NEWSPAPER WOMEN MAY FORM CLUB.—The newspaper women of Portland are considering the advisability of organizing a Women's Press Club, the line of similar organizations in the East. There are probably not more than ten or 12 women in Portland who are engaged in actual press work, but the number would depend on the work done, the number would not be so important a feature. The New England Press Club is said to have entertained more prominent and distinguished people than any women's club in the United States. There are other women's press clubs throughout the country which have National Reputations for the brilliant work done by their individual members. In view of the coming Exposition, when men and women representing leading journals of the country will visit Portland from time to time, the movement is considered as being timely and what is now only talk will no doubt result in the organization of a club. The New England Press Club has for its object the promotion of acquaintance and good fellowship among newspaper women; the forwarding, by concerted action through the press, of good objects on social, philanthropic and reformatory lines. The influence of the club is said to be an entertainment for the suffering poor of Boston was the nucleus of what is now known as the "Journalistic Fund," which gives aid to distressed newspaper people. The club has been of great benefit to its members, keeping alive the spirit of modern progress.

HAD WIFE WHEN HE MARRIED HER.—Bertha A. Morak was divorced from Joseph Morak by Judge Sorensen because the defendant had another wife when he married her at Walla Walla, two years ago. She was an Albin girl, and her maiden name was Ship. She was visiting a married sister in the Washington city when Morak influenced her to have the marriage ceremony performed. The truth finally came to light, and Morak fearing criminal prosecution, suddenly left Walla Walla and came to Portland. He was arrested on his arrival on a charge of bigamy and escaped by means of a writ of habeas corpus on a legal technicality. His real wife has since secured a divorce from him, and now Bertha Ship has removed any legal obstacle to Morak's obtaining a third woman to share his joys and sorrows. Morak was in Portland and one time kept a saloon in Portland.

NOAH LAMBERT ESTATE SETTLED.—The estate of Noah Lambert, deceased, has been closed and the administrator, T. T. Struble, has been discharged and his bonds exonerated. The estate was a large one, the appraised value of the property being \$15,000, and had been in course of administration a long time. Mr. Lambert died on October 27, 1894, and his widow, Mrs. Lambert, was a well-known contractor in Portland and constructed the Postoffice building which is now being remodeled.

COURT WILL NOT CLOSE BRIDGE.—No order will be issued by the court closing the Morrison-street bridge while it is being rebuilt. If any such action is taken it will be by the Pacific Construction Company, which has the contract for rebuilding. The court will, however, take the precautions to adopt such measures as will not make it liable for damages in case of accident. POOR AS A BACHELOR.—William P. Murray, a druggist, who deserted his wife, Fredonia H. Murray, in March, 1901, posed as a bachelor while he resided in Salt Lake City. Mrs. Murray testified in this fact at the trial of the divorce suit of Mrs. Murray against her husband before Judge Sorensen. The divorce was granted in March, 1902, and the court decreed that the matrimonial bonds were pronounced by the court.

MASAMAS MEET TONIGHT.—The Masammas will meet tonight on the top floor of the City Hall. The object of this meeting is to decide upon the special mountain peak that is to be visited this summer. An attractive feature of the evening will be a stereoscopic entertainment in which a collection of entirely new and very beautiful mountain photographs will be shown for the first time by George M. Webster. In addition to this there will be valuable private collections of photographs by the members and their friends. In one corner of the room may be found Swiss mountain scenes; in another a superb group of Oregon photographs, by Messrs. Reed and Oscar Klier. H. T. Bohlman will have on view his fascinating studies of bird-life, which have attracted so much attention from leading American ornithologists and Nature-lovers on the Atlantic as well as the Pacific Coast. CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCH.—The congregation of the First Church of Christ, Scientists, is growing so rapidly that it finds the present church, at Twenty-third and Irving streets, too small to accommodate its members. Accordingly the trustees have made arrangements with the Scottish Rite Masons to hold services in one of the large halls in the cathedral at Fifteenth and Morrison. There is seating capacity for from 600 to 800 persons in the new hall, and the first service there will be held tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock. A special musical programme has been prepared for the event, and many out-of-town Scientists from points in Oregon and Washington are expected. The First Church has been looking for location for some time, and this is the first opportunity it has had to secure anything that would suit all purposes. The church has a comfortable building fund, which will be continually added to, and the trustees will constantly be on the watch for a suitable property on which to build a new church. Nothing will be done in the immediate future, however, as they will now be comfortably and conveniently located in the Scottish Cathedral.

