Cleveland Gives Democrats Advice.

GOOD CHANCE FOR SUCCESS

Obsolete Issues Should Be Manfully Abandoned.

TARIFF REFORM ISSUE URGED

Ex-President Does Not Think Geographical Location Should Figure in Selection of the Next Presidential Candidate.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 17.—In an article written for this week's Saturday Evening Post, ex-President Cleveland urges his rank and file associates "of the Democratic party to unite and take advantage of the opportunities of next November. 'I am one of those,' he writes, 'who believe that there is an opportunity for Democratic success in the coming Presidential election. Though attachment to the party in which I am enlisted, and an intense desire for its ascendancy, make such a belief exceedingly welcome, they certainly do not create it. It is built upon an unshaken and abiding trust in the patriotism and intelligence of my fellow countrymen.'

Mr. Cleveland's paper opens with a reiteration of the declaration that he made three years ago, "that our fighting forces will respond listlessly and faithfully if summoned to a third defeat in a strange cause, but if they hear the rallying cry of true Democracy, they will gather for battle with old-time Democratic enthusiasm and courage."

"This is no time for cunning finesse, nor for the use of words that conceal intentions or carry a double meaning. The Democratic party has a message to send to its followers and to the masses of the American people. Let that message be expressed in language easily understood, unconfused by evasion and untouched by the taint of juggling. Obsolete issues and questions no longer challenging popular interest should be manfully abandoned."

Mr. Cleveland urges tariff reform, pleads for economy in the expenditure of public money, and charges the opposition with having made promises and broken them. He arraigns the Administration's Philippine policy and refers to the isthmian canal in these words:

"The Democratic party has been consistent and unswerving in its advocacy of an inter-oceanic canal and, with the liveliest satisfaction, looked forward to the day when such a highway of commerce, built under the auspices of our Government, would be contributed by America to the world's progress and civilization. It is, nevertheless, not within the mandate of the Democratic creed that in consummating so noble an enterprise as this, the territorial rights of any other nation should be disregarded, or that our own National good faith should be subjected to reasonable suspicion."

Mr. Cleveland concludes as follows: "At such a time as this, the Democratic party cannot, with honor, undertake the heavy burden of the people except under a leader that not only represents its best traditions and purposes, but fully realizes what is meant by the tremendous issues of the conflict; and his selection should not depend upon so small a consideration as the locality whence he comes."

"The Democracy's opportunity is already in sight, but only in a campaign waged in reliance on the people's love of country and devotion and National morality under leadership that personifies the sentiments would be found Democracy's hope."

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cants, certain unsurveyed tracts in the Olympia, Wash., land district, containing 2400 acres, selected in the name of C. W. Clarke, Frederick A. Hyde Will Resist Extradition.
SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17.—Fred A. Hyde, who was indicted jointly with John A. Benson by the grand jury of Washington, D. C., for alleged conspiracy in connection with land frauds in several Western States, is an attorney of this city. Mr. Hyde stated tonight that he did not propose to be taken to Washington for trial and that he would fight extradition. He characterized the indictment as a dragnet effort to secure evidence against Benson on an earlier indictment for alleged bribery. He declared he knew nothing of any bribery, and had never engaged in a conspiracy to defraud the Government.

"I do not believe, however, that a warrant will be sent here for my arrest," he said.

Germany Pressing Toward Tibet.
VANCOUVER, B. C., Feb. 17.—Mail advices from the Far East state that Germany has a small expedition pressing toward Tibet. It is in the guise of a scientific traveling party, but it is known that there are three of the Kaiser's army officers and one doctor. When last heard from they had reached Chongtu, the capital of Szechuan Province. They left there for Yachon, en route to Tibet, from whence they intend to travel into India and go home via Calcutta.

Expert Mining Engineers Meet.
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 17.—Expert mining engineers from all parts of the United States gathered here today in annual convention and discussed questions concerning the advancement of the science of engineering. Much of today's session was devoted to the subject of iron and

steel, and many papers on this branch of the profession were read. There was an informal discussion on the fact of many of the steel-ribbed buildings in Baltimore succumbing to the flames, and it is probable that a thorough investigation will be made, with a view of presenting recommendations to members of the Engineers' Association that will overcome the tendency of steel to give way to heat.

