Murphy Takes Revenge on Leader McCarren.

HIS MAN LOSES OFFICE

Tammany Gives Brooklyn Machine Severe Jolting.

IT FIGHTS HARD TO HOLD ON

Deputy Police Commissioner Haggerty Refuses to Resign When Requested and His Removal Follows.

NEW YORK, March 15.—Second Deputy Police Commissioner Henry F. Haggerty was removed today by Commissioner McAdoo, after he had refused, at Commissioner McAdoo's request, to hand in his resignation. This leaves but one of Mr. McAdoo's deputies, First Deputy Commissioner McAdoo, in office. Third Deputy Commissioner Cowan resigned last week, giving as a reason the exacting and ungenial nature of the position.

Mr. Haggerty is a law partner of State Senator P. H. McCarren, leader of the Brooklyn Democracy, and had charge of the police department in Brooklyn. Reports that his resignation would be asked on account of dissatisfaction with the police administration in Brooklyn between McCarren and leader Charles Murphy, of Tammany Hall, have been current for some time. The removal or resignation of First Deputy McAdoo is now looked for.

Commissioner McAdoo said Deputy Commissioner Haggerty's removal was because of a difference of opinion between Haggerty and himself as to the policy of police government in Brooklyn.

WINS OUT OVER DIETRICH.

Congressman Burkett Assured of Nebraska Nomination for Senator.

LINCOLN, Neb., March 15.—At the Lancaster County primary practically every precinct declared for Congressman E. J. Burkett for the United States Senate to succeed Charles H. Dietrich. This practically insures Burkett's nomination as many counties had pledged support to him and others were waiting for this county's action. The Republican state convention, which meets here May 18, will select a senatorial candidate.

Famous Athlete Chosen Delegate.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., March 15.—The Fifth Minnesota District Republicans elected W. W. Hettler and C. A. Smith delegates to the National Convention. The former is the famous Yale football guard. The latter is a millionaire lumberman. No instructions were given. The County Convention composed of the same delegates had previously instructed the delegates to the State Convention to work for Roosevelt.

Tillman Enters Race for Congress.

AUGUSTA, Ga., March 15.—Lieutenant-Governor James H. Tillman, recently acquitted of murder for the killing of Editor N. G. Gonzales, of Columbia, S. C., will announce his candidacy for Congress in an interview in the Augusta Chronicle tomorrow. He will stand for the seat made vacant by the death of Congressman G. W. Croft, of South Carolina.

Nebraska Democratic Conventions.

LINCOLN, Neb., March 15.—The Democratic State Central Committee today decided to hold two state conventions. The first, to select delegates to the National Convention, will be held at Omaha, June 1. The nominating convention will be held at Lincoln on a date between July 6 and September 1, to be designated later by the committee.

Republicans Renominate Hemenway.

MOUNT VERNON, Ind., March 15.—Congressman James A. Hemenway was renominated today by the Republicans of the First Indiana District. Resolutions instructing the delegates for President Roosevelt were adopted.

Indiana Instructions for Roosevelt.

KNOX, Ind., March 15.—Republicans of the Thirtieth Congressional District today renominated Representative Erick. The delegates to the National Republican Convention were instructed for President Roosevelt.

Garber to Run Again for Congress.

CELINA, O., March 15.—The Democrats of the Fourth District today renominated Harvey C. Garber for Congress. Uninstructed delegates were selected to the St. Louis convention.

MERGER DECISION IS DISCUSSED

Hill and Morgan, However, Decline to Give Their Conclusions.

NEW YORK, March 15.—President Hill and other officials of the Northern Securities Company were in conference today, but declined to make any statement for publication. Vice-President John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and Counsel Clough had a long talk with Mr. Hill. Daniel S. Lamont, vice-president of the Northern Pacific Railway, was another visitor. Colonel Clough returned from Washington today. Contrary to expectations, he said he had not brought back with him an official copy of the decision in the securities case, but only a copy of the opinion.

"The official copies are not yet published," he said. "So far we know little beyond what the newspapers have told us."

Colonel Clough refused to discuss the conditions produced by yesterday's decision and would give no hint as to the Securities Company's next move. He was closeted with President Hill for upward of two hours.

Mr. Hill visited J. P. Morgan in the afternoon, and the two conferred for some time. Both declined to be interviewed, but Mr. Hill stated there was nothing new in the general situation. The strength and activity of Erie stocks in the markets revived the old story of a new holding company to take over the Northern Pacific. The story was pronounced absurd by representatives of the Northern Securities Company.

