Japan Is to Be Made Concessions.

AMERICA IS INFORMED

British Ambassador at St. Petersburg the Authority.

RUSSIAN NOTE GOES TODAY

England Will Prevail Upon the Mikado to Accept Its Terms—Russian Steamer Said to Have Been Fired Upon.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The Associated Press has the authority of the British Ambassador at St. Petersburg for the announcement that the Russian reply, which it is expected, will be delivered tomorrow, is satisfactory. Although no further details are obtainable, it is assumed that the information of the Ambassador is correct that Russia has made certain concessions, and that Great Britain will prevail upon Japan to accept them as satisfactory.

The statement of the British Ambassador sent from St. Petersburg to the British Legation in Tokyo, where Mr. Griescom heard of it and cabled the news to the State Department, the cablegram arriving over night.

Another cablegram from Minister Griescom today says it is reported from St. Petersburg that the Russian answer to the last Japanese note will be delivered tomorrow.

Answer May Be Delayed.
ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 29.—The authorities here now say that the Russian reply to Japan will not be transmitted until next week.

JAPAN IRRITATES RUSSIANS.
Prominent Admiral Says Trade Losses Make Her So Insistent.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 29.—An Admiral, who is influential in the councils of the empire, was interviewed today by the Associated Press and said:
"The enormous loss which the commerce of Japan is sustaining as a result of the mobilization of steamships for transport service probably accounts for the impetuosity the Japanese are displaying over the delay in the Russian reply, but this reply will be for none other than a peaceful settlement, although it is difficult to feel certain in this respect, because of the erratic course of the Japanese government during the latter stage of the negotiations."

"Japan has increased her demands while the negotiations were still in progress by insisting upon treaty recognition of Chinese sovereignty in Manchuria. Russia has declared her intention not to annex Manchuria; therefore why comply with a demand that is tantamount to a humiliating reiteration of a former voluntary declaration?"

"It is undeniable that the attitude of Japan is causing irritation in St. Petersburg, and that a feeling of impatience is growing throughout Russia. It is hard to account for Japan's persistent aggression, but this must be attributable to the incendiary influence of the Japanese press, which is acting under foreign inspiration. The Japanese government must know it stands no chance of defeating Russia, while Japan has much to lose if Russia is forced against the wall."

"Should Japan proceed to hostilities her first object probably would be cutting the Siberian Railroad, for which purpose she would land troops in Korea. She could not, however, land more than 100,000 men, and Russia has an equal number of men in Manchuria to meet this attack, which, I think, would be quickly repulsed. I do not believe in a naval war; the Russian warships would make it possible for the Japanese to capture them."

But let me repeat, war is improbable."

NEW PEACE PLAN PROPOSED.

London Statist Urges That a Second Berlin Congress Be Called.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—The Statist today, in a long article on the Russo-Japanese situation, makes a striking suggestion for the solution of the difficulties which seem to meet the claims and contentions of both Russia and Japan.

After commenting on the advantages of the Sino-American treaty which, it says, if carried out, would assure an open door in Manchuria for the rest of the world, the Statist continues as follows:
"When Russia was at the gates of Constantinople and probably had dictated peace to Turkey, Great Britain interfered, and the result was the Berlin Congress. Is there any good reason why the world should wait for the conclusion of war to summon a similar council? Would it not be more statesmanlike, and certainly more humane, to summon such a council now in order to prevent war? Would it not be possible for the Russian government to sell its railways in Chinese territory to an international syndicate, all the powers guaranteeing the safety and the interests of this situation? In that way, it seems to us, the real rights of Russia in Manchuria would be safeguarded, while the apprehensions entertained by Japan that Russian extension threatens her existence would be permanently removed."

CZAR GOING OVER THE REPLY.

Contents Thereof Are Being Guarded With the Greatest Secrecy.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—The Japanese Minister, Baron Hayashi, said today with reference to the report published by the Daily Graphic to the effect that the Russian reply to Japan was completed Wednesday, that it has been communicated to M. Kurino, the Japanese Minister at St. Petersburg, and that it was unfavorable, that M. Kurino officially notified him that the Council of State called to consider the Russian reply was only held in St. Petersburg yesterday, as called to the Associated Press. Baron Hayashi added the reply had not yet been sent, and that it would only be submitted to the Czar's approval today.

"There are no means, therefore," added the Japanese Minister, "of knowing the contents of the answer, and as to the probable tenor thereof I have no official information."

The Russian Embassy, in denying the Daily Graphic's statement, says the information received by the Embassy confirms the statement on the subject made in the Associated Press dispatch from St. Petersburg yesterday.

The officials here are gratified at an apparently authoritative statement that

Japan does not intend to fortify the Straits of Korea.

A strong intimation has been made that the maritime nations of Europe and the United States would take up the question unless this declaration had been made.

MUCH STUDY GIVEN TO NOTE.

