

FULTON ON CANAL

Oregon Senator Urges Ratification of the Treaty.

COLOMBIANS A BAD LOT

Action of the President in the Panama Revolution Requires No Apology and World's Commerce Demands Waterway.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The Senate today passed the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill without discussion, and then renewed consideration of the Isthmian question. Fulton spoke of the course of the Administration in connection with the Panama revolution, and Carmack and Overman in opposition thereto. Overman had not hitherto made his position on the treaty known, and his speech revealed the attitude of probably the last doubtful member of the Senate.

The Senate first took up the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill. All the amendments suggested by the committee on appropriations were adopted and the bill was passed.

Overman, of North Carolina, then spoke on the Panama question. He announced his opposition to the canal treaty on the ground that the United States had violated the obligations of the provision of the treaty of 1846. Carmack also stated his views in opposition to the treaty, saying he felt impelled to do so because of the fact that he had received a number of petitions asking him to support it.

Carmack announced his great desire that there should be a canal, but said he did not believe that the fate of the canal is involved in the treaty, because he was satisfied that if the President could not get a canal via the Panama route he would follow the Spooner plan and accept the Nicaragua route.

"Much as the President likes to have his own way, he likes better to be President," Carmack remarked in the abolition of a postoffice in Mississippi and declared the President has held up as a model a Governor of a Northern state who had given refuge in his state to a murderer whose crime had been committed in a Southern state.

Carmack also charged that the President has spoken with contempt of Congress, and said he should be taught that "he is not the entire Government." Carmack then spoke of Minister Bunau-Varilla as a "base intruder and a characterful adventurer."

In conclusion he expressed the opinion that the treaty would be ratified and said that "no doubt the President will rejoice at his triumph over justice and law." Fulton spoke for the treaty. He spoke of the proposed canal as the greatest enterprise that the world has ever been engaged in. He said, he said, found no difficulty in inducing the course of the Administration in Panama, but contended that Congress had no power to enter into an inquiry into that course, because the President was acting within his constitutional powers.

Fulton spoke of Colombia as a country for which it was impossible to do anything because of the character of its people, of whom he said that "their disbeliever is not the natural instinct of a race of buccaners." He said President Roosevelt needed no defense against Carmack's attacks and added, "whether the President should again be called to that high office or not, his future reputation would be that of one of the ablest and most patriotic of Presidents."

Fulton also said that while the Democrats now praise President McKinley, it had been only a few months since he was being denounced by them as a tyrant. He contended that Roosevelt was the choice of the people for President, and predicted his election by such a majority as had never before been known.

Fulton concluded at 3:54 P. M. and immediately afterward the Senate went into executive session, and at 4:30 P. M. adjourned.

GOD POINTS IN CANAL TREATY

Cullom Fully Explains Them and Says a Vote Will Soon Be Taken.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—In the executive session of the Senate today the Panama Canal treaty was taken up for formal consideration and Senator Cullom, chairman of the committee on foreign relations, who has charge of the treaty, made a formal statement in explanation of its terms and advocacy of its ratification. His speech was written, and was a careful analysis of the articles of the agreement.

He explained in some detail the points in which this treaty differs from the Hay-Herran treaty with Colombia, contending that the present agreement was far superior to the former one, in that it practically places the United States in absolute control of the canal and the canal strip. He said there need be no fear of complications on account of claims that may be made by Colombia to an interest in the canal, the Panama railroad, or the property interests on the isthmus, because all these naturally pass to the new government of Panama.

After the adjournment of the executive session, Senator Cullom expressed confidence that a vote would be secured next week.

Echo of Alaskan Decision.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Senator Lodge has issued a joint resolution directing the Secretary of Commerce and Labor to inquire into the effect of the decision of the Alaskan boundary tribunal upon the Wales Island Packing Company and report to Congress. If it has suffered damage, or is unable to continue its business by being adjudged in British territory. The resolution has been referred to the committee on claims.

House Considers Election Contest.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The House devoted the entire session today to consideration of the resolution reported from Election Committee No. 2, unseating Howell (Dem.), and declaring Connell (Rep.), who contested the election, to have been elected from the Tenth Pennsylvania District. By agreement, a vote will be taken at 3 P. M. tomorrow.

Washington Postmasters Confirmed.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The Senate today confirmed the following nominations of Postmasters: Washington—Grant C. Angle, Shelton, Judge J. J. Morrison, Lind, George Vetter, Sunnyside; William E. Baker, Colville; James W. O'Connell, Republic; John P. Sangle, Cheney.

Action on Slavery Bill Delayed.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The House committee on insular affairs today took up the bill to prohibit slavery in the Philippines, but postponed action, as it was decided to hear Secretary Taft on the subject.

Will Never Give Up Manchuria.

CHICAGO, Feb. 9.—Andrew Betschko, secretary and interpreter of the Russian Legation at Peking, who is on his way to St. Petersburg, speaking of the trouble between Russia and Japan, said: "Russia will never give up Manchuria."

THOROUGHLY CHARACTERISTIC.

One of Those Half-Truths for Which Bryan Is So Famous.

Mr. Bryan is reported to have said in his lecture of Tuesday night that "People talk about the gold standard who do not know that less than one-half of the countries of the world are using the gold standard." In one sense he was quite right. Not only some people, but all people, who talk about the gold standard "do not know that less than one-half of the countries of the world are using the gold standard." We might say the same of all the people in the world, no matter what they talk about. People cannot know a thing that does not exist, or that is not so. And it certainly is not true that "less than one-half of the countries of the world are using the gold standard." If Mr. Bryan meant to imply that such was the case, and that people who discussed the money question without knowing it were ignorant of an existing fact, his statement was open to challenge.

