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POSTAGE ON NEW YEAR'S EDITION.

Five cents is the postage on the Annual Oregonian to all parts in the United States, Canada and Mexico. As originally designed the weight of the paper would require a postage of 4 cents a copy. At the hour of publication, however, it was found necessary to increase the size of the paper, a number of papers addressed to outside parties are held at the Portland Postoffice for lack of sufficient postage. The Postmaster says that they will be dispatched if parties mailing them will supply the postage which, in each case, are wanting.

COUNTRY WHICH CHIEFS FOR RAIN—People who have been complaining of the cloudy weather and the timely and fertilizing showers of the last week or two should take a run down to the San Diego and Santa Barbara region of California, where there has been no rain since last April.

There is a large tract of peat land there, where the peat is entirely raised yearly. The growers of celery are in a bad fix this season as their crop is one-third ruined already, and if they do not get rain soon they will be entirely ruined. The seedling orange crop is also about ruined there as the oranges are offered for sale here now at 80 cents a full box, containing 25 small oranges. The supply of seedling celery from that section has also failed, while here in Portland farmers are still bringing in wagon loads of fine, solid heads of cabbage which have been growing all winter.

It is better to have rain occasionally, as happens in Oregon, than to go without any for nearly a year and to see the crops and the country dry and away before one's eyes. While a reporter was making a note of these facts on Front street yesterday, a big, husky house fly came buzzing along and settled down in the reporter's eye, on which flies are not found generally; but everything goes in Oregon.

ANY SMALL BIRD IS AN ORTOLAN—A man who has a taste for all sorts of delicacies and who has lately had the pleasure of dining at a restaurant or hotel, is anxious to know what kind of birds are. The name ortolan is more general than specific, and includes any kind of small bird that can be caught in large numbers, as the money buntings which come in large flocks, and in England the wheat ear, or in the United States the reed bird or bobolink. There are all occasionally abundant in large numbers, put up and fattened to tickle the palates of epicures. Any small bird that can be caught in large numbers and fattened will do the trick. An ortolan, even meadow larks and grove larks are sometimes used, and it is said that the common British sparrow, so numerous in the United States, makes a delicate morsel. Probably most people would prefer to wait till they had been fed and fattened in confinement a while before feasting on them, for they are not at all particular as to their diet. And who would snare and kill or eat a lot of the pretty bobolinks, or meadow larks which enliven and beautify the meadows of Spring, ought to be sent to a diet of bread and water for a year.

WILL HAVE A MAP FOR A SIGN—The large plate-glass window in the front of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway Company's office, at the corner of Third and Alder streets, is now ornamented in a few days with an expensive sign in the form of the Rock Island map of the world, at an expense of \$500. Three artists, sign painters are on their way from New York to do the work, which is quite out of the usual line of sign painting. Recently when these men were painting a sign of this kind in the Rock Island Company's office at St. Paul, much credit was collected to admire the unique work that the street was blocked and the police had to be called on to relieve the situation. General John Coulter, who has to have one of these signs on each of the plate-glass fronts of the office, but the map, which is perfect in detail, and illuminated with fine color work and gold, is so expensive that only one is placed in each city.

SHOOTING AT BLUE ROCKS—The prospects are that the blue-rock shooting at Riverside next Sunday will surpass anything of the kind ever seen here. There were 24 shooters at the last year's blue rock shooting, and 300 blue rocks were thrown from the targets and some fine shooting was done. The participants say it is better fun than shooting ducks and geese, and is delighted with it. In shooting blue rocks, one does not have to be out half the night, nor sit slivering in a blind for hours, but can shoot his string, test his skill and get home and cleaned up to spend the evening. It is expected that at least 50 sportsmen will participate in the shoot next Sunday and there are some crack shots from the East here who will take a hand.

FISH & GAME ASSOCIATION TO MEET—A meeting of the Oregon Fish & Game Association will be held in the hall of the Oregon Mining Stock Exchange, Chamber of Commerce building, on Tuesday evening, January 13, at 8 P. M. sharp. All sportsmen and others interested are invited to attend. After a short business meeting there will be a smoker, at which brief but interesting addresses will be delivered by prominent sportsmen, as follows: Dr. E. F. Tucker, "Field Trials"; Dr. James A. Taylor, "Upland Birds in Oregon"; Captain Jesse Barker, "A. A. Game Protection"; Dr. New Churchman, "The Trout of Oregon"; F. V. Holman, "Amateur Shooting."

RUBBISH AMONG CHINESE RUBBIS—The work of cleaning up the rubbish out of the burned Bacon-Sherlock block is proceeding as fast as possible. George W. Weidner, who is in charge, says that the amount of refuse and rubbish in the ruins is something to make one shudder. Under one staircase two loads of rubbish were found. This is enough to jar one's belief in sanitation, for the Chinese who live among such heaps of rubbish live just as long as other people in sanitary homes. It might be remarked that the other people, if obliged to live among so much rubbish, would not desire to tarry long in this world.

