

HONOR ITS OWN

Cleveland Prepares to Pay Hanna Tribute.

REMAINS ARE EN ROUTE

State Funeral at Washington Is Highly Impressive.

FEELING ADDRESS BY HALE

President, Cabinet Officers, Members of Congress and Other Noted Men Assemble About the Bier of the Statesman.

CLEVELAND, Feb. 17.—In accordance with the wishes of the Hanna family it has been decided that no remarks of a eulogistic nature shall be made in St. Paul's Church at the funeral services over the remains of Senator Hanna, which will be held Friday, and the services will consist only of the ritualistic services of the Episcopal Church.

A memorial meeting, however, will be held at the Chamber of Commerce Saturday afternoon, when prominent citizens will deliver addresses on the life and work of the deceased statesman.

Practically all business will be suspended in Cleveland for the greater part of Friday as a mark of respect to the memory of Senator Hanna. The banks will close at noon, and stores and manufacturing establishments will suspend business for the remainder of the day. All street-cars in this city will become motionless for five minutes at 1 P. M., the hour set for the beginning of the funeral services at St. Paul's Church.

The attendance of notable men at the funeral promises to be large. Besides Senator Foraker, three Secretaries of the President's Cabinet, Messrs. Taft, Wilson and Cretelyon, and the delegation from the Senate and House of Representatives, there will also be in attendance the Ohio State Legislature of about 150 men, who will come from Columbus on a special train.

Governor Herrick and staff and ex-Governor Nash and 10 friends will also attend. So far as known, Governor Durbin, of Indiana, is the only state executive outside of Ohio coming to the funeral. Governor Durbin will be accompanied by his staff.

SERVICES IN THE SENATE.

Audience One of the Most Distinguished to Ever Grace Chamber.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Without pomp or ceremony, the remains of Senator Hanna today were conveyed from the Arlington Hotel to the Senate chamber where the official exercises were conducted. The pallbearers were composed of a detachment of the United States Marine Corps, the command of a lieutenant, and the cortege was preceded by a platoon of mounted city police.

Throughout the forenoon, a number of friends called at the hotel and were permitted to view the remains. The room in which the dead statesman lay was banked with floral tributes as to almost his feet. Upon the table of the late Senator's coat was the insignia of the Loyal Legion, and the casket was enveloped in a huge American flag belonging to that organization.

Before the casket was sealed, the members of the family, with the exception of Mrs. Hanna, took a last look at the remains. Not since the Senator passed away has Mrs. Hanna seen the remains, she preferring to remember him as in life. The services in the Senate were conducted in the presence of the grief-stricken family, of many friends, whose sorrow was expressed in a more impressive proceeding. The floor of the chamber was filled with the representatives of the official life of the National capital, the galleries with people from all the higher walks of society, including the families of officials and many persons of distinction in the professional and business world. The hall is not of great dimensions and admission to the galleries was so regulated that there was no crowding. The demand for tickets was such that it could have been met the space would have been filled many times over.

Ceremony Dignified and Simple.

The ceremony was dignified and simple in observance with his character. The Senate chamber lent itself naturally to the occasion. It is especially barren of decorations, and the dark furniture, heavy walls and subdued light were quite in keeping with the solemn proceedings which were the occasion of the gathering. In the front rank of the eminent assemblage gathered immediately about the bier of the departed statesman sat the President. He was flanked by the members of his Cabinet, all of whom had been closely affiliated with Senator Hanna by ties of friendship and political association. Near by were the Chief Justice and the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States, seated in their black robes of office, which fitted well into the scene of sorrow. There were scarcely any absences from among the members of the Senate. Each and all of them were visibly affected, and it was not difficult to detect in their sorrowful countenances the sense of personal loss that all felt in Mr. Hanna's death.

His Desk Heavily Draped. The desk of his late colleague was heavily draped. The religious ceremony was fittingly placed in the hands of Dr. Edward Everett Hale, chaplain of the Senate, giving it an official character, while preserving its solemnity and insuring its simple dignity.

The ceremony began shortly after 12

o'clock, but the gallery doors were thrown open long before that hour, and by 1 o'clock fully half the gallery seats were occupied, mostly by women.

No order of any kind was maintained at the Capitol in the arrival of participants in the service. The President reached the east portico of the Senate wing at 11:55 A. M., accompanied by Mr. Loeb, his secretary. They proceeded at once to the President's room where they were joined by Cabinet members. The members of the President's family came soon after, and were assigned to seats in the members' gallery, where they were joined by Mr. Loeb after the President and Cabinet had entered the Senate chamber. Members of the diplomatic corps came individually and assembled in the Senate reception room. It was just noon when the members of Senator Hanna's family arrived. Mrs. Hanna came on the arm of her son, Dan R. Hanna, and Mrs. Daniel Hanna on the arm of H. M. Hanna. They were followed by Mr. and Mrs. McCormick and Mr. and Mrs. Parsons, Miss Phelps and personal friends of the family.