Northern Securities stock was strong on the curb today, selling up to 87 1/2 soon after the opening.

PREPARED FOR DECISION.

Hill and Morgan Made Plans for Exchange of the Securities.

NEW YORK, March 15.—The Hill-Morgan interests and the other large holders

of the Northern Securities Company will respect the Supreme Court's decision in letter and in spirit," says the Journal of Commerce in quoting a man said to be one of the strongest and best-informed Northern Securities stockholders in this city.

"The Securities Company will, as soon as practicable," he abandoned," continued the statement, "and the securities of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific Companies will be exchanged back for the securities originally deposited. Plans for the distribution of the securities were completed some time ago in anticipation of an adverse decision. The effect of the decision so far as the roads in question—the Northern Pacific, the Great Northern and the Burlington—are concerned, will not be important, as their absolute independence of operation has not been disturbed."

"The result of the decision merely will be the restoration of the community of ownership in the place of the more radical plan for physical consolidation. It will take time to unravel the affair, but probably not as long as at the outset may seem necessary."

The Northern Securities Company of Canada was granted a charter in 1901. Its powers are very large and include the right to buy, control and operate railways as well as other enterprises both in Canada and in the United States.

Not Decided as to Future Action.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Messages of congratulation from all parts of the country are being delivered to President Roosevelt by telegraph, by mail and in person on the Supreme Court's decision in the Northern Securities case.

President Roosevelt personally congratulated Attorney-General Knox after the announcement of the decision, and at the Cabinet meeting today he renewed his congratulations to Mr. Knox. In his cordial expressions he was joined by the Attorney-General's fellow-Cabinet members.

The Attorney-General, just before the Cabinet meeting, declined to indicate what action, if any, he might take in the future in following up the Supreme Court's decision. He would not say whether he had formed any plans looking to prosecutions or further actions under the Sherman anti-trust act or not. Thus far he has not had opportunity thoroughly to digest the decision of the court, and until he has considered it carefully he will not determine, much less indicate, what future action he may take.

The meeting of the Cabinet was comparatively brief, much of the time being spent in discussing the merger decision.

TO TAKE ITS PLACE.

Company Given Charter by Canada

Is Said to Be Backed by Hill.

NEW YORK, March 15.—A Montreal dispatch today gives R. G. Forget, vice-president of the Montreal Light & Power Company, as authority for a statement that the Northern Securities Company, of Canada, had been granted a charter by the Dominion Government, that it is backed by the Hill interests and is intended to absorb the Northern Securities Company, of the United States.

Hill Terms Report Ridiculous.

NEW YORK, March 15.—In regard to the report that the Northern Securities Company of Canada was to be the successor of the Northern Securities Company of the United States, President Hill was quoted today as saying:

"We have as much notion of incorporating a company in Mars or the moon as in Canada. We intend to conform to the law."

Later President Hill gave out the following:

"Until the full official copies of the opinions and decrees of the Supreme Court have been received and our attorneys have had an opportunity to advise us as to our course of procedure the officers of the company can make no further announcement than to declare their purpose to promptly and fully follow the law as now interpreted."

Denies Hill Is Back of Company.

MONTREAL, March 15.—Rudolph Forget, vice-president of the Montreal Light & Power Company, today denied he is responsible for the statement that the Northern Securities Company of Canada, which was granted a charter by the Dominion Parliament a year or so ago, is backed by the Hill interests, and is intended to replace the Northern Securities Company of the United States. He merely recalled the fact that such a charter has been obtained in Ottawa. He does not think the two companies have any connection whatever.

Canadian Charter Secured in 1902.

OTTAWA, Ont., March 15.—The Northern Securities Company was granted a charter by the Dominion Government soon after the company was organized. It was brought against the American corporation in Minnesota. The directors named in the bill of incorporation were Canadians, but it was understood at the time that James J. Hill was interested. The bill is still in existence, although no step has been taken to operate under it in Canada.

Northern Pacific Meeting Adjourned.

NEW YORK, March 15.—The adjourned joint meeting of the Northern Pacific railway was again adjourned today until May 17, no business being transacted. Practically all the directors of the company, which has been enjoined from voting in this stock, hence the repeated adjournments.

Washington to Drop Merger Suit.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 15.—Attorney-General Stratton says he will drop the case of the State of Washington against the Northern Securities Company, because of the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the merger case.

