SAW THE BALTIMORE FIRE.—Albert Tozier, who recently returned from a six week trip in the East, was a witness of the Baltimore fire. He arrived on the scene on the second day. A brand would fly to the roof, the fire would soon be on the next floor, a safe would fall through and tear its way from story to story, and then the whole building would go. In half an hour the bricks had crumbled, the stone facings had fallen from their places and the steel frames were bent and twisted. Block after block went this way amounting to a great pile of rubble. The old brick buildings with wooden frames seemed to be destroyed at a breath. The work of the engines seemed foolish. It was like turning the hose on a wood fire. But the firemen worked harder than I thought possible, and they did not let up for hours at a time. I have seen forest fires that traveled three miles in less than an hour that threw brands half a mile and created a hurricane, but I was never so much impressed with the horror of a fire in Baltimore.

CALIFORNIA NO BETTER THAN OREGON.—A party of Portlanders who are much disgusted with the continuous rains were talking yesterday of purchasing a complete camping outfit and starting a wagon trip to travel south through the state and California. But when the question of a starting point came up it was found that they would have to travel by rail nearly all the way to San Francisco to strike a dry climate or good roads. The Sacramento River and other streams throughout Northern California are on the rampage, while Oregon roads are simply impassable, and camping would be rather a damp occupation or pastime. It was mutually agreed that the trip would have to be postponed in the Fall, so as to get out of the state before the rains start.

OFF FOR THE KLOONKE.—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brown, of Dawson, who have spent the past two months visiting Portland friends, have started on their long journey over the snow to their home. They will go to Skagway by boat, then to White Horse, where trucks will have to be left until navigation opens in the spring. From that point they travel in stages into Dawson, the trip taking two weeks. Mr. Brown stated before leaving that while it was 30 and 40 degrees below at present in that region, that by May Spring or Summer would be in full blast, and it would be very hot. Mr. Brown has extensive mining interests on the creeks near Dawson and has one mine immediately under the town, which is paying well.

SLIDE ON BARNEYS ROAD.—A cribwork of logs on the Barnes road bordering the King Real Estate Company's property gave way yesterday afternoon, causing a small landslide that blocked the road for a couple of days. The crib was put in about 12 years ago by the King Company when the road was graded, and was constructed for the purpose of holding the road in shape. The logs have rotted, and the incessant rains of late have thoroughly soaked the earth, causing it to slide down and unstable. The fact of a passing vehicle probably started the slide. No damage was done except to the road.

ITALIAN REPUBLICAN CLUB.—A meeting of the Italian voters of the southern part of the city was held last night at the Italian Hall, at the corner of Fourth and Mill streets. About 200 persons were present, and a club was organized under the name of the Fifth and Sixth Ward Italian Republican Club. Resolutions were adopted favoring the election of President Roosevelt. The Italian Concert Orchestra rendered several musical selections, which were heartily applauded. The following temporary officers were elected: President, Leonardo DiCristoforo; secretary, Pietro Bernardini.

DISASTROUS END TO A SNARE.—A suburban resident hurrying to catch a car at First and Washington streets last night thought for a moment that he had dropped through terra firma to another world, but realized his true position when he landed on his hands and knees in a pool of water half a foot deep. The excessive rains of the past few days have caused a pool of water to form on First, near Washington street, and the frigid pavement has been floated near the curbstone for a radius of several yards. From all appearance the pavement is solid, but proves a trap to the unwary pedestrian.

FLASH BURNED HIS FACE.—Claude Richardson, an employee of the Portland General Electric Company, had his face badly burned yesterday morning, and came rushing in on the heels of the fire. A fuse in the headquarters building, Richardson was working very close to the fuse, when a short circuit caused it to flash. His face, so close to the fuse, was injured, and he was taken at once to the Good Samaritan Hospital. It was found on examination, however, that his eye was not harmed.

CAN'T GET ENOUGH EVIDENCE.—Officers Kerrigan and Snow worked yesterday in getting evidence against Houston and Payne, the two arrested for holding up the Southern Pacific depot. They are of the opinion that they have the right men, but cannot get evidence enough to convict them. "We will place a charge of vagrancy against them," said the officers last night. "They will be brought up on this charge, convicted of vagrancy and driven out of the city. They are at least undesirable characters and are not wanted about the city."