The casket was borne into the chamber by a squad of Capitol police, headed by Sergeant-at-Arms Randall, of the Senate, and was immediately followed by the official committee, with Senator Foraker and General Grovernor at its head. Slowly and with little procession moved down the main aisle of the chamber, and the casket was tenderly placed upon the catafalque which was to hold it.

Wealth of Flowers.

The hall was banked with flowers, which had been sent in great profusion by friends. There was a large wreath of orchids surrounding a cross of violets from the President. The Senate contributed an immense wreath of orchids, carnations, roses and violets. Rise as if With One Impulse.

Senator Frye, as President pro tempore, stood in front of his chair as the body was borne to its resting place. All the people in the galleries rose as if with one impulse as the casket was borne to its place. The pallbearers had scarcely retired when the Senate was called to order by Speaker Cannon at its head was announced, and the members of that body filed slowly in, taking the seats previously assigned to them, the Senators and visitors in the galleries rising.

Speaker Cannon took his place at the left of President Pro Tem Frye. Then came the Ambassadors and Ministers from foreign countries, who were given the seats next to the front row of the Senate chamber, and they were immediately followed by Admiral Dwyer and Major-General Gillespie, representing the Army and Navy. The Chief Justice and Associate Justices of the Supreme Court were seated in the galleries next to the President and his Cabinet occupied the front row of seats at the right of the presiding officer.

Twenty minutes later Mrs. Hanna, leaning heavily upon the arm of her son, Dan

R. Hanna, entered the chamber and took a seat in the front row on the left of the presiding officer. She was followed by her daughters and their husbands and other members of the family and immediate friends, all of whom were given seats in the immediate vicinity of the casket. Every one present rose as the family entered and remained standing until they had been seated. President Pro Tem Frye then addressed the Senate, saying:

"You have solemnly and lovingly dedicated this day to an observance of a proper funeral ceremony over Marcus A. Hanna, late a distinguished member of this body, and all business will be suspended until this day is over."

"We will unite in prayer with the chaplain of the National House of Representatives."

Chaplain Corder, who occupied a seat by the side of Chaplain Hale, of the Senate, immediately in front of the presiding officer, offered up an invocation. Immediately afterward Dr. Hale delivered his funeral address. He did not use his notes in speaking, but never forgot a word, and although a man of over 80 years of age, his voice penetrated every corner of the hall.

Mr. Hale began his sermon, as follows: "Those who knew him best, loved him most, and those who knew him little loved him much."

The speaker then described Hanna as a man who seemed to apply to the methods of business men of honor. In conclusion, Dr. Hale said: "Honor, truth and love: Go to the bottom and these are what win success. A square bolt will not fit a round hole. The side of a steamship. Truth—unless my word is as good as my note, my note will be looked at coldly when I offer it for discount. And unless I pursue the duty God has given me, with an eager love of those who have fallen down, or those who have stumbled; unless in my strength I bear the infirmities of the weak; ah, woe is me! Love: And so, when men tell us what is true, that this man more than any other could mediate between the men who provide the tools and the men who handle them; that this man had the confidence of the workman, and of the man whose father was a workman; or the man who, like himself, had made nature his star, and ruled things with what is godly power. You understand what worked the miracle. You can work it yourself. "These three adder: Faith, Hope and Love."

After a prayer with which Dr. Hale closed his sermon, the Goldenrod Quartet sang "Nearer, My God, to Thee." This was the last tribute to an organization with which Senator Hanna had been great favorite, and was a tender and delicate farewell from those who had known and loved him.

Many Are Visibly Affected.

While the religious services were in progress, suppressed sobs were heard in many parts of the chamber. Postmaster General Payne, who had been for years associated with Mr. Hanna on the National Committee, was among those most affected. Secretary Hitchcock also was visibly touched.

The hymn concluded, President Pro Tem Frye addressed the assembly, saying: "We commit the body of our beloved Senator Hanna to the committee of the houses of Congress and to the officers of the Senate, to be conveyed to his late home in Ohio and to his final resting place."

"May God sanctify his life and death to us who loved him well."

The services were then closed with a benediction by Dr. Hale. The visitors and family then withdrew, the family followed by the President and Cabinet. The Senate then at 1 o'clock, on motion of Senator Lodge, adjourned.

Many persons who had occupied the galleries during the services left the Capitol building with apparent reluctance. It was not generally known that the remains were not to lie in state, and as soon as the people were dismissed a crush occurred around the Senate chamber doors by reason of the large number seeking admission to gaze for the last time on a face known widely and loved by all. The order to clear the galleries was given, however, and within an hour the chamber and the galleries had been closed against the public. The remains were left at rest in the closed chamber, surrounded by the floral offerings and under a guard of Capitol police.

Among the distinguished men from New York who attended the funeral services at the Senate chamber were former Secretary of the Interior Cornelius N. Bliss, John J. McCook, president of the Ohio Society, J. Pierpont Morgan, James J. Hill, and Clement A. Griscom, president of the International Navigation Company.

TRIBUTE OF CHAPLAIN HALE.

