

BYWAY OF PORTLAND

Big Shipment of Flour From Pendleton Mills.

DESTINED FOR THE FAR EAST

Previous Orders Were Shipped by Steamer From the Sound-Contract Causes Advance in Price of Wheat.

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—The Byers Mill people of this city closed today another contract with flour exporters for 17,000 barrels of flour for the Orient. This shipment goes by way of Portland, instead of Tacoma, as did the last. The last car for the 15,000-barrel order, which was under contract to be filled by the last of January, went out tonight. This goes by way of Tacoma. The price of wheat for the February order will be between 25 and 30 cents. Expecting the order to be given today. Mr. Byers Saturday contracted for 10,000 bushels of wheat at 16 cents per bushel and expects to have it before the order is completed. He said today he believed there was plenty of wheat in the country. One draft for wheat for the January order was for \$28,000, through Portland buyers, as the home market would not supply the immediate demands.

WILL NOT YIELD MUCH. Inheritance Tax Law Will Produce but Little Revenue.

SALEM, Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Not sufficient time has yet elapsed to show what results will be secured from the inheritance tax law. Payments of inheritance taxes are not required within eight months after the death of a person owning property subject to the tax, but a discount is allowed if payment is made within that time. It is now just eight months since the new law went into effect. Reports have been received showing that about 25 estates estimated at more than \$10,000 have been admitted to probate. Quite a number of these will be distributed among so many heirs that there will be no inheritances of over \$500 and the estates will probably not be taxed. There are some of the estates in which the inventories and appraisements have not been completed, and as to these it is impossible yet to ascertain what the amount of property subject to the tax will be. As the settlement of estates is a slow process, so also will be the collection of the tax. The State Treasurer keeps a record of all estates that are likely to be taxable and secures reports from County Courts as required by law. During the next eight months a number of the estates will pay taxes, though the amounts paid will probably not be as large as was expected by the framers of the law. When all estates up to \$10,000 and all inheritances up to \$500 are exempted, the number subject to the tax is comparatively small.

CONFESSION TO SAFE-BLOWING.

Biglock Robbers Are Arrested Near Biggs.

THE DALLIES, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—City Marshal Wood, accompanied by J. J. Fitzgerald, an O. R. & N. detective, arrived in this city last night from Biggs, bringing with them two men giving their names as Frank Wilson and Fred Rose, whom they had arrested near the Biggs station as implicated in the robbery of the general merchandise store of J. J. Martin Saturday night. They were located and captured in a deserted shack about one mile east of Biggs and were found to have in their possession a quantity of dynamite caps and a small amount of nitroglycerine. This morning, after a night in the County Jail, Wilson confessed that he blew up the store and was now obtaining \$5 and some small change therefrom. The men will be held here for a day or two, after which they will be taken to Arlington for trial.

WOULD BUILD A THEATER.

Dallas Woodmen May Provide City With Playhouse.

DALLAS, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—The Woodmen of the World lodge of this city is making arrangements for the construction of a \$10,000 theater in the coming Spring or Summer. A committee has been appointed to purchase a suitable site and will report at the next meeting of the lodge. The new building will be owned by a stock company consisting of members of Dallas lodge. The lodge reserving the right to buy the shares after a given time. The new building will also contain a Woodmen lodge-room and a part will be leased by the La Crosse Club, consisting of Dallas business men. Plans for the new building will be drawn up at once and stock offered for sale in the near future. Portland theater people are supplying the house with companies from their circuits and the past history of theatricals in Dallas assures success to the new enterprise.

WOULD MOVE SAWMILL.

Lyons Plant May Be Taken to Albany.

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Negotiations were begun today to secure another manufacturing enterprise for Albany. The proprietors of the sawmill located at Lyons, on the eastern division of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad, propose to install their mill with entire new equipment at Albany if the citizens of this place will furnish a location for the plant and \$1000 to cover the expenses of moving. The citizens committee of the Alco Club will take the matter up and see if the mill should be secured. A bonus of \$2500 was recently subscribed for a carriage and organ factory, but it is thought the proposition of the Lyons people will be accepted. The people of Albany have been clamoring for a long time for a sawmill. The proposed mill will be a great help to the city and will establish a box factory in connection with the mill.

