MITCHELL MAKING SURE

St. Louis' Request for More Money Prompts Move.

OREGON'S CHANCES ARE GOOD

Fact That Amendment Is Submitted in No Wise Affects the Original Bill, Which Senators Are Confident Will Pass.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Feb. 1.—Senator Mitchell today submitted to the Senate his bill in aid of the Lewis and Clark Exposition in the shape of an amendment to the urgent deficiency bill and had it referred to the committee on appropriations. This was done in view of the fact that ex-Governor Francis, president of the St. Louis Exposition, and his associates, have been before that committee in behalf of their request for an additional appropriation of \$300,000. But for this fact Senator Mitchell would not have offered his amendment until later on. As he has intended from the first what Senator Mitchell most desired was that his bill have an even start in the race before the committee on appropriations. Should the committee deem it improper subject-matter in the deficiency bill, as Senator Mitchell thinks in all probability it will, he will offer it later on as an amendment to some other proper appropriation bill.

Submission of this proposed amendment at this time and its reference to the committee on appropriations in no respect interferes with the consideration and passage of the bill heretofore reported unanimously from the committee on industrial exhibitions and now on the calendar.

As soon as the Panama treaty is out of the way, or possibly an opportunity before that may open, it is expected this bill will come up for consideration, and Senators Fulton and Mitchell both feel confident of its passage.

Representative Williamson went to Chairman Tawney, of the House committee on exposition, today regarding the Lewis and Clark bill. Mr. Williamson said he did not want to importune Tawney unnecessarily, but he wanted the chairman to understand that the delegation was very much interested in the bill and did not want it neglected. Tawney explained he had been acting as chairman of committee of the whole for some time, and the St. Louis Exposition was taking the time of the committee on the bill drafted and considered by the committee without much further delay.

FAIR ESTIMATE PUT TOO LOW

St. Louis Needs \$7,000,000 More to Complete Buildings.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—An extended explanation of the proposed loan of \$1,000,000 by the Government to the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Company was made today by David E. Francis, president of the company, to the House committee on industrial arts and exhibitions. Chairman Tawney announced that the Senate committee had the matter under consideration as an amendment to the urgent deficiency appropriation bill.

It was proposed to have this amendment introduced in the House in the form of a new bill. The hearing today was held to get the members to be informed as to just what the proposition was in the event that favorable action is taken in the Senate.

Francis reviewed every feature of the enterprise at length. Foreign governments had appropriated a total of \$7,500,000 for their buildings and exhibits. The states and territories have appropriated an aggregate of \$7,000,000. He said the estimate of \$10,000,000 as the cost of the Exposition had been found to be decidedly too low. Chicago had expended \$22,000,000 before opening the gates. With the loan now asked the Exposition would, he said, represent an expenditure of \$19,000,000.

The increased cost of labor as compared with this item of expenses at the Chicago Exposition, he said, amounted to at least 25 per cent. Labor cost, 50 per cent of the cost of the Exposition, and this increase alone amounted to at least \$2,500,000.

FOREIGNERS LOSING PATIENCE
Santo Domingo and Hayti Care Not When Pressed for Debts.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—Official advice has reached Washington from Santo Domingo and Port au Prince showing a distressing condition of affairs in Santo Domingo and Hayti. Business is declared to be almost at a standstill in both countries, and foreigners have well-nigh exhausted their patience in endeavoring to maintain friendly relations with the natives. With the default declaration that Santo Domingo has "a great and good friend" in the United States, according to the report from the Dominican capital, the officials at Santo Domingo refuse to show the slightest concern when pushed by foreigners for the payment of their debts.

In Hayti, it is declared, similar conditions in the friendship of the United States is shown by the authorities, who

point to the Venezuelan incident as an indication of what the United States will do in case foreign governments attempt to collect their claims by force.

HIS WORDS CLEAR UP MYSTERY

Aged Salt Lake Man Confesses to Murder of Seven Years Ago.

SALT LAKE, Feb. 1.—A murder mystery of seven years standing is believed by the police to have been cleared up by the confession of George W. Munsey, 67 years old. Two other men, Abe Hunter, of Salt Lake and John Bick, of Graniteville, Utah, are implicated by Munsey and are under arrest. The crime of which the men are accused is the murder in February, 1897, of Fred Bestler in a hotel on South Temple street. Bestler had the reputation of being a miser and possessed of considerable money, and the murder is supposed to have been committed for the purpose of robbery.