TWO MANY DOCTORS SPOILED REPORT.—"Delayed in transmission," might be written on the report just received by the State Board of Health of the case of measles in the Brooks family living near Holbrook, which occasioned much criticism. Mrs. Brooks died of the disease, but so report was received at the board office here. Dr. Linklater, of Hillsboro, had attended the woman. Now, after some weeks, a report has come in from the Health Board of Washington County, it seems that the Brooks lived on the county line, and that another doctor besides Dr. Linklater had the case in charge for a time. Each physician thought that the other would make the necessary report of a contagious disease, and so no report was forthcoming for a long time. RAZOR ENDED THE FUN.—J. E. Williams, a colored window-washer, and his razor attracted a crowd at Sixth and Alder last night. Williams is a well-known figure about the city. Yesterday his business was too good and he decided to invest some of the profits in booze. The booze was too strong and by evening he was too far gone to walk the streets peacefully. A crowd of boys met him at Sixth and Alder, and thought they would have a little fun. The colored gentleman did not like their fun, and immediately drew his razor. The boys scattered quickly and the patrol wagon was summoned. "I'm a law-abiding citizen," declared his African brother. "I won't resist these officers. I will go to jail for the first time in my life."

FEDERATED TRADERS MAY GIVE CARNTIVAL.—At the meeting of the Federated Trades Union last night the plan of a carntival was received. The plan was to have a carntival with all the unions in the city except the plumbers. The greater part of last night's meeting was taken up in the discussion of a proposition made to the council by the La Fiesta and Afroscio Amusement Company. This company wishes to bring a carntival attraction to the city June 2 to July 8, and wishes organized labor to take charge of the advertisement and promotion. The matter was considered favorably, and the members think they will accept the proposition made.

WON'T LEAVE SALER.—Rev. W. C. Kantner, of the First Congregational Church of Salem, to whom the Highland Congregational Church extended an invitation to hold services in the latter church, has declined to accept the invitation. The members of his church in Salem were much opposed to giving him up, and at a large mass meeting held Thursday evening they subscribed sufficient money to maintain a new church and asked him to remain and take charge of it. He has been unusually successful in Salem, and a refusal of the spirit manifested he has decided to remain there.

TO START PURE MILK CRUSADE.—State Board of Health Will Consider Subject at Next Meeting.

The milk of Portland and of the state is to be a purer article when the State Board of Health has finished the anti-dairy crusade, which will be begun after the meeting of the board March 31. So after the session of the board the health officers of the various counties will assemble in Portland, and plan work laid upon the schemes of the State Board of Health. Three subjects concerning dairies will be considered, says Dr. Woods Hutchinson, secretary of the board. These are water supply, pure milk production and prevention of contagious diseases. Milk throughout Oregon is not so pure as it might be, it is said, and the dairies of this city are no exception to the rule. Probably the clean-up crusade will commence in Portland. Milkmen and dairymen who now disobey the laws of health will be brought to reckoning.

NOT ENOUGH AMERICAN SHIPS.

Chamber of Commerce Thinks Lodge Bill Should Not Be Passed.

President J. W. Burns, of the Chamber of Commerce, received the following telegram yesterday from Senators Mitchell and Fulton at Washington:

"A bill on the calendar reported by Lodge of Massachusetts from the committee on the Philippines provides that on and after July 1, 1904, no merchandise shall be transported by sea under penalty of forfeiture thereof between ports of the United States and ports or places in the Philippine Archipelago, directly or via foreign ports, or for any part of the voyage, in any other than vessels of the United States. The fact is notorious that no adequate supply of American tonnage, steam especially, is available, and business would consequently be materially prejudiced; also competition in supplying commodities from other countries, such as Canada and Australia, already active competitors, would be much stimulated."

After consulting some members of the Chamber, President Burns telegraphed the following answer:

"Consider that most certainly the time should be extended several years for the proposed extension of the navigation laws to the Philippines. The fact is notorious that no adequate supply of American tonnage, steam especially, is available, and business would consequently be materially prejudiced; also competition in supplying commodities from other countries, such as Canada and Australia, already active competitors, would be much stimulated."
