

RIOT IN CHECK

Springfield Will Ask for No More Troops.

FEELING STILL RUNS HIGH

Mob Will Slay Negroes on the Least Provocation.

AN AGITATOR TO THE SCENE

Colored Man From Cincinnati Urges His Fellow to Burn Homes of Whites, and is Backed Up.

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, March 10.—The race disturbances which have terrorized the town for the past three days, as the result of the lynching of the negro Dixon, who shot and killed Policeman Collins, are well in check by the 13 companies of state militia, and the authorities are of the opinion that no more troops will be needed to control the situation.

Both Chief of Police O'Brien and Sheriff Roush believe, however, that it would be a mistake materially to decrease the number of troops on hand. There are unmistakable signs that there is an ugly feeling on the part of the men and boys who have composed the mobs of the past three days, and the authorities realize that the shooting, either of a white man or a negro, or even a street fight between men of opposite races, would be sufficient again to start the mob on a killing and burning expedition.

Negro Trouble-Maker Arrested.

This evening the police arrested a negro, Y. W. Smith, who gives Cincinnati as his home. He was accompanied by several strange negroes and wherever they could gain an audience of one or more negroes on the street they read a highly inflammatory typewritten paper urging the negroes to avenge the lynching of Dixon and to apply the torch to the white business and residence districts in retaliation for the burning of the negro quarters on the levee.

In the opinion of City Solicitor Tatum, neither the city nor county can be held responsible for the burning of the levee district by the mob. A special grand jury will sit Monday to investigate the lynching, but it is thought it will be impossible to indict either the leaders of the mob which did the lynching or the subsequent burning.

This city is the headquarters of "The National Anti-Mob and Lynch Law Association," which meets monthly and always adopts resolutions when lynchings occur in any part of the country. It claims 30,000 members in branches throughout the United States. Springfield is also the home of ex-Representative Stewart, the author of the Ohio statute providing heavy penalties for those participating in mobs.

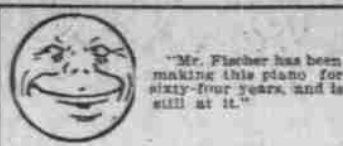
OFFICERS FIGHT MOB OFF.

Illinois Men Determined to Lynch Negro Suspected of Assault.

MURPHYSBORO, Ill., March 10.—A mob of 75 men from Carbondale made an attempt at 4 o'clock this morning to attack Thomas Vaughn, a negro, from the County Jail here, intending to lynch him. Sheriff Thorp had been apprised of their coming and he and Deputy Woodruff lay in wait. When the mob reached the jail the officers trained their guns on it. The mob quickly dispersed, but not until three of its members had been captured. Deputy Woodruff's gun was discharged prematurely, tearing his arm so that amputation was necessary. Vaughn is charged with criminally assaulting a Carbondale schoolteacher one month ago. She is in a serious condition. There is no further excitement here.

Finds Candy Was Poisoned.

PIERRE, S. D., March 10.—The coroner's jury that has been investigating the death of Miss Rena Nelson, who died recently from poisoning, found today she had come to her death "through the eating of some chocolate candy contained in a box re-

ceived through the mail at Pierre, and postmarked Boone, Ia., and that said tablets contained corrosive sublimate in sufficient quantities to cause death."

SUSQUEHANNA IS FALLING.

Estimates of Damage From Flood Run From One to Two Million.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., March 10.—At 10 o'clock tonight the Susquehanna River was 24.9 feet above low water mark, a fall of nearly six feet since last night.

Estimates are being made as to the amount of damage done by the flood in the Wyoming region. The figures run from \$1,000,000 to \$2,500,000. The total damage in all towns between Pittston and Sunbury is estimated at \$1,500,000.

Many of the streets here are clear of water and people are returning to their homes. At Plymouth and at Nanticoke the flood has lessened. It is believed. Communication with Bloomsburg has been cut off, and it is thought a gorge carried away the telegraph poles. Reports from up the river are that the flood is receding slowly.

The banks on both sides of the river from Shicklesbury to Sunbury, a distance of 50 miles, present a scene of desolation. Wrecked bridges, outbuildings, telegraph poles, etc., are strewn everywhere. The new steel bridge at Catawissa is a total wreck.

Mines that were flooded are being pumped out, and some of them may be able to resume work tomorrow.

Japanese Traitor Commits Suicide.

NEW YORK, March 10.—A Japanese shipping agent, who was arrested Monday on suspicion of supplying Russians with information, has committed suicide in the military prison, says a Tientsin dispatch to the American. It is said several other Japanese are under suspicion.
