Roosevelt Praised for Stand in Panama.

GROSVENOR'S HIGH TRIBUTE

Great Courage Shown in an Hour of Extreme Peril.

DEMOCRATS TAKEN TO TASK

Had the President Hesitated to Do His Plain Duty, They Would Have Been Just as Severe in Their Criticisms.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The proceedings in the House today were preceded by a spirited discussion of the Panama question. Thayer (Dem., Mass.) declared the course of this Government in Panama to have been contrary to the provisions of the treaty with New Granada. Grosvenor (O.) vigorously defended the Administration, and said the brightest star that shines in the pathway of the candidate of the Republican party in his course on the Panama Canal question.

While a bill proposing relief to an individual from the operations of the act restricting ownership of lands in the territories and the District of Columbia to American citizens was under consideration, Hepburn asked the question if they had changed front on this question, and why they were now willing to support exemptions from the operations of that act in view of the attitude they assumed at the time of its enactment.

The House took up the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill, consideration of which was pending when the House adjourned.

When the House convened today, Baker (Dem., N. Y.) asked a question of personal privilege, announcing that a local newspaper contained an article concerning him in which there were misstatements of facts. The speaker asked if the gentleman's rights or reputation were affected by the publication, and Baker, replying, said that it affected his reputation. The article, he said, had been published in the New York Herald, and he related to Baker's threats of a few days ago that he would refuse unanimous consent in the future, objection having been made to his request to extend his remarks.

The reading produced laughter on the Republican side. Payne objected, saying the matter did not come within the scope of personal privilege. The speaker agreed with Payne, saying that this was not a privileged matter, and the incident was closed.

The bill to ratify and amend a treaty with the Sioux tribe of Indians on Rosebud Reservation was passed. The House then proceeded to the consideration of District of Columbia business.

A bill to relieve Vincenzo Gerardi, of the District of Columbia, from the operation of the act restricting the ownership of real estate in the territories to American citizens was passed.

To Relief of the House.

A bill to prevent the docking of horses' tails in the District of Columbia was passed, after a discussion as to whether the practice constitutes cruelty to animals.

The House then took up the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill. After Hitt (Ill.) had explained the provisions of the bill, Thayer (Dem., Mass.) addressed the House on the Panama question.

"Are we in this miserable Panama fiasco sustaining the dignity, the honor and glory of the American Republic?" he asked. Referring to the dissolution of the Colombian Congress on October 21, he said:

"Two days' longer wait would not have seemed an unwarranted delay to any but an impetuous and over-strenuous person. Our President, however, is not a man to wait when there can be something to be done. If this matter of having a canal at Panama was not settled before Congress convened ten days later, the friends of the Nicaragua route and the friends of other routes might be reinforced and making more trouble for the Panama route. Personally, the President was in favor of building the canal at Panama, and he was not unfriendly with the French company, but he was anxious to impress upon the American people that they had a strenuous man at the helm, who did not stop at trifles, one who would ride any kind of a broncho where others more cautious dare not tread."

Grosvenor Makes Warm Reply.

Grosvenor (O.) replied to Thayer in a vigorous defense of the Administration's course in connection with the Panama situation. an illustration of what one man or one administration can do to redeem the character of the Nation from the possibility of the charge of imbecility and lack of courage in an hour of extreme peril and excitement.

"I believe that if the gentleman will put his ear to the ground just now, and listen to the sounds that are coming from all over the United States, he will hear the sound of indorsement of Theodore Roosevelt in this particular matter of the Panama question that will unsettle his views as to the future possibility of Democratic victory in the coming election for President.

Cost of Shaw's and Moody's Carriages

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Secretary Shaw today answered the House resolution of inquiry as to the cost of the carriages maintained at Government expense in his department. The Secretary says there are six horses that cost \$4000. The total cost of the carriages, which are used by the Secretary and Assistant Secretaries, is \$2400. The liveries of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, cost \$1000. Seven men on the payroll as "laborers" at \$600 each, and the driver of the "livery" Secretary Moody informs the House that there are four horses, and as many carriages owned and maintained by the Government in his department. These are used by himself and the Assistant Secretary. The total cost of the same is \$1312. One assistant messenger at \$70 and one "laborer" at \$600 care for and drive the livery.