AFTER LICENSE DELINQUENTS—The days of grace allowed in which to pay city license expired on Monday and now the license collectors are on the trail of delinquents. Only few saloonkeepers have not paid. One paid on January 12 and was much ashamed to see that date stamped on his license. He begged to have the "12" scratched out, saying he always used to pay on the first, and his friends when they saw that he had not paid till the 12th, would think he was in a bad condition financially. Lawyers have also paid up pretty well, but a lot of people will have to be looked up.

CONCRETE NAME OF OREGON GRAPES.

Complaint is made by an amateur horticulturist because some people insist on calling the Oregon grape the state flower—Oregon holly, when using the beautiful foliage for decorations. The complainant says the leaf does not resemble that of the holly, being much more beautiful, as it can be procured in all shades of green, bronze and crimson, so that the leaves can be used to make up a flower of variegated colors. To this it is replied that the plant does not bear any resemblance to a grape, except in producing spikes of berries which are of the color of some grapes. The complainant desires the Oregonian to put a stop to the Oregon grape being called Oregon holly. This is rather difficult, since the plant is neither a grape nor a holly. It is a sort of an anomaly as a state flower, but has been chosen on account of its beautiful foliage so handy for decorations and more particularly because it is an indigenous plant peculiar to Oregon. How would it do to let every one who admires and uses the foliage to call the plant whatever he pleases? The plant under any other name will be just as beautiful.

CONTRACTORS MUST WAIT—Several contractors who called at the City Auditor's office to secure pay for sidewalk work completed early in December found that while the city usually pays its bills promptly, it cannot pay at all when it has no money. The vouchers had been handed in from the Engineer's office, but they could not be found. Finally the vouchers were found in a basketful of papers on Deputy Engineer's desk, who said they had been put there with others which there was no money to pay. The work had unfortunately been done just after the appropriation of last year for such work had been exhausted, and the appropriation for this year has not yet been made. It cannot be made until the next meeting of the Council on January 20, and then it will be February 5 before the Executive Committee will approve the bills.

SUDDEN DEATH OF AN OLD MAN—While reading a periodical in the reading-room of the Men's Resort, 6 North Sixth street, yesterday afternoon, William Morgan, fell from his chair and died before medical assistance could be obtained. Dr. C. F. Candian decided that paralysis of the heart was the cause of death. Morgan was old and has been growing feeble. Mr. Morgan was well known by patrons of the Men's Resort. He was a devout worker for Christianity and in his clothing were found clippings from his favorite passages in some religious article, besides \$40 in cash and checks. He had been janitor at the resort for seven years and never took a day of absence from his duties. Morgan was a native of Maine and was born in 1825. He was a member of the W. C. T. U. and, though for three years he had been more or less confined to the house, his faculties have been unimpaired and he took an active interest in the W. C. T. U. work. HIGH WATER IS HARD ON TUGS—The rise of two feet in the Willamette, owing to the late rain and the unusually low stage of the water, has made a great difference in the work of towing log rafts. The current was so strong Monday evening that a raft made a tug puff and puff to move it. Yesterday morning a tug with a small raft was fairly stalled trying to get through Madison street draw, and it was impossible at times to gain a foot. The increased flow of water has started the small running in the Columbia and quite a shipment was received here yesterday, not enough, however, to reduce the price below 25 cents a pound.

CONCERT BY JUBILEE SINGERS—The well-known Flak Jubilee Singers, consisting of four women and four men, all colored, gave an enjoyable concert last night at the Y. M. C. A. hall, as one of the attractions of this winter's star course. The audience was an enthusiastic one and insisted on encooring nearly every number on the programme. The personnel of the singers, Mrs. Maggie Porter Cole, Miss Hattie Carson, Miss Cora Carr Cole, Miss Imogen Cloutier Cole, Cantwell McGee, Clarence J. Thomas, H. W. Hamilton and Alexander Allen, began their selection with "Steal Away to Jesus" and "Jingle Bells." The voices of the singers are of good quality, and blend well.

DEATH OF MRS. CATHERINE COSTELLO—Mrs. Catherine Costello, an Oregon pioneer, died at 106, at her residence at 414 Columbia street, Portland, died in the 71st year of her age at her home yesterday morning. She was a native of County Clare, Ireland, and came to this country in 1840. She was a member of the Oregonian church, and was a sufferer only a short time. She is survived by her husband, John Costello, a daughter, Mrs. F. Meagher, and a sister, Mrs. J. H. Myers, of Goldendale, Wash.

CAPTAIN CLOTHIER REINSTATED—Captain A. W. Clothier, of Company C, Third Infantry, Oregon National Guard, who lost his stripe on December 20, 1899, for failure to pay his quarterly assessments, has been restored to his position by an order dated January 12. The occasion of the restoration is his payment of the dues for failure to meet which he was removed. During his temporary removal First Lieutenant L. A. Bowman was in command of his company.

ADD ANOTHER EXIT

Only Defect Found in Marquam-Grand Theater.

INSPECTED BY COMMITTEE

Balcony Must Have Outlet to Sixth Street, but Otherwise Building is Safe From Fire-Winter Garden Passes Muster.