It is stated that Munsey, while partially intoxicated, recently gave out some information regarding the crime. He was arrested and his written confession is now in the hands of the County Attorney.

Will Put an End to Ueury.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—In their efforts to stamp out the numerous moneylenders doing business here, representatives of the District Attorney's office have held a secret meeting with the judges of the Court of Special Sessions, at which it was reported to have been agreed that hereafter persons found guilty of violating the law shall be sent to the penitentiary for one year.

The statutes provide this sentence of a \$500 fine, and in several cases recently pushed to a successful conclusion by the authorities, the guilty persons have escaped with a fine only to continue their operations.

GOLD OF DUKE IS STOLEN.

Room of His Solicitor Is Entered and \$60,000 Taken.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—Scotland Yard detectives are confronted with a mysterious robbery, entailing the loss of \$60,000, which has just occurred in the Hotel Metropole, says a Herald dispatch from London.

George Mitchell, of Bedford, a solicitor for the Duke of Newcastle, came to the city with the money in a wallet. It was to have been used in the purchase of some property for the Duke. Marshall left the wallet in the hotel safe over night and after taking it to his room in the morning he went for a few minutes to the barber shop, locking the door as he left. Upon his return the wallet was found cut open and \$60,000 of the \$60,000 it contained stolen. No definite trace of the thief has been found.

The Japanese, in alarm, are leaving the territory traversed by the Eastern Chinese Railroad.

According to the Port Arthur Novykan, the Japanese are intriguing to create disturbances in Korea, so as to have an excuse for intervention. The Japanese reports of the intention of the Seoul garrison to mutiny were, it is added, circulated with the object of inducing the Emperor of Korea to seek refuge in the Russian Legation. The only result, however, was to determine the Emperor to place himself under the protection of the United States Legation, if necessary.

Russian Troops Arrive on Yalu.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—A correspondent of the Daily Mail at Nagasaki says in a dispatch that Japanese refugees from Port Arthur, Port Dalry and Harbin report the arrival already of one Russian division on the Yalu River.

From Tokio, a correspondent of the Daily Mail cables that the Southern Line steamship service of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha will be resumed February 10.

The Tokio correspondent of the Daily Telegraph cables he has heard from Pekin that Yuan Shi Ki has resigned from the post of Chief of the Military Training Staff because certain officials are opposing his scheme for reform.

Japanese Minister Expects War.

PEKIN, Feb. 1.—The Korean Minister here has been recalled and will leave Pekin within a few days.

The Korean Legation continues to receive disquieting news regarding the conditions in Korea.

The Japanese Minister in Pekin discredits the reports intimating that a peaceful settlement will be arrived at, especially in view of Russia's immediate warlike preparations.

Will Be Made Minister to Japan.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—At the Korean Legation the statement was made by one of the secretaries that Minshu Cho, the Minister who has recently been recalled by his government, will be appointed Minister to Japan, a post of considerable importance at this time. He does not expect to leave Washington for several weeks. His successor, Yu Kien Shian, is expected here within six weeks.

No Change in Situation.

LONDON, Feb. 1.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Tokio today says the Russian answer has not yet arrived, and there is an absolute deadlock in the negotiations, but the dispatch adds, well-informed people continue to expect a satisfactory answer from Russia.

Expects Reply by Middle of Week.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—After a brief conference with Acting Secretary of State Loomis today, Mr. Takihira informed the Associated Press that the Japanese government expects the Russian reply by the middle of the week.

Japan Fixes War Pay of Men.

LONDON, Feb. 2.—The Tokio correspondent of the Times cables that an ordinance has been promulgated fixing the war pay of the army and navy.

Minister Bunau-Varilla Assailed in Senate.

PANAMA DEBATE CONTINUES

Dietrich Asks for a Committee to Fully Investigate the Charge That He Sold an Office, and His Request Is Granted.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—In the Senate today Dietrich of Nebraska made a request for an investigation into charges on which he was tried recently by a Federal Court in his own state, and the Senate granted the request, the President pro tem, appointing a committee consisting of Messrs. Hear, Platt (Conn.), Spooner, Cockrell and Pettus to make the inquiry.

