Senate Desires Papers in Panama Case.

PRESIDENT IS ADDRESSED

Gorman Resolution Relating to Use of Military Passed.

ROOSEVELT IS DEFENDED

His Course Termed That of a Just and God-Fearing Man—Tillman Again Speaks on Reces Appointments and Crum.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The Senate today adopted the resolution of inquiry concerning the Panama case introduced on January 5 by Gorman, and listened to a speech on the Panama question by Mr. Tillman and another on the subject of recess appointments. Following is the text of the Gorman resolution adopted: Resolved, That the President be requested, if not in his judgment incompatible with public interest, to inform the Senate: First—The date when, and the circumstances under which the United States, for the first time, and each succeeding time, used a military force to interfere in the internal affairs of New Granada or Colombia, under the treaty of 1846; whether such use of military force was for the neutrality of the United States, or by the request of New Granada or Colombia, or in consequence of any official representation of either; and also to transmit to the Senate copies of the letters or notes in the Department of State, and of the orders by the Navy Department relating to such use of military force.

Second—Also to inform the Senate whether the United States has been asked by New Granada or Colombia, or any official representative of either, to execute, by armed force, either the Panama question, or the isthmus, or of the sovereignty of New Granada or Colombia, under the same; and if the United States has been so asked, then the date and circumstances thereof; and to send to the Senate copies of the letters or notes, in each case, conveying the application and what was done thereunder by the United States.

Third—And also to inform the Senate in which, if any, of the disturbances on the isthmus of Panama referred to by the President in his last annual message, the United States used a military force solely on its own initiative and uninvited by the Government owning the isthmus, and also to inform the Senate of the circumstances in each such case, and the date when the force was used, and to transmit to the Senate copies of the orders issued by the Navy Department for such purpose.

Fourth—And also that he will inform the Senate of the date when the circumstances under which the United States has employed military force in the internal affairs of New Granada or Colombia, on account of any revolt or rebellion or disturbance of the people therein.

As to Senate recesses. After the disposal of routine business, Tillman was recognized to speak on his resolution relating to the Panama case. His remarks dealt with the pending nomination of Dr. Crum, to be Collector at Charleston, S. C. Tillman disclaimed any intention to consider this as a party question, but asserted his desire to prevent the establishment of a harmful precedent and to find out what the Senate thought of a "constructive recess."

Nominations Are Confirmed. WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The Senate today in executive session confirmed the following nominations: Fleming D. Cheshire, New York, Consul-General at Mukden, China; Edwin V. Morgan, New York, Consul at Dalny, China; James W. Davidson, Minnesota, Consul at Antung, China.

Beveridge Was Misunderstood. WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Senator Beveridge, who was this afternoon reported as saying the committee on territories would consider no statehood bill this session, explains that his statement had reference to the session of the committee today.

Money Asked for Naval Station. WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—A request for an appropriation of \$1,115,000 to carry on the work of construction at the naval station at Guantanamo, was transmitted to the House today from the Navy Department.

When Pure-Food Law is in Effect. WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The pure-food bill, as it passed the House, provided that it shall take effect September 1, 1904, instead of February 1, 1904, as was erroneously stated.

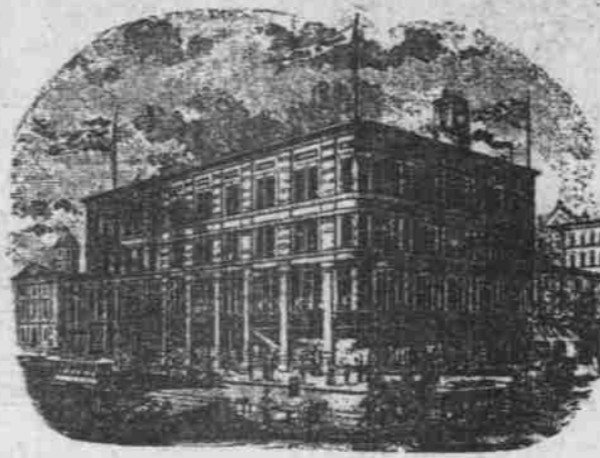