Plan to Reward Brave Officers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Secretary Root transmitted to Congress today with his approval the draft of a bill containing a method of rewarding the bravery of the Engineer Corps of the Army, together with the draft of a bill whose passage he recommends. Bound Over for Election Fraud.

DENVER, Feb. 1.—The five election judges arrested recently upon the charge of fraud in connection with the election for State Supreme Justice and for delegates to the charter convention of the City and County of Denver, had a hearing today before Judge F. T. Johnson of the District Court, acting as a committing magistrate, and were bound over to the Criminal Court. They were later released on bonds in the sum of \$500 each.

NOTED POLITICIAN ON TRIAL.

Colonel Ed Butler is Again Fighting Charge of Bribery.

FULTON, Mo., Feb. 1.—The trial of Colonel Edward Butler, the millionaire politician of St. Louis, on the charge of having bribed 15 members of the House of Representatives to obstruct a city lighting measure, came to trial today before Judge W. W. Graves, on a change of venue from the St. Louis County Circuit. Colonel Butler's entire family, including Congressman James Butler, of St. Louis, were present in court, as were also many of his political friends. Circuit Attorney Folk, of St. Louis, is directing the prosecution.

On another count Colonel Butler was found guilty and given a sentence, but the State Supreme Court overturned the verdict and dismissed the case.

Men and Operators Both Dubious.

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 1.—The Indiana, Ohio, Illinois and Western Pennsylvania coal operators' and miners' joint scale committee got to work today on the counter demands presented in open conference last week. No report is expected before Wednesday. Both operators and miners fear a disruption of the present central competitive agreement, and today there are indications that it will begin with the Illinois operators forming a settlement with the miners on practically their own terms. Such a settlement would mean a material advance in Ohio and Western Pennsylvania, to which it is thought the operators of these two states would not consent. The outlook is considered serious.

Children Burned to Death in Fire.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., Feb. 2.—At 9 o'clock this morning the residence of Peter Christiansen, Sixteenth avenue and Third street, was destroyed by fire. His five children, ranging in age from a babe in arms to 11 years old, burned to death, and Mrs. Christiansen burned so that she will die.

The husband was in the country at the time. No one knows how the fire started.

KNOX ATTACKS THE BILL TO AMEND ANTI-TRUST LAWS WOULD INJURE COMMERCE.

Railroads Especially Would Be Benefited—Administration Never Gave the Measure Support.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Attorney-General Knox, in answer to inquiry as to whether the bill recently introduced into the Senate to amend the interstate commerce and antitrust laws so as to relieve foreign commerce from their operation, and so as to enable contracts to be entered into in reasonable restraint of commerce was introduced with the knowledge and approval of the Administration, replied: "Absolutely, no." Mr. Knox continued:

"The amendment proposes to repeal the interstate commerce law and the antitrust laws, so far as foreign commerce is concerned. This would result in giving foreign commerce an advantage over our domestic commerce. By means of such a power, the tariff protection will be largely nullified."

"It is well known that the steamship companies and railroads have, in instances combined so that foreign trade has been carried from Berlin to Chicago at rates 50 per cent lower than similar goods made in this country could be transported from New York to Chicago."

"Boots, clothing, hardware, etc., from Germany, have been carried through to San Francisco at rates 66 per cent lower than the cost of the same goods carried by similar manufacturers of our own country from Atlantic ports to San Francisco."

"While it may be a wise policy to incorporate the rule of reasonableness into the regulation, by law, of contracts between individuals and contracts of industrial corporations which are private corporations, that rule has never been applied to what are known as quasi-public corporations—railroads, for example, which exercise public functions and enjoy public rights. This amendment would tend to relieve them from many of their most important duties to the public. Its enactment, instead of being a protection to commerce, would be to effect an undoing of very much of the most important remedial legislation of the past 15 years. If this proposed amendment should be regarded as wise legislation, it ought not to be done secretly, but openly, with full knowledge of the House and full opportunity to it to be heard on the subject."

"Such an amendment as is now proposed ought not to be attached to any bill in the closing hours of a moribund Congress."

HER WHEREABOUTS A SECRET

Mrs. Maybrick Now Regaining Her Health So She Can Quit Prison.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—The whereabouts of Mrs. Maybrick are variously announced in the newspapers this morning as Cornwall, Holloway prison, at sea bound for the United States, etc.
