

ALL LAND ON RAFT

How Crew of the Fulton Escaped From Wreck.

MATE INGLESSEN IS DROWNED

Details Tell How Helpless Steamer Drifted on Beach—Repeated Efforts to Land Life-Line at Last Prove Successful.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

L. W. Shaw, of the California & Oregon Coast Steamer Company, returned to Marshfield today with the members of the crew of the ill-fated steamer Fulton, bringing the first authentic detail of the wreck. The Fulton hung to her anchor two days in the southeast gale in Port Orford harbor. Her fuel supply being short, Captain Fulton did not dare lift his anchors to move. Thursday noon last, when the storm was at its height, the starboard anchor chain parted and the vessel began to drift. Captain Lee, seeing that all hopes of saving his boat were gone, slipped the port chain, and with just enough steam to turn the boat, headed her for the beach. When she struck, she broached to and the sea began to sweep her deck.

The boats were ordered lowered. Second Mate Inglessen and two sailors were in the first boat, to take a life-line to shore. The boat was capsized and the mate struck by a piece of lumber and drowned. The two sailors clung to the drifting cargo and drifted shoreward and were picked up by the people on land, almost exhausted. The lives on the ship were in imminent danger. The deck had been stripped from the decks, and it looked like certain death.

In the moment of peril Ed Elwell, chief cook, volunteered to take a life ashore, and went so far as to the light around his waist and was about to jump into the sea, when his shipmates made him give up his idea. Finally, by means of a float, a life was drifted to within reach of shore and made fast. Thus, with the use of the life-raft, the remainder of the Fulton's human cargo was landed safely, but only two at a time were carried on the raft, and every trip some one was washed overboard but managed to get back. The last to reach shore was Captain Lee, and it was then getting dark.

The survivors are: Captain Lee, First Mate A. Hansen, Chief Engineer B. A. Connolly, First Assistant Engineer, J. E. Scott, Fireman G. Turner, and T. Hovey; Seamen G. Carlson, P. Willard, G. Gustafson, A. Forren, P. Wilson, J. Johnson, S. Johnson, Cook Ed Elwell, Walter Max Koenig.

The Fulton lies high up on the sea wall and can be reached dry-shod at low tide. There is a belief that she can be saved in fair weather.

WILL WORK FOR DIVISION.

Long Creek Starts Movement and John Day Will Fight.

JOHN DAY, Feb. 18.—(Special.)—A message from Long Creek states that the citizens' meeting, called to determine the advisability of county division, was largely attended. A number of speeches, all in support of the proposed division, were made and heartily cheered, after which resolutions declaring in favor of forming a new county were introduced and passed unanimously. A permanent organization for the purpose of carrying on a campaign for a new county was effected. Al Porter was made president, and T. P. Hall secretary. Regular meetings will be held on the cause advanced in every way possible.

Circulars containing an appeal to the voters of Grant County are to be prepared and sent out by the Long Creek committee, and, finally, petitions circulated. Committees were appointed for all the purposes.

It is understood that Prairie City has offered encouragement to the advocates of a new county, in the way of a return for signatures from that section to the petition for removing the county seat from Canyon City to Prairie City. It is also given out that Canyon City will not oppose the plans for forming a new county, as a large number living in the section territory signed the remonstrance against such action.

This leaves the central part of the county, to fight the battle for territorial integrity practically alone. If it is to be maintained.

Sentiment here on this, as on the county seat relocation question, is not unambiguous, but when the time comes to get together, united action in favor of the best interests of the whole county will be taken. At least, this is the opinion of leading business men and politicians.

RIDING A LOG TO THE OCEAN.

Sacramento River Sweeps Away a Helpless, Shouting Man.

REDDING, Cal., Feb. 18.—The great mystery left by the identity and fate of the man who was seen Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock about by Kenneth astride a log in the middle of the Sacramento River, shouting loudly for help from those on shore. Had it been possible to do so the score or more of people who saw the unknown man's perilous plight would have given him succor, but he was in view but a minute and was out of sight around the point and on his way to the ocean.

An hour or more later the man was seen at Old Diggins, 12 miles further down stream, by James Thompson. He again shouted for the help that was impossible for any to give.

At Kewick, two miles farther down, he was seen and heard just after dark. At Kewick, five miles below Kewick, the man was seen darting under the free bridge. Dave Lyons and Charles Maynard, at different points, heard the man's cries, but neither was close enough to recognize his features.

Inquiries have been telephoned to all points up the river to learn if any man has been missing since the storm. Inquiries have been telephoned down stream to learn whether the man made a landing, or if his body has been recovered. No replies have been received from either direction.

