

BRING OUT DEAD

Rescuers at Mine Find 71 Bodies.

THE WORK IS JUST BEGUN

One Hundred More Men Sure to Have Perished.

DAY OF HORROR AT HARWICK

Remains of Many of the Pennsylvania Victims Are Burned to a Crisp and All Are Horribly Mangled.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 28.—At 2 o'clock this morning it is said that over 50 more bodies have been found and are being collected at the bottom of the shaft.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 27.—Three days have elapsed since the terrible catastrophe at the Harwick mine of the Allegheny Coal Company and tonight at midnight 71 bodies have been recovered and brought to the surface. Only one of these has been identified. The day has been one of horror in the little village on the hill above the pit mouth, where the blackened bodies were brought from the top of the shaft and then on sleds to the schoolhouse on the hill above, where the undertakers were ready to receive them, there seemed to prevail in the community as a clutch that represented their natural feelings of passionate anxiety and sorrow.

The Allegheny Coal Company tonight in an official statement positively admitted that all of the men who were in the mine when the explosion occurred are dead. There are 171 names on the list, which does not include Schwyn M. Taylor, or the two men who were on the tippie above the mine shaft when the explosion came. Nor does the list include the name of Daniel Lysie, of Castle Shannon, whose body was found sitting with his back to the wall of one of the rooms. He had evidently been overcome by the after-damp.

This brings the official number of known dead to 74, but the list may still be incomplete, as it is possible that some boys may have gone into the pit to work under their fathers' direction, whose names have not yet been learned. Hutchinson, the custodian of the lamps, says that between 150 and 180 lamps were given out on the fatal Monday morning, and no man was given more than one. At the shaft, huge fires have been burning, and groups of men are gathered there trying to keep warm. In the blacksmith shop, about 100 feet from the mouth of the shaft, are 27 coffins, each containing a body.

Some Burned to a Crisp.

Every body so far brought up is bruised, cut and crushed to a mangled mass. The fact that arms are broken and disjointed indicates that the force of the explosion must have been terrific. It is presumed that it caught the men and hurled them like straws in a gale, scattering them against the jagged walls of the mine and crushing them one upon the other at the ends of the headings and chambers. Scarcely a body has any clothing on it, and all are more or less burned, some to a crisp. There will be great difficulty in identifying them on this account.

No relatives were permitted in the temporary morgue, for the sights there were too gruesome and besides it is absolutely necessary that there be no interruption to the work of the undertakers and embalmers, who have more than they can do.

When all the bodies are brought up that are now at the foot of the shaft, and when they are able to reach Harwick, the families and friends will be allowed to file through and assist in completing the work of identification. The streets of the village are deserted, the women and children having been made to understand that they had better remain indoors until the authorities are ready for them to come to the morgue.

Chief Mine Inspector Roderick reached the Harwick mine this afternoon and at once assumed charge. Union Funeral Services. It is planned now to hold union funeral services for all victims on Sunday with the exception of the Catholics, who will be buried according to the rites of their church.

St. Paul's Roman Catholic Orphan Asylum, of this city, has notified the Harwick authorities that that institution can take care of 200 children. The mystery about the well-dressed man who was found in the mine this morning, and who it was surmised must have been the unwitting cause of the explosion, has been cleared up. The remains were identified by head of David Lysie, the volunteer who was overcome last night while searching for the victims of the explosion.

A. McMullen, who led one party of rescuers, said: "Fifteen bodies were found in one south entrance. All of them, with one exception, were badly burned and mangled. One had his head blown off. In room 1 of the south entrance we found two men lying face downward near each other. They had evidently been killed by the force of the explosion. In another place we found six men, all negroes, I believe. Five were in a heap, one was pinned under a car. We found the driver of that entry lying along the roadway where he had been blown. Rooms 10 and 12, south entry, are caved in to the depth of five feet. There are several men buried there, and there are undoubtedly men buried under the rock in other parts of the mine. For this reason it will be weeks before all the bodies are recovered."

Air Is Getting Better. Inspector Cunningham says the air in the mine is getting better every hour, but there is still considerable gas encountered. From the condition of the bodies he thinks now that the men were killed by the force of the explosion, and not by after-damp, as at first suggested.

Wrecking people will attend to the last rites of the dead, who will be taken from the mine, beginning today. About

(28) this morning a trainload of coffins left the West Pennsylvania station in Allegheny for the mine. Each body will be embalmed and given a separate grave. A general appeal for aid for the families of miners who lost their lives through the explosion will be issued from Harwick within the next 48 hours.

The leading men of the place left alive are considering the call, and all the principal cities and towns of the state will be appealed to. An effort will be made to raise at least \$10,000, which amount, it is figured, will be adequate to provide for the suffering and almost destitute women and children until the warmer weather comes, or until some permanent arrangement can be made for caring for them.

MINERS DASHED TO PIECES.

Colorado Men Who Dropped With the Cage Cannot Be Recognized.

VICTOR, Colo., Jan. 27.—The bodies of the 12 miners who fell with the cage 300 feet down the shaft of the Stratton Independence mine yesterday, have been recovered, and are lying on two rows of benches in a carpenter shop near the shafthouse. They are dismembered, dismembered, decapitated and otherwise mutilated. Only one of the victims, Edward Tripp, was recognized from his features, and his arms and legs were broken and the back of his skull crushed. There was not a particle of clothing on any of the bodies or dismembered limbs when they were recovered from the sump at the bottom of the shaft.

Coroner James Doran has instructed the master mechanics who have examined the machinery at the Stratton Independence mine to make public no statement regarding the causes of the accident until they testify at the inquest, which will probably be opened tomorrow by J. McCarty, deputy state mine inspector, after an examination of the mine, said the machinery seemed to be in good condition. No funeral arrangements have yet been made.

All the bodies of the miners who met death in Stratton's Independence have been identified except two. Investigation into the cause of the disaster will begin tomorrow morning.

BANQUET PROVES A LOVEFEAST

Panama Indians Who Threatened a Revolt Are Won Over.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Four Indian chiefs, with 48 of their lieutenants, representing the Districts of Capira, Lapintada and two sections of Penonito, have arrived, says a Herald dispatch from Panama, to make a formal protest because the authorities of the new Republic named Juanfidel Rodriguez, head chief of the Indians, with the title of Governor-General, the visiting chiefs declared they were unwilling to recognize the Governor-General's authority, and they threaten to revolt.

After some persuasion the chiefs agreed to individual conferences with General Huertas, the Commander-in-Chief of the republic's army, who persuaded all to unite at a banquet and sit down at a table with Rodriguez. The event proved a lovefeast, and all differences were forgotten in the good cheer that followed.

After a tour of inspection about the city, the Indians will return to their homes and order their followers to perform the new ceremony of baptizing the Panama flag in special honor of the new head chief.

Delay Recognition of Panama.

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Jan. 27.—A cablegram has been received from the Minister of Ecuador at Rio de Janeiro announcing that owing to his diplomatic influence in Brazil, Chile and Argentina have postponed their recognition of the Republic of Panama.