ARMY-CAMP SITES ARE CHOSEN

House Committee Decides Upon California Tract as One of Four.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The House committee on military affairs today agreed on four sites for military camp grounds and authorized Vice-President John D. Rockefeller, Jr., to purchase the land. Provision also is made for the enlargement of the Chattanooga and Chickamauga National Parks by the acquisition of 10,000 acres of land at a cost of \$500,000.

The camp sites selected are: At or near Fort Sam Houston, Bexar County, Tex., where from 15,000 to 20,000 acres are to be acquired at a cost of \$125,000.

Camp Douglas, in Juneau and Monroe Counties, Wis., 20,000 acres, at a cost of \$100,000.

Cornucopia Valley, in Lebanon, Dauphin and Lancaster Counties, in Pennsylvania, 15,000 acres, at a cost of \$300,000.

The J. N. Henry ranch, San Luis Obispo County, Cal., 22,000 acres, at a cost of \$500,000.

The bill provides that no permanent military post shall be established on any of these sites.

BIDS PARTIAL IN

Root Wants to Get Away From Political Gossip.

GUEST OF NEW YORK CLUB

Ultra-Conservative Democrats, With Cleveland or Parker, or Ultra-Socialists, With Bryan or Hearst, Real Opposition.

NEW YORK, March 15.—Secretary of War Root was the guest of honor tonight at a dinner given by the Republican Club of the City of New York. Besides Mr. Root were present Governor Odell, General Granville M. Dodge, David B. Henderson, Judge Henry B. Howland, ex-Vice-President Levi P. Morton and J. Edgar Addison, of Delaware. President Roosevelt's letter of regret was as follows:

"If I could go to a dinner of any man, it would be to the dinner of the Republican Club in giving in honor of ex-Secretary Root. I am bound to him not only by ties of recognition of his great and brilliant services to the Nation and the party, but by a peculiarly close and intimate personal friendship. I wish your club and your guests all goodnight."

Mr. Root, responding to the greeting of President Louis Stern, said in part:

"It seems to me that it is time for us to turn our attention from the surface question of party organization to the great issues of the conflict that lie before us, and get away from the chicken feed of political gossip."

"We stand on a distinct foreign policy, a position that has put us on a plane so eminent that in the conflict in the Far East over which every one holds his breath for fear there may be a general war, Germany turns to the United States and asks us to use our power to preserve the Empire of China."

"The question for us to hammer out during the coming Summer is whether the great onward march of American civilization shall go on or shall be checked and turned back in confusion and ineffectuality. Let this club sound the keynote of the coming campaign, the question whether the Republican party shall continue to rule, or the ultra-conservative Democrats with Cleveland or Parker on the one hand, or the ultra-socialists, with Bryan or Hearst, on the other."

Governor Odell said in part: "Let me say at the outset that the newspaper gossip of factional differences are merely pipe dreams. Men must have differences, and so there are men now who have different beliefs and speak them, but that is all. There is nothing in the Republican party which indicates that when the time comes the majority about the Bronx will not be so great that it will astonish Leader Murphy, of New York."

Quarrels Won't Hurt Roosevelt.

NEW YORK, March 15.—Governor Odell was present at a dinner given tonight in honor of Tax Commissioner Straub by the Republican captains of the Thirty-first Assembly District. Governor Odell said he had just come from the Republican Club, where he had listened to a masterly address by Elihu Root, and continuing:

"He feels the factional feeling that he has read about is going to take the life out of the Republican party in the state at the coming election. I told him his surmises were the facts. I told him also that every Republican who has a sense of duty will differ, will be found standing shoulder to shoulder, fighting for that fearless statesman, Theodore Roosevelt."

of summoning their absent supporters, and when about 30 minutes later, John Redmond moved to report progress on the ground that the government had not a majority able to transact the business of the government, the government's narrow margin was weakened. If the division had occurred a minute earlier the government inevitably would have been defeated and compelled to resign.

To avert this, old men who had not run for many a year came rushing into the House, painfully out of breath, while Sir Thomas Henry Carson had not even waited to put on a necktie.

The members of the government and their supporters tonight profess that they regard today's division more in the light of a joke than anything else, although they admit that it is particularly annoying, especially in view of the pending bye-election. There is no suggestion of sharp practice, and even the members of the Cabinet admit privately that they are deeply indebted to the "irrepressible Irish."