Russia Determined to Make a Decidedly Diplomatic Reply.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 29.—It is said that the delay in forwarding Russia's answer to Japan's second note was necessitated in consequence of the extreme care taken in drafting the document. Viceroy Alexieff's views were also awaited before its transmission to the Czar. It is fully realized here that the forwarding of the answer will mark another critical stage in the negotiations, everything depending on Japan's attitude. It is feared that despite pacific influence, the hands of the authorities may be forced on account of the excitement of the press and people. A high official said:

"Of course we cannot prevent war. Russia will do her utmost to offer Japan a basis for a durable peace, but there are limits beyond which we cannot go. In Korea we grant practically everything, and in Manchuria we already recognize all the treaty rights of Japan and all the other powers. Should Japan reject our

ROME, Jan. 29.—Bishop Mutel, apostolic vicar of Corea, has sent a report to the Vatican saying that 10,000 Roman Catholics living in Corea are subjected to grave risks because of the condition of the country on account of the Russo-Japanese situation. The bishop recalls in his report that his predecessor in Corea spent 15 years in prison because he was not afforded protection.

Russia Taking Her Time.

PARIS, Jan. 29.—It is understood that the conferences between Foreign Minister Lamsdorff and M. Kurino, the Japanese Minister at St. Petersburg, have permitted the latter to advise his government concerning the position Russia is likely to take in the forthcoming answer, but the officials here say this was merely an inter-

Milwaukee Scandal Continues to Involve Leading Men.

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 29.—State Senator Barney Eaton was arrested tonight on an indictment charging him with accepting a bribe of \$100 in connection with legislation on the harbor's license law enacted at the last session of the Legislature. Supervisors Edward Strauss and August Fais were rearrested and additional counts brought in this evening.

MUST ANSWER FOR CONTEMPT

Labor Leader Refuses to Produce Documents Desired by Jury.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—E. N. Nockels, secretary of the Chicago Federation of Labor, has been cited to appear in court tomorrow morning and show cause why he should not be punished for contempt. Nockels was called before the grand jury today to give evidence concerning alleged acts of lawlessness committed during recent strikes in this city, and was told to bring the books and records of the Federation of Labor with him. He refused to bring them, and told the members of the grand jury that he had no intention of obeying the order. He was therefore cited to appear before Judge Gary in the morning to show cause why he should not be punished for contempt. The grand jury, which has been investigating strikes, will conclude its labors tomorrow, and it is said a number of walking delegates and labor union officials will be indicted.

Clew to Bedford Murderer.

BEDFORD, Ind., Jan. 29.—The authorities investigating the Miss Schaefer murder case intimated today that they have a strong clew.

"If the public knew what is in this letter, Bedford would go wild," said Mayor Smith, holding up an envelope addressed to himself. The Mayor would not say whether the letter was anonymous, nor would he give the least intimation as to the nature of its contents.

AN IDEAL PROFESSOR.

President Harper Says First of All He Should Be Married.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—The qualifications for the ideal college professor, as outlined by President Harper in a lecture at the University of Chicago on "The Faculty of a College," are:

First—He should be married.
Second—He should be a church member.
Third—He should mix with his students outside the classrooms.
Fourth—He should have a doctor's degree.
Fifth—He should be willing to work hard 11 months in the year.
Sixth—He should be in sympathy with the public and take an active interest in public affairs.
The college professor who is married," said President Harper, "will do three times as much good in his position as one who is single. And if he has three or four children he will be still better, for he will be a stronger man."

FUNDS OF PATTI ATTACHED.

Spokane and Butte Managers Out Because She Failed to Come.

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 29.—The Pacific Amusement Company today attached \$30 of the proceeds of the Patti concert in this city, as compensation for expenses of preparing for concerts at Spokane and Butte, which were not given according to contract.

Cruel Army Officers to Be Punished.

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—The budget committee of the Reichstag today, discussing the military appropriations, passed almost unanimously a resolution asking the Chancellor to institute rigorous penal proceedings against superior officers whose subordinates maltreat prisoners. War Minister von Emmen denied that luxury existed in the army in the way the public believed. The government has sent to the Reichstag a bill providing for awarding damages to innocent persons sentenced to punishment.

Decorated by Emperor William.

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—In recognition of their services to the state, Emperor William has had decorations conferred upon Dr. Schulz, president, and Herr Rathenau, general manager, of the General Electric Company of Berlin; Herr Denninghoff, manager of the Society for Experimentation in Rapid Electrical Transit; and to several engineers who have been connected with these experiments.

AN important factor in connection with the situation has been learned by the Associated Press. Within a fortnight both Russia and Japan have officially communicated to the United States and to the European chancelleries their positions regarding some of the points at issue. This course was considered necessary, in view of the wild and varying reports disseminated.

It is known that the strategic situation was discussed by the military authorities present at today's and yesterday's meetings of the Council of State.