WILL BE PROSECUTED.

Deputy Marshal on Way to Arrest ex-Postmaster of Greenhorn.

BAKER CITY, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Deputy United States Marshal Roberts passed through this city today on his way to Greenhorn, where he goes to arrest ex-Postmaster Kelly, who was removed from office some time ago when it was discovered that he was skimming his accounts to the amount of \$1000. It was thought for a time that the matter had been settled, but it became known a few days ago that the Postoffice Department had decided to prosecute the case.

CITIZENS ARE INDIGNANT.

Actions of Colfax Marshal and Deputy Will Be Investigated.

COLEFAX, Wash., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—In response to a call for a special meeting, held by the Citizens of Colefax, the City Council met tonight, with the council

chamber and streets packed with indignant citizens. Charges of failure to do their duty were filed against Marshal MacKay and Deputy Alphin. The specific charge being that they refused to arrest a gang of young men and boys who go to a room over the Oxford saloon and repeatedly outraged her; that both officers were told of what was occurring and both refused to make arrests or to go to the place.

After the charges had been read, it was agreed to hold an investigation Wednesday evening, January 27, and the Council adjourned to that date.

SATISFACTORY SO FAR.

Negotiations Between Cello Canal Commission and Property-Owners.

SALEM, Jan. 25.—(Special.)—The members of the Cello Canal Commission were in Portland Saturday on business connected with securing the right of way. No contracts or deeds have yet been made, but the owners of land over which the canal will be built, and the members of the board, are gathering definite information as to the exact location of the canal and the injury that the landowners will sustain. Plans have been prepared and the attorney-general today drew a form of contract which the Commission will enter into with property-owners. The members of the Commission report that their negotiations with the property-owners have thus far been very satisfactory, but as in all cases of large business transactions where the business must be done carefully, considerable time is required.

Old Cases Revived.

HELENA, Mont., Jan. 25.—Judge James H. Beatty, of Idaho, today heard the plea of abatement in the perjury and subornation of perjury cases. There are 15 indictments against Cobban for perjury—five against John B. Catlin for subornation of perjury; also one for perjury, and one each against 25 other persons of Western Montana. They were indicted about two years ago. It being alleged that on timber land entries which were afterward transferred to Cobban and by him transferred to United States Senator Clark. An action was brought by the Government against Senator Clark to vacate his titles to the land, but Judge Knowles decided in favor of the defendant, and the Government has appealed the case.

Will Arbitrate Controversy.

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—In the County Court today the irrigation controversy between the Pendleton and Hudson's Bay Companies, the Little Walla Walla irrigation district and the farmers living on the Tumulus near Milton, was partly settled. The Tumulus people agreed to arbitrate the matter by the officers of the irrigation district who filed bonds in the sum of \$200 each, as follows: Directors, William Lloyd, J. C. Fritchett, W. H. Wilms, W. L. Powell, George T. Taylor, G. A. Hobbs, Leonard, William Forsyth, collector, and H. L. Cawell, treasurer. This is the first irrigation district ever to be formed under the laws of Oregon and the people are watching the outcome with a great deal of interest.

Could Not Reach Mines.

OREGON CITY, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—C. W. Pope and F. W. Welsh returned last night after an unsuccessful attempt to reach the Ogle Creek mines, about 35 miles distant from this city. After reaching the foothills, the young men adopted skis as a means of transportation over the snow-covered mountains. When within a few miles of their destination, a skie broke and they were compelled to walk back to Molalla, where they secured a conveyance and came to this city. The men were in the snow and without food for 36 hours.

Lost, but Found His Way Home.

CORVALLIS, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Sherman Chapple, concerning whose absence in the mountains much anxiety was felt by relatives and others, has arrived home. He became separated from his companions the first day out, but worked his way westward, reaching a settlement on the headwaters of the Albion River, where he was afforded necessities and put on a trail and started on his way. He arrived home after an absence of four days, much the worse for his experiences.

Business Men's Banquet.