We have before us an authentic list of the monetary standards of the countries of the world. Thirty-four of them are set down as having the gold standard, and only nine as having the silver standard. There are some minor countries which are not on the list. Some of them might be added to the silver-standard column, such as Siam, Abyssinia, Morocco and Nepal. We are not sure but that Paraguay might also be added. If so, we should have a grand total of silver countries, 14. On the other hand, Roumania is, we believe, a gold-standard country, and so is San Domingo, so far as it has any standard, though neither of them is on the list. Thus we have a grand total of 36 gold-standard countries. Instead of "less than half," therefore, more than two-thirds of the countries of the world are using the gold standard.

It may be argued, it is true, that some of the gold-standard countries really have a bimetallic standard, such as France and Italy. That, however, savors of quibbling, because those countries are after all, "using the gold standard," though in conjunction with silver, and everybody knows that the gold member of the dual standard is the more powerful, and that if the times comes when one must yield to the other, silver will go and gold will remain. Even so, we are not sure but that more than half the countries of the world are using the single gold standard. There can be no question that more than half the population of the civilized world is under the gold standard. Thus in North America all are under gold except Mexico. In South America the great states of Brazil, Chile and Peru are under gold, while Argentina is bimetallic. In Europe, France, Italy, Spain, Greece, Switzerland and the Low Countries are bimetallic, but they are far outnumbered by Great Britain, Germany, Russia, Austria-Hungary, Scandinavia and Turkey, which have the gold standard. In Asia the chief gold countries are China, Persia and Siam. But they are counterbalanced by India, Japan and Asiatic Russia. It seems to us that Mr. Bryan's statistics are in need of revision and repair.

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ANARCHY MUST END

America Will Take Stern Action in Santo Domingo.

WISDOM GIVEN GREAT POWER

He is to protect, by force, Property interests, and Deal With Each Case on Its Own Individual Merits.

WILL BE FUTURE BLESSING.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Drastic measures will be taken by this Government to end the anarchy in Santo Domingo. Continued violation of international law, the destruction of American property and disregard of foreign interests, has convinced officials that affairs there can be best improved by force. His handling has been turned over to the Navy and Secretary Moody is sending tonight supplementary instructions to Rear-Admiral Wine, commanding the training squadron now in Dominican waters, giving him wide latitude in the course he is to follow. Rear-Admiral Wine has been told, in a word, to protect by force American interests and to deal with each case on its own merits. The reports received from the island show, as an official expressed it tonight, that the condition of affairs there is "semi-barbaric."

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FOSTER SCARED OUT

Dubois Threatens, and He Withdraws a Bill.

IDAHOAN CALLS IT MEDDLING

Could Not Get Fort Sherman Lands Sold So Long as Measure Was Pending and Said He Would Grill Washington Senator.

Washington, Feb. 9.—War between Senator Foster and Senator Dubois has been averted through the promise of the Washington man hereafter to refrain from dabbling with legislation pertaining to Idaho. Early this session Foster introduced a bill authorizing the establishment of a Soldiers' Home on the abandoned Fort Sherman Military Reservation in Idaho. Subsequently, Dubois tried to have the Interior Department sell these lands under the abandoned reservation act, but Secretary Hitchcock refused to authorize the sale because of Foster's bill, which contemplated the use of the lands.

This enraged Dubois, who went to Foster with a request that he withdraw his bill. This Foster declined to do, so Dubois yesterday introduced a resolution compelling Secretary Hitchcock to sell the Fort Sherman lands, and in offering the resolution, gave notice that he would today address the Senate, and especially the Washington Senators, with regard to it. In a private way, he notified Senator Foster that unless he withdrew his Soldiers' Home bill before this morning, he would denounce him in the open Senate for interfering with matters outside his jurisdiction. With this threat staring him in the face, Foster capitulated, and at Dubois' dictation, today wrote a letter to Secretary Hitchcock declaring he had no further interest in the establishment of a Soldiers' Home at Fort Sherman, and that he wished to see those lands sold as desired by Senator Dubois.

To make doubly sure that there would be no more interference in Idaho affairs from the State of Washington, Senator Dubois then presented a letter signed by Foster to Andrew Ankeny, and his signature was likewise attached. Armed with this document the triumphant Democratic Senator from Idaho marched upon the Interior Department, and received assurances that the Fort Sherman lands would be promptly sold at auction, after being subdivided. Having thus gained his point, he refrained from addressing the Senate this afternoon.

Stocks Slump at St. Petersburg.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 9.—Stocks slumped ominously here today. Four per cent dropped from 144 to 138, Imperials from 95 to 94, the Russian Bank of Foreign Trade from 230 to 220, International 20 points, Matascheff Petroleum 30, Nobel shares 45 points, first premium state loan 42, second premium state loan 38 and third premium state loan 34. These losses are typical. Other shares fell correspondingly.

Given Two Years for Booding.

SCANTON, Pa., Feb. 9.—Ex-Secretary of the Pennsylvania State Prison, Dr. E. B. Evans, who was convicted in the courts here of soliciting bribes, has been sentenced to two years and six months in the penitentiary. He was convicted of seeking to obtain money for a passage through the Council of an ordinance granting a franchise to a street-car company.