Those Who Knew the Senator Best Loved Him Most.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The remarks of Chaplain Hale at the state funeral of Senator Hanna were, in part, as follows: "Those who knew him best, loved him most. And those who knew him little, loved him much. "You speak of no one else as you go

and come in these days; and this is the expression which is made, as if I were like me—almost a stranger to him personally. I knew him very little, and I have felt his power and charm. There are a hundred men who are describing him better than I am to describe him. Every one present rose as the family entered and remained standing until they had been seated. President Pro Tem Frye then addressed the Senate, saying: "You have solemnly and lovingly dedicated this day to an observance of a proper funeral ceremony over Marcus A. Hanna, late a distinguished member of this body, and all business will be suspended until this day is over."

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Qualities That Demand Success.

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House Adjourns as Mark of Respect.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The House adjourned 15 minutes before the noon hour today in order that arrangements might be perfected to go in a body to the Senate chamber to participate in the funeral services over the late Senator Hanna. The members returned from the Senate shortly after 1 o'clock. Immediately upon resuming Mr. Payne arose and said: "As a further mark of respect to the deceased Senator, I move the House do now adjourn."

The House then adjourned until tomorrow.

ASKS ALL OHIO TO PAY TRIBUTE

Governor Herrick Requests Suspension of Business All Over State.

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 17.—Governor Herrick telephoned from Washington this afternoon instructions for the issuance of a supplementary proclamation requesting that as a further mark of respect to the memory of the late Senator all business in the state be suspended for five minutes, from 1 to 1:05 P. M., Friday, during the funeral service at Cleveland.

The joint resolution drawn up by the committee of state officers and members of the Legislature says the following tribute to the late Senator:

"Three times in the space of five weeks Ohio has been shocked and grieved by the death of a distinguished citizen, whose leadership among his fellow men gained for him the highest popular favor. Two of these have filled the Governor's chair with conspicuous ability: the third, facile princeps, as chief of his party organization, as Senator in the Congress, as statesman, as broad-minded statesman and philanthropic citizen, was one of the most influential men of his time. Emerging from private life, he rose to a high position and from the beginning much misunderstood and most abused, not to say cordially hated, by those who did not know him, in a few days he had won the admiration of all and had won the trustful love of both. Marcus A. Hanna was a masterful man, but he was also a man of high and honorable purposes and of genial disposition. He was straight to the mark, but there was nothing sinister in his methods. He was always out in the open, honest, zealous, frank and fair. With such methods he won success and fairly earned the remarkable endorsement which called out that proud and happy utterance which is still ringing in our ears: 'He shall be the greatest of us.' His untimely death is a great loss to our country and to the Republic."

REMAINS BEING BORNE HOME.

Grief-Stricken Relatives Begin Their Journey to Cleveland.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The train bearing the remains of Senator Hanna left Washington for Cleveland at 6 o'clock tonight. On the train were all the members of the late Senator's family and a number of personal friends. The casket was placed in the Pullman sleeping car and in this space the casket was placed. Around it were banked the many floral offerings, and nearly every seat remaining in the car held one or more of these perfumed burdens. The car carrying the remains was the first in the train.

DICK IN THE LEAD

Congressman Likely to Take Place of Hanna.

DEAD MAN DESIRED AS MUCH

Ohio Republican Leader Tells of a Conference Which Precludes the Entrance of Governor Herrick in the Race.

WHO DICK IS.

Charles Dick is now serving his fourth term as a member of the House of Representatives. He is 44 years of age, and a lawyer by profession. He has long been a leader in Ohio politics, and was intimately associated with the late Senator Hanna in the canvass for McKinley's nomination and the campaign following. In this connection, he served as secretary of the National Republican Committee, 1897-1900.

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the Governor's chair, as that would throw the office into the hands of the Foraker element of the party by making Herrick Governor. There were certain agreements to be carried out, and a change in the Governor's office would violate these promises. Hanna was anxious to carry Cuyahoga County, and by making the concession to his opponents in Herrick's nomination, he believed he would be able to do so. For this reason it is believed that Governor Herrick cannot entertain for an instant the idea of going to the Senate and the Hanna followers, including Herrick himself, must support Dick for the Senate.

While many names are being mentioned, all are mere speculations, and those who give the situation serious consideration are growing firmer in the belief that Dick will be the man.

CLEVELAND, BLACK AND WHITE

Many Evidence That Death of its Famous Citizen Is Mourned.

CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 17.—The committee having in charge the arrangements for the funeral of the late Senator Hanna announced today that in order to give all who desire an opportunity to view the remains, the body will lie in state at the Chamber of Commerce Thursday from 1 to 5:30 P. M. and on Friday from 8 to 11 A. M. The doors of the chamber will be closed at 9:30 Thursday evening and Monday morning, Feb. 19, of which Senator Hanna was a member, will hold memorial services around the catafalque. The city is rapidly taking on a garb of white and black, many buildings being draped in these colors. Every streetcar running in the city today carried festoons of black upon the front and sides. For a brief period during the day services at St. Paul's Church, on Friday, the electric power will be turned off and all streetcars be brought to a standstill.

Mineworkers to Show Their Regret.

While there he was shown the casts of the death mask made of Senator Hanna by U. S. G. Dunbar, the sculptor. He agreed with the members of the Hanna family that the likeness was notably fine.
