TRAVELING BY WEIGHT.

Radical Changes Which the Colorado Innovation May Bring About.

Chicago Inter Ocean.
The officers of the Pueblo & Beulah Valley Railway in Colorado, an electric line II miles in length, have decided to adopt a passenger tariff system whereby persons desiring to be carried over the road must ray according to their weight betterd of pay according to their weight instead of by the mile, as usual in this country.

Passengers, a dispatch says, will be required to step upon scales at the ticket office, and will be charged at the rate of light cents a pound for the round trip between Fueblo and Buelah, and for shorter trips proportionately. This system is said. trips proportionately. This system is said to have been adopted with success on some European lines.

portance, of course, being a purely local affair, but if the new tariff principle proves successful in this instance it may be applied to the handling of passenger traffic on the trunk lines.
In that event, and in cases where per-