REBELS COMPLETELY ROUTED.

Bold Attempt is Made to Storm the City of Santiago.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—A savage attack on the City of Santiago has resulted in the complete rout of rebels by government forces, says a Herald dispatch from Puerto Plata, Santo Domingo. Many were killed and wounded on both sides.

For some time an attack has been expected. Tuesday the revolutionists entered the city unopposed until they had reached the Government House. Then the government forces opened fire. The rebels answered, and the battle raged for several hours.

Potin Espallat, one of the rebel leaders, fell with a bullet wound that broke his leg. Fanchito Perez and many other revolutionists were killed, and, seeing that their attack was futile, the rebels fled, closely pursued by the government soldiers.

Espallat was left on the field of battle and made a prisoner by the government troops.

The government losses are not stated, but two officers are known to have been killed, and several men wounded.

Panama Canal Case Adjourned.

PARIS, Feb. 17.—The hearing of the case of the Republic of Colombia against the Panama Canal Company, in which the former seeks to prohibit the Panama Canal Company from ceding its property rights to a foreign government, to compel the company to admit the representatives of Colombia to its future meetings, was adjourned today until March 9.

LIMA, Peru, Feb. 17.—No new cases of bubonic plague have developed at Pisco during the last seven days, and it is hoped that the outbreak has been stamped out.

POOLROOM MEN ARE WANTED.

Illinois Crusade Results in Issuance of Warrant for Senator.

MADISON, Ill., Feb. 17.—Victor Schuler, of St. Louis, was arrested here tonight by the Sheriff of Madison County, Ill., on a warrant charging him with being the custodian of funds used for the furtherance of a pool-room enterprise. Sheriff Crowe also has a warrant for the arrest of State Senator David Nelson, of Missouri, who resides in St. Louis, charging Senator Nelson with being a pool seller and connected with the management of a pool-room in Madison, across the river from St. Louis.

The warrants were issued upon information filed in the County Court at Edinburg, Ill., by citizens of Madison. A pool-room war has been waged for some time by the citizens' committee of Madison and the matter was recently investigated by the Madison County Grand Jury, which took no action was taken by the body. The information was sworn to by two citizens followed. Unless Senator Nelson appears on the Illinois side, it is probable the warrant cannot be served upon him.

HONEYMOON IS INTERRUPTED

Missouri Representative is Charged With Bigamy.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 17.—Representative W. H. Locker, of Wayneville, Mo., a member of the State Legislature, arrived from Duluth, Minn., tonight on his wedding trip and was met at the hotel by a Deputy Sheriff armed with divorce papers on behalf of a former wife, charging him with bigamy.

Locker was married January 10 to Miss Lucy La Due, the daughter of a prominent manufacturer of Duluth. He alleged tonight that several years ago he had been married to Miss Nora Hill near Wayneville. He said that recently he had applied for and secured a divorce in the circuit court at Clayton, in St. Louis County. The former makes the charge that the divorce was illegal on the ground that Locker was not a resident of St. Louis County, and contends she is still his wife. The summons demand that Locker appear in March to answer to the charge preferred by his former wife.

BLANCHE BATES GROWS ANGRY

Still She Has to Be Searched Before She Can Attend Chicago Trial.

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—(Special.)—Blanche Bates, who is appearing here in "The Darling of the Gods," insisted upon attending the trial of the car-barn bandits. The bandits tried to dissuade her, but she was firm, so they led her to an ante-room, where a matron searched her thoroughly. A dangerous-looking baton and a small knife were confiscated. By this time the actress was blazing with anger, and to mollify her she was given a seat beside the Judge.

The deputies are particularly active in searching all spectators, and several society women anxious to see the bandits have become very angry when informed that they must be searched before gaining admittance. There is much apprehension lest some friend smuggle a weapon to the desperate prisoners.