The remainder of the day was devoted to an argument in support of the resolution introduced by Stone directing the Senate committee on foreign relations to make an investigation into the Panama revolution.

When the Senate convened, Dietrich read a statement regarding the court proceedings and his acquittal on the ground that he was not a Senator at the time his alleged malfeasance was said to have occurred.

He said he felt an explanation was due the Senate to determine whether he is fit to sit in the Senate. He offered a resolution authorizing the President pro tem to appoint a committee of five to make a full investigation and report to the Senate concerning the charge and his acquittal.

The charges relate to the postoffice at Hastings, Neb., the appointment of Jacob Fisher as postmaster, and the selection of a building owned by Dietrich as a postoffice. Dietrich was charged with accepting a bribe, but the charge was disposed of by the courts in Nebraska without a full investigation having been made.

Tillman suggested that the investigation should be conducted by the committee on privileges and elections. He said the charges affected the integrity and honor of the Senator from Nebraska and his right to sit in the Senate.

No Precedent for It.

Burrows, chairman of the committee mentioned, said he had investigated thoroughly the charges against Dietrich, and had looked into the matter, and such matters had never before gone to the committee on privileges and elections, and he advised the adoption of the resolution as submitted. The resolution was adopted.

Another resolution providing for the necessary expenditures of this investigation will be introduced by Dietrich for reference to the committee on contingent expenses of the Senate.

The joint resolution authorizing certain officers of the Treasury Department to audit and certify to certain counties of Arizona was passed.

Tillman's resolution instructing the Secretary of the Treasury to send to the Senate the report of the investigation of the appointment of William D. Crum as Collector of the port of Charleston, S. C., was laid before the Senate.

Morgan Scores Panama Minister.

Morgan took the floor in support of his resolution calling on the Attorney-General to report whether he has, on behalf of the United States, purchased from the Panama Canal Company, under the terms of the treaty, the right to the canal.

Morgan declared there is a spirit of political domination toward the minority in the Senate which regards as less majestic any effort to secure legislation than the President's part in affairs in which the Senate is interested.

Under the circumstances he could not bind himself to a contract to be filled out by the Panama Canal Company, under the terms of Article XXII of the treaty that company would have the right to do. Under that article Morgan asserted there is no limit as to the amount to be paid to the company.

Morgan asserted that Panama could have no choice but to do the will of the canal project. This could not, however, explain the voluntary act of the United States in tying its own hands in the interest of the company. In this connection, he discussed the part played by the Republic of France in the negotiations, saying the United States had made in Article XXII a surrender to fraud and iniquity, and it had done so under pressure from France.

Discussing the terms of the treaty, Morgan declared that in effect it had been made between the United States and the Panama Canal Company, and he said the company could "afford to pay to Panama \$10,000,000 of her winnings in a game which was without an equal in the matter of depravity."

Holds Him Persons Non Grata.

Morgan traced the connection of M. Bunau-Varilla with the Panama revolution, and declared that according to his own showing Bunau-Varilla should be pronounced persona non grata in the United States. He asserted that if a member of Congress were guilty of such conduct as Bunau-Varilla had been guilty of, he would be made the subject of "condign punishment." He asserted that the Panama Canal Company had never done an honest day's work on the canal, and declared that the intrusion of that company into the controversy was offensive and intolerable.

"About this treaty," he went on, "there is an atmosphere of degradation against which the people revolt."

Morgan closed with a reference to his long advocacy of an isthmian canal, and to the attitude of the South toward the canal project, saying that section was still "unmoved by mercenary temptations."

"The people of the South will pity and forgive, but will not forget, such as can find excuse, in their fears of upstart despots, for the acceptance of gifts that are stained with fraud and are gathered from the wreck of the Constitution, the statutes enacted by Congress and the laws of the nation. We cannot, if we would, convince those who live of those who will live, that it is honorable, or just, or reasonable to assist any man who may be President in the violation of the Constitution and the laws of the land. We cannot mark down the people of the South to the figure, in commercial politics, that accepts a favor of any party or any man as the price of its support of men who disregard laws and transgress the