SEES PROSPERITY AHEAD.

C. J. Mills Says It is in Oregon and Will Stay.

LA GRANDE, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)—General Livestock Agent C. J. Mills, of the O. & N. LOVES HIS FRIEND'S WIFE

AMOROUS ITALIAN FROM PORTLAND IN TROUBLE.

He Pursues Woman to Tacoma and Is Arrested While Attempting to Force Entrance to Her Room.

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

Michele Marselle, an Italian, who speaks English poorly, was arrested last night by Captain Wiley and Detective Fitzgerald on a warrant sworn to by Mrs. Rice, who charges him with persistent attentions which have become disagreeable to her. The man was caught in the lodging-house kept by Mrs. Ambrose, 311 South Third, fourth street, by Mr. Ambrose and another lodger, when he was attempting to force his way into Mrs. Rice's room. He made a forceful struggle, but was held until the officers arrived.

According to the woman's story, Marselle is an old friend of her husband, whom she married three years ago, and who is a paralytic living in Portland. Marselle, she says, boarded at Rice's home in Portland for a while a year ago, and since then has been infatuated with her, and has urged her to secure a divorce from her invalid husband and marry him. This she has refused to do, she says, and to escape from the Italian came to Tacoma with her two children, one 3 years and the other 6 weeks old. The Italian followed her and threatened to kill both her and himself if she did not yield to his demands. He carried a revolver and a razor and boasted that no officers could arrest him.

Mrs. Rice asks to have the Italian placed under peace bonds.

DOUBLE ITS CAPACITY.

La Grande Knitting Factory Cannot Supply Demand.

LA GRANDE, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)—The La Grande Knitting Mills, the only factory of its kind in the Northwest outside of Portland, is arranging to double its capacity and has ordered a dozen new machines. The factory makes sweaters, shirts and undersuits. Suits of underwear are placed on the market all the way from \$2 to \$25 per suit, and are manufactured of cotton, wool and silk. It is now impossible for the factory to fill all the orders coming in.

This factory has been in operation in La Grande only a little over six months, and the proprietor, Mr. Davis, states that he has done such a good business in that time that he will establish another factory permanently, employ more help and enlarge the building. These goods are being purchased in all the surrounding states, and with more machinery and a larger force it will be able to fill the constant flow of orders.

Miner Falls to His Death.

BUTTE, Mont., Feb. 17.—The second

accident to happen within two days in the Anaconda mine resulted in the death of A. G. Hickock, a miner. Hickock was working on the 260-foot level, and while returning to his work from lunch, stepped into an ore chutney and fell a distance of 100 feet, his body being tightly wedged into the chute near the bottom.

The accident was not discovered until a carman working on the level below attempted to pass the car from the chutney.

As no one came down he started an investigation which resulted in the finding of the body. After several hours' hard work the mangled body was drawn out and removed to the morgue.

Large Enrollment at Monmouth.

MONMOUTH, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

The enrollment at the State Normal School for the second semester is the largest in its history. More than 100 new students have enrolled during the first week than during the entire corresponding term of last year. Among the number are many who come with state papers, and the average scholarship is high. The work of the training department under Principal Rice is giving full satisfaction to the student teachers, and practical public methods only are being used. JACKSONVILLE, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

Two Government Wharves Planned.

ASTORIA, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

Two new wharves are to be constructed in the immediate future. One will be built by the Engineers' Department, and will be known as the "Government Wharf." The other will be located down stream from the present wharf, and will be constructed in two parts, so that the rock barges can be run into the slip and the stock discharged on both sides at the same time. The other wharf will be built by the Quartermasters' Department, and plans for it have been submitted to the department in Washington for approval.

Leaps Into the River.

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 18.—Sam Kohn,

a sewing-machine agent, committed suicide today about 1 o'clock by jumping from the Division-street bridge into the Spokane River. Before jumping he removed both overcoat and undershirt, and hat. He was seen to rise once, waving his hands desperately.

Kohn was arrested in Montana last Summer on suspicion of being guilty of blowing up a Northern Pacific bridge during the time so much dynamiting was done along the Northern Pacific. He proved to be innocent of that charge.

Railroad Blockades the Street.

ASTORIA, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

A complaint was filed with the City Auditor today by Government Quarantine Officer Earle, protesting against the practice of the railroad blocking the street in front of the quarantine station by leaving cars standing upon it. The complaint asserts that, unless the practice is stopped, the matter will be reported to the Secretary of the Treasury. It will be submitted to the Council at its next session.

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WASCO CITY TO SELL BONDS.