SMACKS OF FRAUD IN MONTANA

Italian Miner Tells How He Secured Naturalization Papers.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Statements of Giovanni Morrelli, an Italian miner of Butte, who was stopped by the immigration authorities here on his return from a visit to Italy, indicates, it is said, wholesale naturalization frauds in Montana. Morrelli was found to be suffering from a valvular disease of the heart and was ordered deported. He produced his Americanization papers, issued by the County Court at Butte, Mont., but admitted that he first came to America only three years ago.

He alleged he did not know about the residence qualifications and that hundreds of Italian miners in Butte like him had secured full citizenship papers without having resided here the necessary period. He was placed under arrest for having fraudulent naturalization papers.

Will Name Canal Board Today.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 17.—Governor Odell will nominate to the Senate tomorrow an advisory board of five expert engineers to carry out the plans for the enlargement of the state canals, authorized by the act of the Legislature and ratified at the November election.

The plan contemplated the expenditure of \$100,000,000 in the construction of a 1000-ton barge waterway. State Engineer and Surveyor Bond will be chairman of the committee and will resign his state office to accept the position.

Duties on Steel and Iron Raised.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 17.—A Presidential decree announced today fixes new and increased rates of duty on iron and steel and other products. This is designed to protect the new steel works here.

able to bring about the nomination of McClellan.

"He made a good Congressman and a good Mayor, and is getting bigger and broader all the time," declared State Senator Plunkett, one of the strong Tammany men the other day. "If we elected him President he would give us an administration to be proud of."

Ex-United States Senator David B. Hill, the engineer-in-chief of the Parker boom, declines to discuss for publication these latest developments in the political situation. He is carefully studying the conditions that exist, however, and is at present undecided whether to fight or surrender.

The Murphy men declare that a precedent exists for an unopposed delegation because both in 1896 and 1900 the delegations went to the National Conventions unopposed.

But in neither of those years did the New Yorkers have a candidate or present the claims of anyone from the Empire State. Now there are any New Yorker who would have taken the nomination.

In 1876 the delegates were instructed for Tilden, in 1884 and 1888 for Cleveland, and in 1892 for Hill, although Cleveland was nominated.

Thus for the first time in a decade New York Democrats with New York candidates will go to a National Convention unopposed.

It looks mighty blue for Parker.

"LILY WHITES" PUT UP TICKET

Louisiana Republicans Heartily Indorse Administration of Roosevelt.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 17.—The Republican State Convention, composed of what is known as the "lily-white" element, adopted a platform and nominated a full state ticket here today. Every precinct in the state was represented, but there were no negro delegates.

The platform adopted is largely devoted to state affairs. The supremacy of the Caucasian race is asserted. The convention heartily indorses the Administration of President Roosevelt, and pledges its support for his re-election. Ex-Mayor W. J. Behan is the candidate for Governor.

The faction of the Republicans here which made the nomination today is in control of the Federal offices. The other faction includes the negro in its support. It is expected to put out a ticket in the April election. It will also send delegates to Chicago.

WISCONSIN HAS CANDIDATE.

Edward C. Wall Will Be Boomed in Democratic Presidential Race.

MILWAUKEE, Feb. 17.—About 50 prominent Democrats from throughout Wisconsin gathered in an executive session at the Plankinton House today in the interest of the candidacy of Edward C. Wall, of this city, for the Presidential nomination at the St. Louis National Convention. Resolutions were adopted proclaiming Mr. Wall to the Democrats of the Nation as a worthy leader and urging all Democrats of Wisconsin to join in an effort to have him nominated for President. Mr. Wall was formerly National committeeman and state chairman of Wisconsin.

TOWNE DROPS FREE SILVER.

He Says the Democrats of the West Do Not Want It as an Issue.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—In a speech before the Democratic Club, ex-Senator Charles A. Towne has declared, in discussing the next platform of his party, that the Democrats of the West are willing to relegate the silver issue. The free-silver question, he is quoted as having said, has been settled by an increase in the world's gold supply, and while matters remain as they are the people do not care anything about it.

Out of Race for Senator.

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 17.—D. E. Thompson, United States Minister to Brazil, today announced that he would not again be a candidate for United States Senator from Nebraska. He believes he can perform better service as Minister of Brazil. He was a candidate for Senator during the great struggle which resulted in a compromise on Charles E. Ditch.
