How well based that opinion may be, only time and events could show. The writer just quoted, however, presents so timely and interesting picture of Oriental hope and faith in apan that it merits immediate consideration: France, for insiance, has an unsettled dispute with Slam, at the same time that an agitation necessitating a considerable reinforcement both of her military and naval forces in Indo-China is becoming visible among her subject populations. The crown prince of Siam paid a state visit to Japan last Winter, and a recent Japanese paper contains a list of high Japanese officials who have received decorations from the King of Siam in recognition of courtesies extended to his son during that visit. 