COREAN REVOLT IS SPREADING

Increased Taxation Is the Signal for Lawlessness.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Internal disturbance in Korea is spreading, cables the Herald's Seoul correspondent. It is the result of increased taxation. The Government of three provinces report that their officers have been captured by organized bands and government funds taken. Details have just been received here of the disturbances at Vladivostok during the celebration of Russian Christmas. It was created by intoxicated Russian marines and Japanese women. Numerous houses were destroyed, mostly Japanese, but including the Russian Theater. The usual fighting occurred. As happens on such occasions, there was considerable brutality, but no fatalities. The marines were not brought under control until much property had been destroyed.

The notification of Korean neutrality, cable from Chefoo to the powers, was unknown in the Korean Foreign Office until replies were received from the representatives abroad. The intimation was that it was arranged by Yi Yong Ik and Hyun Sang Kun, the latter having just returned from Russia.

The Korean Minister at Tokyo has been instructed especially to urge Japan's immediate recognition of Korea's neutrality.

COREANS URGED TO RISE.

Placards Giving Lurid Tale of Foreign Aggression, Are Scattered.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Placards inciting the populace to rise and resist foreign aggression are being busily circulated in the province of Hunan, China, according to the Globe's Shanghai correspondent. The placards predict the establishment of a foreign viceroyalty over Hunan, similar to that of Manchuria. The correspondent says the movement possibly portends a national outbreak.

RUSSIAN STEAMER FIRED UPON

Japanese Warship Sends Three Shots Across Her Bow.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—The Chefoo correspondent of the Daily Mail says a foreigner who has arrived there reports that the Russian steamer Argon, upon which he was a passenger, from Nagasaki to Port Dalny, was fired at by Japanese warship outside of Chemulpo harbor. Three shots were fired across the Argon's bows, but no further attempt to stop her was made.

Viceroy Alexieff is better, the correspondent says, but he is still confined to his room.

Turkey Has Not Sold Cruiser.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 29.—Reiteration of the story of the sale of the Turkish cruiser Medjidia brought forth an emphatic denial today on behalf of the Cramp Company. It was stated that at no time has there been any negotiations for the sale of the cruiser to either Russia or Japan. An official of the company says:

"The Sultan takes great interest in the building of a modern navy for Turkey, with vessels of a most advanced type, and therefore we feel sure that he would not consider any offer to sell the ship."

French Cruiser Leaves for China.

TOULOUSE, France, Jan. 29.—The French armored cruiser Sully, whose departure for the Far East has been delayed for some time, left here tonight for China.

Many Japanese Will Go Home.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—The Korea will take out enough Japanese to make a regiment. Large numbers of the little brown men employed in this city have given their employers notice that they

Neutral Zone Once Existed.

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—Concerning the recent proposal for the establishment of a neutral zone between Corea and Manchuria, it is recalled here that such a zone once existed; that it lay on the Manchurian side of the Yalu River, and that it was completely devastated and rendered uninhabitable. Li Hung Chang eventually succeeded in having this zone incorporated into Manchuria.

GERMANS ARE HARD PRESSED.

Kaffirs Effect a Junction With the Hereros in Africa.

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—The commander of the German gunboat Halcholt, lying at Swakopmund, German Southwest Africa, cables that he has received news from Lieutenant Zuelow, in command of the German forces at Okahandja, that the Kaffirs have effected a junction with the Hereros who are besieging that post. As Okahandja was already hard pressed, the announcement has caused concern at the Colonial Office here.

The following dispatch from Lieutenant Zuelow, sent by messenger via Karibib, was received here today:

"Okahandja, Jan. 29.—Am holding Okahandja. Occupied it January 15 with 200 men after heavy fighting. Am waiting for guns from the Hereros. Ask for a division of artillery. Weak relief corps with machine gun from Windhoek repulsed 12th and 13th. Loss reported, eight reserves. "In order to establish connections with the rear and bring forward military transports, we attempted today with 90 men to reach Karibib by rail."

A later dispatch, dated January 29, says: "Yesterday afternoon, near Kawitwana, between Waldaid and Okahandja, there was a sharp fight. A division of about 70 men strong sent forward by rail, lost four dead and three slightly wounded."

"As the bridge was destroyed, are trying to send news for Karibib through trustworthy natives."

"We can hold out for some time yet."

PRICE ON HEADS OF OFFICERS

Macedonians Plan to Kill All Foreign Officials.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 29.—The Porte has notified the Austrian and Russian embassies that the Macedonian committee have arranged with the Albanians for liberal rewards to be given them for every foreign officer sent in to the provinces in connection with the reorganization of the gendarmerie under the reform scheme of the powers. The Porte, therefore, objects to the officers wearing foreign uniforms, as their lives are thereby endangered.

LIBERIA INAUGURATES NEW PRESIDENT.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Advices received from Liberia say that the new President, Arthur Barclay, was successfully inaugurated at Monrovia, the capital, January 4. The keynotes of his address to the people were commercial freedom and the conciliation of the aboriginal population of Liberia, to which little attention has been paid for many years.

The President dwelt on the advantages the Liberians derive from Europeans and white Americans. He urgently advocated closer commercial alliances and recommended granting greater facilities to all foreigners for trading and farming.

URGENT BELMONT AS LEADER.

New York Democrats Desire Him to Head National Committee.