OREGON CITY, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the members of the Oregon City Board of Trade tonight, preliminary steps were taken for giving a business men's banquet in the near future. The project will be further considered at another meeting to be held Wednesday evening. The purpose of the banquet is to enlist co-operation in the plans of this organization in pushing Oregon City and Clackamas County and their varied interests.

Wire to Lostine.

LA GRANDE, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Arrangements have been about completed for a telegraph line from Elgin to Lostine, which will be used in connection with the telephone line on the "duplex system." Both circuits belong to one wire, and will be directly connected with the Western Union wires at Elgin. OREGONIAN CORRESPONDENT SAILS FOR THE ORIENT

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 25.—The Canadian Pacific steamer Empress of Japan, which sailed from here today, took with her about a dozen war correspondents, bound for the scene of impending hostilities between Japan and Russia. The fact that the large newspapers in both England and the United States are bringing their representatives to the Far East with the utmost dispatch, indicates the weight leading newspapers attach to Russia's protestation of desire for peace. Most prominent among the correspondents sailing on the Empress of Japan was Melton Prior, of the Illustrated London News, who reached here a few days ago from London. Prior is the father of the war artists sailing today, having been present at every war in 25 years, and now on his 27th campaign. He said before sailing:

"I regard war as inevitable. Russia means to have Corea, and China, and eventually India itself. Japan must fight or be crushed. If war is delayed now, it will come later."

William Maxwell, of the London Standard, said: "When I left London I was informed officially that nothing short of a miracle could prevent war. Since then I have heard much talk regarding a peaceful settlement, but, as a matter of fact, the situation is unchanged. The peace talk all originates from Paris and St. Petersburg, where the press bureaus are endeavoring to create the opinion that Japan is forcing the war on Russia, which desires peace. In spite of Russia's protestations there is little chance for her giving in and war in the end is inevitable."

Maxwell is a keen student of European affairs, and his opinion is of the most importance. He says further that England will probably stand by Japan.

MUSICIAN IS MISSING

SHERIFF OFFERS \$200 REWARD FOR HIS CAPTURE.

Dr. O. A. Martiny Is Wanted For Charges Against Him.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—Dr. O. A. Martiny, one of the most prominent physicians in Tacoma, was today wanted by the Sheriff for forgery, and a reward of \$200 is offered for his apprehension.

The specific charge against the doctor is made by a carpenter of Eatonville, named John Lindstrom, who asserts that Dr. Martiny raised certain school warrants, issued in Lindstrom's favor, and appropriated the money received therefrom. It is also claimed that Dr. Martiny gave checks when he had no funds in the bank to cover them. Today, Thomas C. Van Eaton began suit in the Superior Court against Dr. Martiny to recover \$32, the value of merchandise.

An examination of the county records is said to show that Dr. Martiny disposed of considerable property at Eatonville to which he had never acquired title, and a mortgage, but do not show that Dr. Martiny acquired this property from his former owner, Mrs. A. P. Vance, formerly of Eatonville, who now resides in North Yakima.

The doctor's wife is said to have also disposed of considerable property at Eatonville, and she will make an effort to join in communication with her husband. When last heard from, she was in this city, Friday evening visiting friends, since which time all trace of her is said to be lost. Dr. Martiny is well known in Portland and has been a resident of Tacoma many years. He took an active part in politics some time ago and had a city office in Seattle, where he resided about eight or nine years ago.

WOMAN GOES TO SAN QUENTIN

Sentenced to Five Years for Counterfeiting.

SEATTLE, Jan. 25.—Mrs. Alice Roeper, last week convicted in the Federal Court of counterfeiting silver coins, was today sentenced by Judge Hanford to serve five years in the penitentiary. Charles Johnson, her 15-year-old son, who pleaded guilty to the offense, but who is believed to have become a party to the crime through the influence of his mother, was sentenced to one year at McNeill's Island. Each was fined \$100 in addition to the sentence.

Mrs. Roeper, who has already served one term in the penitentiary for burglary, will be taken to San Quentin prison in accordance with the order directing that all female prisoners be sent there, owing to lack of accommodations at McNeill's Island.

MAKING LAST FIGHT

Walla Walla Again Tries to Save the Fort.