The coup was planned by Mr. Redmond and the senior whip of the Irish Parliamentary party, Sir Thomas Esmonde, yesterday afternoon. Seeing a short line of questions for today and knowing that the majority of the House expected the Irish members to occupy all the afternoon in discussion of Irish education, Mr. Redmond and Sir Thomas Esmonde quietly launched their clubs. The maneuver succeeded to perfection.

William Redmond, in his exuberance, snatched a hat from the head of a colleague and waved it wildly. The members rushed in and a terrible din prevailed.

Mr. Balfour appeared momentarily as he entered the chamber, and he was greeted with derisive cheers and cries of "resign" and "another message for Joe."

Mr. Redmond's motion was made with the object of calling attention to Irish grievances. He admitted, however, amid much laughter, that it was obvious the government had been defeated on a proposal to reduce a vote by 500, but there was a considerable amount of financial business to be transacted before March 21, and he did not see why any time should be wasted.

Mr. Balfour added the honorable member had succeeded in reducing the vote for Irish education by 500, and the government accepted the opinion of the House on the subject.

Mr. Redmond retorted: "We have defeated the government by 500 on the announcement of the defeat of the government."

HANDWRITING ON THE WALL.

Esmonde Says Chamberlain Must Unite Unionists or They Are Lost.

LONDON, March 15.—Sir Thomas Esmonde, in discussing the defeat of the government, said to the Associated Press: "Today's division may be taken as the handwriting on the wall. Experienced parliamentary hands do not attach undue importance to it, but, nevertheless, it unmistakably foreshadows an impending dissolution, which to some extent it hastens. The pendulum already swinging towards a Liberal revival, and today's events accelerate that movement. With one or more adverse divisions in the House of Commons, an appeal to the country becomes inevitable. Of course, there is always a chapter of accidents in politics the only thing certain is the unforeseen; but unless the return of Joseph Chamberlain after Easter brings new

vigor and new cohesion to the Unionist party, their race is well nigh run."

John Redmond, said to a representative of the Associated Press subsequent to the division:

"To sum it up briefly, the cause of the division, it may be said that the government recently introduced a rule forbidding teaching Irish in four of the first classes of the Irish national schools. This caused widespread indignation, to the voice which I moved for a reduction of the vote."

"Mr. Wyndham, Chief Secretary for Ireland, gave no satisfactory explanation, and we defeated the government. As a result of the defeat, the obstructionist rule undoubtedly will be withdrawn."

While the general position of the government has not been weakened, my impression is that a dissolution will follow another such blow. Naturally we are elated. Yesterday evening, when the Nationalists voted with the Government on Catholic education in England, Mr. Balfour had a majority of 130. Today, with the Irish against him, he had a minority of 101. The moral is that the balance of power is at hand when Ireland will hold the balance of power."

To Protect Iron Trade.

LONDON, March 15.—Asked in the House of Commons today if the government intended to take any steps to protect the iron trade of the United Kingdom against Canadian bounty-free competition, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Austen Chamberlain, said the abolition or modification of the Canadian bounties would be a subject for consideration when the fiscal and commercial relations between the United Kingdom and colonies come up for settlement.

Son of Vernon-Harcourt Wins.

LONDON, March 15.—Lewis Vernon-Harcourt, eldest son of Sir William Vernon-Harcourt, has been elected unopposed to represent the Bournemouth division of Lancashire in the House of Commons in succession to Sir William Mather (Liberal), who retired.

CANAL-ZONE LEGISLATION.

Any That Is Enacted Now Will Be of Preliminary Nature.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Whatever legislation may be enacted at the present session relating to the Panama Canal will be largely preliminary in character. The President has discussed the matter with members of Congress and with such members of the Isthmian Canal Commission as are in the city, but it is understood that no definite decision yet has been reached as to the precise needs of legislation on the subject.

General Davis called attention to the provisions for executive regulations contained in the bill for the construction of the canal and suggested that they were ample to cover all needs in the direction of governing the canal zone.

Suggesting the machinery for the government of the zone, he mentioned the appointment of a governor or prefect chosen from the commission. In addition there should be a Secretary of State, an Attorney-General, Treasurer, Sanitation, Superintendent of Schools, Justices of the Peace, Police Judge and three Judges of Courts of the first instance.

The work of sanitation in a zone of 500,000 the first year and the policing of the zone would necessitate the expenditure of \$300,000 a year. Daniel Davenport, representing the American Anti-Boycott Association, was heard today, and Judge Joseph K. McCann, representing steel industries, presented resolutions calling upon the Secretary of Commerce and Labor for information concerning the number of hours now exacted on Government work.
