This drydock should now be to accommodate the damaged menof-war. At Dainy, just across the bay, there are two drydocks, according to Lloyds Register for 1900-04, one 300 and the 630 feet long, mentioned as available for merchant vessels, but, if neces-sary, I am of the opinion that they would accommodate warships.

"At the time of my visit to Port Arthur the Russian government had begun to discourage any commercial extension there by putting an embargo on enterof that kind for the purpose of riving them to Dainy, which it desires to make the commercial metropolis of that section, leaving Port Arthur exclus-Talen Hwan Bay from Port Arthur, at the southeastern extremity of the Manrian peninsula. In 1899 Russia had deoted a large tract of land to the build-ing of a city. Under the direction of Valdemar Sakaroff, the celebrated eneer, work had been begun and was under way.