Raise Money to Build Sewers, Water and Light Plants.

WASCO, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)—In compliance with instructions from the City Council, Mayor E. S. Catron and R. C. Atwood will meet this afternoon at 2 o'clock at Portland and negotiate immediately for the sale of bonds for the construction of water, sewerage and electric-light systems, which the city will install as soon as possible. The city charter provides that the bonded debt shall not exceed 10 per cent of the taxable property as shown by the preceding assessment roll. This last assessment was about \$40,000 less than the annual sales of one of the six general merchandise stores doing business at Wasco. The estimated actual value of all property in the city is close to \$1,000,000. This condition of affairs restricts the Council to too small an amount of money, but with judicious management the proposed improvements can be completed with the available funds at hand.

The foundations are now being laid for the construction of two two-story brick store buildings. One will be 60x100 feet and the other 80x100 feet. Also several dwelling houses are in course of construction, and others contemplated, with the opening of Spring. These improvements together with the city work, will make Wasco a busy place. The farmers are jubilant over the fall of snow now on the ground, which practically insures another big crop for Sherman County, and with prospects of good prices another harvest, they certainly have reason to feel happy.

LONG CREEK, Feb. 18.—(Special.)—At the indignation meeting recently held in this place for the purpose of expressing the disapproval of responsible business interests in regard to the blowing up of the Long Creek Ranger newspaper office, strong resolutions were adopted which were unanimously adopted. In addition to this public disapproval of the act, a certificate as to the arrest and the expression of sympathy for the work of the founders of Olympia, Wash., originator of the Oddfellows' Home in Washington and its first superintendent, died this afternoon of senile decay, aged 81. He has been in the city for several years. Mr. Swan was born in Scotland and led a picturesque life for several years on a whaling vessel, landing at San Francisco in 1858. He was one of the Puget Sound pioneers.

FINE COWS FOR DAIRYING.

Jackson County Farmer Buys Holsteins—Big Farm to Be Made.

Can't Dodge Corporation Tax.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

Attorney-General Stratton gave his opinion today to the effect that foreign corporations which have filed their articles in the Secretary of State's office are not evading the payment of the yearly license tax on the ground that they are not "doing business" in this state. A number of foreign corporations have been attempting to evade the tax by filing for non-payment. The Attorney-General says the tax is not a tax upon a corporation's property or for doing business, but upon the right to do business, and should be paid whether the right is exercised or not.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

Miss L. Hyland, advance agent for a lecture course, has reported to the police of this city the loss of a valuable trunk. Investigation shows that a negro gained access to the trunk in the depot, changed the check and then presented the duplicate to the agent. He received the trunk and it has been traced to Seattle, but all traces have been lost in that city.

Transport Dix Loses an Anchor.

OAK POINT, Wash., Feb. 18.—The steamer

Dix, when off this point yesterday morning at 11:25, suddenly showed to port and headed for the Oregon shore. Steam was shut off and her starboard anchor let go, but the chain parted and she drifted down stream for a time broadside to. After a few moments she headed her course down the river, but she left her anchor on the bottom.

For Carrying a Gun.

INDEPENDENCE, Or., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

Oliver Smith was tried before Justice Wilson on a complaint filed out by the state on the information of Marshal A. J. Tupper, charging him with carrying concealed weapons. He was convicted and a small fine imposed. Other complaints are expected to follow.

To Wind Up Defunct Bank.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 18.—(Special.)

Receiver A. B. Eastham, of the defunct National Bank, is making a list of the assets of the bank. The assets are estimated at \$100,000. The bank was organized in 1890 and had a capital of \$1,000,000. It was one of the largest banks in the Northwest.

DEALS IN SHINGLE MILLS.

Chandler Bros. Sell Theirs and Buy Bunker Sawmill.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Feb. 18.—(Special.)—Chandler Bros., the Dryad shingle-mill men, have sold their shingle business to G. A. Orr & Co., for \$16,000. The latter firm gets 40 acres of timber with the mill. The Chandler mill has 125,000 daily capacity, and the Orr mill 200,000 daily capacity. G. A. Orr's two sons, Harry and George, have associated themselves with the firm in the business, and the company has been incorporated under the name of C. A. Orr & Co., with \$50,000 capital stock.

Chandler Bros. have bought the sawmill of the Bunker Lumber Company, at Lebam. This deal was arranged through the effort of Fred Gordon, the bookkeeper for the Bunker Company, who secured an agreement from the creditors that has resulted in a sale in this way. The Chandler mill has 125,000 daily capacity. Under the deal as made the secured creditors lose only 15 per cent.
