, but necessary that a group of pa-
rlamentarians, consisting of Senators and
members of the House of Representatives
be organized, and to have a resolution
extending an invitation to the union and
making an appropriation of \$500 to de-
fray the expenses of the session agreed
to by Congress. The first business, he
said, was to organize a "group."On motion of Representative Shafroth,
of Colorado, the meeting resolved to or-
ganize a group.Mr. Bartholdt presented a concurrent
resolution for adoption by the "group" to
be introduced in Congress. The resolu-
tion extended the invitation to the In-
ternational Union for international arbitra-
tion, and made the necessary appointment.Thomas Barclay, of London, an ex-
member of the English Parliament, was
heard briefly. He explained that the Brit-
ish House of Commons had formed a
"committee" instead of a "group," and
suggested the possibility of soundings the
American Congress and the British Par-
liament on the project of a joint session
of the parliamentary "group" just organ-
ized here, and the "committee" of Great
Britain to establish even more cordial re-
lations between the two countries. Rep-
resentative Bartholdt made the statement
that President Roosevelt was in hearty
favor of the organization of the "group."Representative Hitt, of Illinois, chair-
man of the committee on foreign affairs,
predicted that the movement for peace
would find enthusiastic favor with the
people of this country. He said he be-
lieved that the House would agree to Mr.
Bartholdt's resolution when it was ex-
plained. It meant relief from the great
burden of taxation for supporting armies.
Representative Hepburn, of Iowa, sup-
ported the idea. He said that fully one-
fourth of the Federal taxation had been
expended for war. Over 400,000 of the
youths of the country had died in a
single war. This war cost in treasure
\$5,000,000,000 of dollars, and since that time
\$3,000,000,000 had been paid in pensions.The committee will draft a platform and
obtain the signatures of the members
present.

THREE-CENT FARES ASSURED.

Cleveland Railway Company Will
Ratify Ordinance Today.CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 13.—An agree-
ment between Mayor Johnson and the
officials of the Cleveland Electric Com-
pany for the establishment of the 3-cent
fare in the city, in accordance with
the terms of the McKenna ordinance
passed by the City Council Monday night,
will be ratified by the directors of the
railroad company at a meeting which has
been called for tomorrow afternoon.The McKenna ordinance, it was learned
today, was drawn with the full cogni-
zance and full consent of the railroad
officials. It provides for a straight 3-cent
fare within certain limits.The result of a careful study of the
passengers now carried on the lines of
the company shows that 85 per cent will
pay three cents, 12 per cent five, and
3 per cent ten cents.

GREAT FIRE AT HAVRE.

Wind Fans Montana Blaze Which
Causes \$180,000 Loss.BUTTE, Mont., Jan. 14.—A Miner
special from Havre says: Fire started in
the Bank Saloon last night and for sev-
eral hours the town was threatened with
destruction, but at 2:30 this morning the
fire was reported under control, though
still burning. A high wind raged dur-
ing the fire, which was fought under
great difficulties.The Bank Saloon and an entire block
of other buildings, including several sa-
loons, laundries, a bakery, two drug
stores and many small houses, were de-
stroyed. Two hotels were imperiled for
a time.The loss is probably \$180,000, with fair
insurance. The town is in darkness, the
fire in some manner having deranged the
lighting system. No one was hurt.

Southern Pacific Official Resigns.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—The resigna-
tion of Newton H. Foster, manager's
assistant, was announced at Southern Pa-
cific headquarters today. Mr. Foster re-
signs to become purchasing agent of the
San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Rail-
way.

Cost of the Humbert Prosecution.

PARIS, Jan. 12.—Emile Daurignac's wife
has obtained a judicial order for separa-
tion or property. During the proceedings
the fact was brought out the costs of the
prosecution of the Humberts were \$28,000.

Transport From Manila.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—The United
States transport Sheridan has arrived
from Manila with the Twenty-eighth In-
fantry on board.

TRY ANOTHER GAS BUOY

ATTEMPT WILL AGAIN BE MADE
TO LIGHT COLUMBIA'S MOUTH.Lighthouse Tender Manzanita Will
Visit Alaskan Waters—Com-
pletion of the Heather.A new gas buoy, to take the place of the
one disabled at the mouth of the Col-
umbia, is about to be shipped from the
East and will be here in a month. The
new buoy is of a special type and will
probably overcome the disadvantages suf-
fered by former gas buoys at that point.
The trouble heretofore has been that the
old buoys would not stand up under the
strong ebb tide, but the new one is of a
different type and is expected to be able
to resist the current. It will have a
whistle as well as a flash light. The old
buoy is still holding on to its anchor, but
will be removed as soon as the weather
moderates.The lighthouse tender Manzanita re-
mains at Astoria waiting for the gale to
subside, so she can proceed north. It is
the intention of Captain C. G. Kalkins, the
lighthouse inspector, to make the trip on
her. After inspecting Puget Sound lights
and buoys, the tender will go to Alaska
to replace the buoys in Wrangell Straits,
and Captain Kalkins will inspect the four
light stations in those waters.The tender Heather is at the foot of
East Oak street, where mariners are in-
stalling the steering engine, steam wind-
lass, capstan, etc. The tender was turned
over to the lighthouse board before she
was fully completed, and this opportunity
was taken to finish up the work. It will
be about two weeks longer before the boat
is ready for service.

DUEL TO THE DEATH.