APPEALS TO DELEGATIONS

People Are Aroused by the Rumor That the Soldiers Are to Be Sent to Boise—Why They Object.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—A telegram to Senator Foster urging him to renew efforts to save the United States Army post for Walla Walla was sent by the Walla Walla Commercial Club today, and yesterday letters were sent the Mayors or council bodies, if any existed, of the towns of Umatilla, Northern Walla Walla and Columbia Counties, asking them to send dispatches to their closest Representative at Washington urging similar effort. This marks the last dying snap of the vigorous, but probably unavailing, fight the Commercial Club here has put up to save Fort Walla Walla. Even the club's officers doubt its success in the face of the recommendation of Brigadier-General Fred Funston, and the decision of the War Department, as recently communicated by Senator C. W. Fulton.

Co-operation is asked from the towns of Umatilla County for commercial reasons. Fort Walla Walla is five miles from the Oregon line, and much of the oats and hay supply comes from Umatilla. Through Pendleton, Athena, Weston, Milton and Freewater the Commercial Club hopes to reach Senators Mitchell and Fulton more effectively. The club feels already very warmly toward Senator Fulton for assistance he has rendered in the fight to retain the garrison.

Senator Levi Ankeny will further these efforts as soon as he is sufficiently recovered from his present illness to return to Washington. Senator Foster is expected, as Washington's other representative in the upper house, to head the fight in the meantime, but there is a strong feeling here that more is to be expected from the Oregon Senators than from those of Washington because all the rest of the delegation from this state, excepting possibly Congressman Cushman, have ironed their oars in the fight. Congressman Jones is pulling for a camp site at Spokane; Senator Foster for a site at Tacoma. The Oregon delegation is supposed to have no such wants.

When Senator Fulton's message was received saying that the Secretary of War held out no hope, the first impulse of the Commercial Club was to forsake the fight, and its continuance was only prompted by the news that Boise Barracks was to get the troops from this point, and to derive all the benefits this place had hoped for. In consequence the renewal of the arguments to be presented to the War Department will consist largely of comparisons between the respective merits of the two towns as locations for forts. The military objections to the Walla Walla site are numerous. Inland location of Walla Walla, its distance from transcontinental railway lines and the dilapidated condition of the buildings with the resultant expense necessary to put them in shape for longer occupancy.

Boise is 300 miles farther inland than Walla Walla, has less connection with transcontinental lines, and will require an appropriation of considerable magnitude before the quarters there are large enough to accommodate extra troops. These will be three of the principal arguments. Walla Walla had been conceding the superiority of the Boise site for some time, but it is likely that by tomorrow they will have raised an amount amply sufficient to make good the shortage. The sum of \$6300 is still believed definitely to cover the total of his objections.

Among the arguments previously presented to the War Department by Senator Ankeny and the Commercial Club were the proximity of Walla Walla to the Northern Pacific and the Union Pacific, with consequent facilities for transporting troops to the seaboard; the fact that this is a forage center with supplies easily obtained at reasonable figures; the open winter climate, allowing drill practically the year round; proximity to the Umatilla Indian reservation in the event of a sudden uprising, and the advantages of the place afforded as a recuperative point for soldiers just home from the Philippines. Some of the objections advanced by Brigadier-General Funston were the presence of dust in Spring, Summer and Autumn to an extent which made drill uncomfortable; smallness of grounds and lack of open country immediately around for long marches; inadequate water supply; bad condition of buildings; the fact that Walla Walla is not on a main line.

Canby Depot Robbed.

OREGON CITY, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special.)—The Southern Pacific passenger depot at Canby was entered and ransacked Sunday night by burglars, presumably a number of men were taken from the money drawer. Several express packages and a trunk were rifled, but they contained no valuables. No attempt was made to break into the safe, which convinces the officers that the job was the work of amateurs.

Canadian Pacific Appointment.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 25.—A circular has just been issued by the Canadian Pacific Railway appointing William Cross assistant to William Whyte, second vice-president of the road. Mr. Cross will have entire charge of mechanical affairs on lines west of Port William. His headquarters will be in Winnipeg.