REWARD WORKER WELL.—When Eugene Blasier's dog, the thoroughbred dog, was stolen some weeks ago, he offered a \$200 reward for its recovery. A negro dining-car porter has located the dog in Duluth, Minn., but was unable to get possession of it. Chief of Police Hunt has been asked to help recover the stolen property, and has sent a letter and picture of the animal to the Chief of Police of Duluth. Mr. Blasier values the dog highly and says he will have him back regardless of expense.

CHEERFUL SPORTS IN PORTLAND.—About the only cheerful spots in Portland the last few weeks, the one just ended in particular, are the beds of blooming snowdrops and crocuses. A few of them, many lawns in the residence section. A gleam of bright yellow or snowy white in the midst of the sodden ground, and often peering out of a veritable puddle of water, attracts instant attention. Many rose bushes are noticed with last year's leaves, blooms and spring shoots on them.

SOFT TRACKS DELAY TRAINS.—The severe storms of the past few days resulted in a general delay of trains into Portland yesterday. Yesterday afternoon nearly all of the incoming trains were reported late. The Northern Pacific due at 7:30 P. M. was reported nine hours late, and the Southern Pacific trains had all delayed several hours on account of soft tracks. No accidents of any kind have been reported so far.

WRONG ALL 'ROUND.

Universal Error of The Oregonian, From Adam to Mrs. Eddy.

EUGENE, Or., Feb. 28, 1904.—(To the Editor.)—I have taken notice, of late, of the discussions of the Senate on the 186 Exposition and the Sunday-closing question, and the writings, editorials, in The Oregonian, pertaining to this question, and thinking you in advance for the privilege of this appearing in The Oregonian, I undertake to say:

First.—That The Oregonian has not fairly presented the Christian claim for Sunday observance.

The editor set aside the commandment of the decalogue concerning the seventh day, recognized no New Testament requirement in the observance of the first day, declared Constantine the first legislator of Sunday-keeping, and finally, ruthlessly brushed off all regard for any day, or religious rite.

The New Testament very clearly teaches that the churches planted under the ministry of Christ's apostles observed the first day of the week as a day of assembling for Christian worship (Acts, ii:48; xx:7; I Cor. xvi:1; Heb. x:25; Rev. i:10). A careful reading of these Scriptures reveals an established custom in the first churches under apostolic supervision. This was as much earlier than Constantine than two thousand years before the American Constitution and The Oregonian.

Pliny's letter of statement and inquiry to Trajan is fair and unadipated testimony of the Christian apostles and practices on the first day of the week. Christian fathers have also left writings replete with explanation of their first day, Lord's day. The Oregonian, the second only, and Christian Scientists the last, only. There is a close relation of mind and body; and the great Maker of all things made the intricate machine, why should the day be no reason why Christians should observe the first day, and because the Scriptures referring to the Sabbath for Israel are cited in the creeds of modern churches as proof for the observance of Sunday does not make it divine law.

The first day of the week is kept by Christians in commemoration of the new creation, demonstrated in the fact of resurrection of Christ, giving the hope of immortality, the true principle for a basis of righteous living.

As to the Christians appealing for state or National legislation on the observance of Sunday, I have my doubts. However, it may be prudent in securing legislation to give liberty to employers on this day, in the event of their association with churches and because church attendants number 25,000,000 in the United States.

The Lord invites man to devote one-seventh of time wholly for his own communion with the spirit of God, for his soul feeding and upliftment, and to tend to make better citizens in any state, but his greed makes him rob God, and himself, of his best opportunity.

Second.—I think something should be said on the other side of The Oregonian's position on the healing of disease. Faith healers, Christian Scientists and the editors are like the pendulum of a clock, swinging to extremes. There are the three means of healing diseases: Prayer, physics and metaphysics. Faith healers use the first, only; The Oregonian, the second only; and Christian Scientists the last, only. There is a close relation of mind and body; and the great Maker of all things made the intricate machine, why should the day be no reason why Christians should observe the first day, and because the Scriptures referring to the Sabbath for Israel are cited in the creeds of modern churches as proof for the observance of Sunday does not make it divine law.