One exit for every 100 persons was what the inspection committee of the City Council was most surprised to find in the Marquam-Grand Theater yesterday. But yet another exit from the balcony was wanted. The committee is that those who have humbly sat in the balcony during the performance like to mingle with the higher-priced downstairs crowd and pass out the main entrance upon Morrison street with their valets, however, must be overcome if it is necessary to have absolute fire protection, believes the committee.

The committee was up with the larks yesterday morning. Its members had expected to examine Corday's and the Arcade Theater, but passing by the wide entrance to the Marquam they changed their minds. In the minds of the committee had been the preconceived idea that the Marquam was not altogether safe from sudden fire. It went to the balcony with that thought. But once inside, there appeared exits which had never been noticed or heard of. And over each outlet was an illuminated sign, "exit," in letters large enough to cause a perturbed panic-stricken crowd to see.

Before the managers knew just what was happening the committee was in their midst. The balcony seats coming out of W. T. Fangle could do was to follow the committee about and answer questions. There was no such thing as leading the members of that committee. W. R. Roberts, a day of the balcony, was in the inspector, in particular wanted to see everything. If there was a hole in the wall Roberts wanted to find out for himself what was in that hole; if a piece of loose wire protruded he followed it up. He swung himself from the fire hose wheels to see if they would work; when he found one in the balcony that was rusted he looked amply satisfied.

Councilman A. K. Bentley told Mr. Heilig that another exit should be opened from the balcony leading upon Sixth street. This was to be a permanent means of leaving the house and not an emergency exit.

"But the people who sit in the balcony always want to go out the front way. They don't want to be sent coming out of the balcony part of the house," replied Mr. Heilig. But the chairman of the inspection committee told him that he had better make the experiment.

"Somebody must have a crowd of people go out the exits just to see how they'll take it," said Mr. Heilig, and the committee thought that was a good idea. In all, there are 19 exits from the Marquam, counting those from the stage. On the first floor there are two exits besides the main entrance. Four exits and the stage door lead to the balcony. The same condition exists in the gallery, where the largest number of persons can be seated. R. Martin, Jr., who represents the Architectural Association upon the inspection committee, took notes of a number of minor improvements suggested, and these will be acted upon at the next committee meeting. J. B. Bridges, president of the Master Builders' Association, is busy in Vancouver and cannot accompany the committee, although a member of it.

From the roof to the room under the stage went the committee. Even the attic was visited by means of a ladder placed at an alarming angle. Mr. Bentley clambered through a trap door and descended the fire escape. Chief Campbell asked questions about fire appliances, and H. W. Goddard was another inquisitive man.

After the Marquam examination the committee went to the Winter Garden, at Third and Morrison streets. Though there is practically but one exit, there was no time to burn and the committee had small fault to find.

FAVORS DIRECT PRIMARY.

Clackamas Pomona Will Circulate Petitions for New Nominating System.

Pomona Grange, of Clackamas County, at its quarterly convention in Oswego Grange Hall yesterday, began a campaign in favor of the direct primary law and advocated a special agricultural exhibit while the National Grange is in session at Portland, in November, 1904. At noon a bountiful repast was served by members of Oswego Grange.

In the afternoon officers were installed by Mrs. E. A. Niblin, of Multnomah County, as follows: Master, William Griesenthwaite; overseer, J. W. Thomas; lecturer, George Workman; Steward, William Beard; assistant steward, H. Glover; chaplain, O. A. Eaton; treasurer, T. L. Turner; secretary, C. E. Spence; gatekeeper, E. Bates; Ceres, Della Gutridge; Pomona, Margie Johnson; Flora, E. B. Thomas.

Secretary C. E. Spence called attention to the direct primary law campaign and urged that the Pomona Grange start the work of circulating the petition in Clackamas County. The master was authorized to appoint a committee of one from each of the 15 Granges in Clackamas County to circulate the petition.

Mrs. Maggie A. Johnson, of Milwaukie, presented a resolution passed by Milwaukie Grange, favoring preparation of an agricultural exhibit to be displayed while the National Grange is in session at Portland. Mrs. Mary S. Howard, state secretary, said the National Grange wanted to come to Portland in 1904, and the only obstacle was the lack of hotel accommodations for the delegates, but she said she thought that by November facilities would be provided. Mr. J. A. Smith, of the state, said that Richard Scott, one of the state, Lewis and Clark Fair Commissioners, had remarked that the Administration building would probably be ready, and that the seasons of the National Grange might be held there. A resolution was carried declaring it to be the unanimous sentiment of Clackamas County Pomona that an agricultural exhibit be prepared. It was suggested by Mrs. A. Johnson and T. E. A. Sellwood that a creditable display can be gathered from the local fairs, which will be held in October, and also from the state fair.

A resolution was passed directing the secretary to ask Senators Mitchell and Fulton to use their influence to secure the passage of the parcel post bill and also the bill providing for the issue of postal currency.

Mrs. Howard, state secretary, made the announcement that there are 6106 members in Oregon.