Sailors Fight With Knives on French
Ship Vercoingtorix.SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—Two sailors
on the French ship Vercoingtorix, now
lying in this harbor, fought a duel to the
death with sailors' knives on the deck of
the vessel at midnight. As a result of their
battle Vincent Lemerle lies at the morgue
and Vincent Lecorves is charged with the
responsibility for his death.It is said that the men had quarreled
frequently during the voyage and had
agreed to fight out their differences when
port was reached. After the encounter
Lecorves made his escape and Lemerle
was taken to the City and County Hospi-
tal, where he died. Lecorves was after-
ward arrested and lodged in the city
prison on a charge of murder.The Vercoingtorix arrived here on the
last day of the year from Australia, and
will leave in a few days for Portland,
where she is to receive a cargo of wheat.

Steam Schooners Take Lumber.

The steamer Aurelia has arrived from
San Francisco with 4000 sacks of cement,
which were discharged at the foot of Oak
street. The steamer Alliance, which is
the Portland Lumber Company's mill to
load lumber for the Bay City. The
steamer Prentiss has gone to the Oregon
Water Power & Railway Company's dock
to take lumber. The C. C. Lindauer is
working at Juman, Poulsen & Co.'s and
will finish today.

Red Star Liner Disabled.

PORTLAND, Me., Jan. 13.—The steamer
Cornishman, which arrived today from
Liverpool, reports that on January 3 she
sighted the Red Star Line steamer Noord-
land, from Liverpool for Philadelphia, in a
disabled condition. The Noordland was
hove to during a gale and displayed two
red lights, signaling that she was un-
manageable. Owing to the heavy seas the
Cornishman lost sight of her.The captain of the Cornishman said the
Noordland appeared to be weathering thegale safely, and he believes she must have
made temporary repairs.The Noordland sailed from Liverpool on
December 30.NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—The Noordland
ordinarily makes the run between Liver-
pool and Philadelphia in about 11 days.
Above Albany, it is evident that the great
last few days have experienced severe
gales nearly all the way across the At-
lantic and under the circumstances, the
Noordland is now about two days behind
her regular schedule.

Passenger Rates Also Higher.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—The trans-
Pacific steamer commerce of this port,
consisting of the Pacific Mail, Occidental
& Oriental and the Toyon Ken Kalsba,
has announced a big increase in passenger
and freight rates, to take place in Febru-
ary. Flour shipments will be advanced
to \$4, general merchandise to \$3, and
steamer rates for Asiatics \$45.

River Still Rising.

The river continues to rise, recording a
stage of ten feet at this point yesterday.
It came up 1.3 feet in the past 24 hours,
but as a fall is reported at every point
above Albany, it is evident that the crest
of the flood is nearly here. Should another
rain storm come before the freshet has
run out, it is probable the lower docks
along the water front may be covered.

Gale Still High Off River.

ASTORIA, Or., Jan. 13.—(Special.)—The
severe gale still continues off the mouth of
the river and the bar is very rough. The
steamers Columbia and Alliance crossed
out this morning, but the Oregon is still
anchored in the lower harbor and will
probably remain there until morning.

Lake Steamer Missing.

PORT STANLEY, Ont., Jan. 13.—Anxi-
ety is felt regarding the whereabouts of
the ferry Sprague, with a crew of 21,
which left here on January 2, but has
not reached Conneaut yet. The vessel had
provisions for only nine days.

The Port of Portland Commission will
hold its regular monthly meeting this af-
ternoon.The steamer Queen has gone down to
St. Helens to take the lumber schooner
Costs to Astoria.The Gleneslin has shifted from Ban-
field's dock to the Eastern Lumber Com-
pany's mill and will begin loading Friday.The six-masted steel schooner William
L. Douglass, Captain McLean, says the
Nacual Gazette, arrived in Boston re-
cently from Norfolk. Left on her maiden trip
with cargo. The Douglass was built by the
Fore River Ship & Engine Company for the
Coastwise Transportation Company, and
is the only steel six-master afloat.She brought in 5000 tons of coal on a draft
of 24 feet 6 inches.

sence, Cretien entered the house and seized
Madame Trouille. After a violent strug-
gle, he threw her out of the window, kill-
ing her instantly. Cretien was arrested,
and was with difficulty saved from being
lynched.Madame Trouille was 22 years old, and
had been married only two months.

MUST NOT EXCEED SCHEDULE.

Eastern Road Will Not Allow Trains
to Make Up Lost Time.CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—The Chicago &
Northwestern Railroad has issued an
order that under no circumstances shall
passenger trains exceed their schedule
speed. No matter how late a train may
be, the engineer must not make up time
by running faster than his schedule calls
for. All trains that become late on any
portion of their trip must arrive at des-
tinations late. The explanation is made
that the management does not care to
risk disaster which might occur on ac-
count of fast running to make up lost
time.

FIGHT REDUCTION IN WAGES.

Mineworkers Decide to Call Strike at
Steel-Trust Properties.PITTSBURGH, Jan. 13.—At today's ses-
sion of No. 5, United Mineworkers, the
convention passed the following:
"That a strike be inaugurated at all
mines operated by the United States Steel
Corporation in this district, and also in
the coke regions; that we place all our
force of officers and organizers in the
coke regions for the purpose of enforce-
ing a strike at all of this company's
plants in the Connellsville region, where
reductions have already been made."
