

CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

WHAT RATTLED THE PLAYERS.—At the regular rehearsal of the Haydn Symphony Orchestra Monday evening Otto Klemm, its leader and conductor, became exasperated over the actions of the performers and condemned their poor playing. He noticed that a number of women had entered the practice hall, and attributed the confusion of the players to their bashfulness. Somehow the cornet man got hold of the cornet and other instruments were mixed up in a trifling confusion. Just when Mr. Klemm was tearing his hair with rage, George Henderson, violinist, stepped forward and explained the situation. A large chorus accompanies this quartet. The national music of Ireland will be rendered. Wednesday evening is selected for this entertainment, as not to conflict with other celebrations which will occur tomorrow. All are invited.

THREE BURGLARIES REPORTED.—Three burglaries occurred during Monday night and were reported to the police yesterday morning. While nothing of great value was secured by the thieves, the manner of operation stamps them as professionals and the police fear more will be heard from them before the close of the week. The Williams office House, at Third and Gilman streets, was entered through the front door, which was opened with a skeleton key. The same method was used in getting into the Portland & Suburban Express company's office, at North First street, and into J. D. Monihon's stall-building shop, next door. From the express company's office the thieves got nothing except a few nickels from the telephone slot, while the haul from Monihon's establishment consisted of an assortment of tools worth \$25.

WILL CHOOSE LOCATION NEXT WEEK.—W. P. Oida, president of the Portland Woolen Mills, has returned, and at a meeting of the directors, the location of the new mill was discussed. It was decided to settle on location of the plant next week. Manager E. L. Thompson said that propositions had been received from Oregon City, Milwaukie, Gladstone, Barlow and Bristol, but could not be considered. The plant will be rebuilt close to Portland. This would seem to narrow the location down to Sellwood and John. The Sellwood committee of the local Board of Trade is making a systematic campaign and J. M. Nickum says that the suburb will not spend any effort to induce the managers to rebuild there. The new plant will be much better and larger than the one destroyed.

WHAT THE VOLUNTEERS NEED.—Captain John Anderson, of the Volunteers, has issued an appeal for cash subscriptions to aid in the distribution of relief to the poor. He gives a list of the large number of articles of clothing and furniture given away through the medium of the Volunteers in January and February, and says: "In order to gather up the above articles we had to hire express wagons, and an our quarters were too small to accommodate the work, we had to be enlarged, thereby involving us to something like \$200. We ask you by this letter to place a piece of money in the card inclosed, securely fastened with gummed paper, and return the same to us."

CALLED TO HIGHLAND CHURCH.—The Highland Congregational Church has extended a call to Rev. Arden M. Rockwood of Wayland, near Boston, Mass., to become permanent pastor. Mr. Rockwood is the son of the late G. A. Rockwood, who formerly lived near Willoughby, and brother of John A. Rockwood, state president of the First Baptist Church of Union. He is well known in Portland, being a graduate from the Portland Academy. He is also a graduate of Amherst College. Since September, 1901, he has been at Wayland, Mass., but it is thought he will accept the call.

DEATH OF MRS. A. W. STOWELL.—Mrs. A. W. Stowell, who was well known in this city, passed away yesterday at her home in Clark County, Wash., after an illness of only a few hours. She was stricken with paralysis in the morning, and the end came at noon. Mrs. Stowell was for many years a prominent member of the First Baptist Church of this city and was also active in the work of the North Pacific Board of Missions, of which she was an officer. The funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Presbyterian Church.

ASK AID FOR LOWER COLUMBIA.—In view of the need of work on the bar of the Columbia River to improve commercial conditions and shipping interests, the Chamber of Commerce sent a telegram yesterday to Senators Mitchell and Fulton urging them to use all their influence in providing the continuance of work on the Lower Columbia. They were asked to take steps to provide in the emergency clause of the appropriation bill for this work.

VICTIM OF A PICKPOCKET.—Elliott Curfush, a German cook in the Pine-Street Restaurant, was easy prey for a clever pickpocket, who touched him for a \$40 gold watch and chain at Third and Burnside streets at 12 o'clock last night. Curfush was watching U. P. Sam, the Adhler, and was in the midst of a large crowd when he lost his watch. The loss was reported to the police and Detectives Snow and Korman were detailed on the case.

TO CHOOSE SITE FOR MILLS.—A decision as to just where the site of the new Portland Woolen Mills are to be located will probably be announced next week, so the board of directors has announced. Sellwood, St. Johns and other suburban towns are said to be after the mills, but the woolen mills people will give no hint as to which is to be the successful competitor. The new mills, it is stated, are to cost \$250,000.

NO POWER TO ENJOIN

Plea of Regulars About Jailbirds Sustained.

MUST TRUST THE BOARDS

After Exchange of Compliments Between Lawyers, Judge Sears Refuses Injunction—Risk of Punishment if Law is Broken.

In the suit of Harry F. Estes against Charles H. Carey, Walter F. Matthews, Sheriff W. A. Storey and D. D. Jackson, County Jailers, to prevent the voting of prisoners in the County Jail at the primary election today, Judge Sears yesterday decided that he had no authority to issue an injunction order.

The Court, in sustaining the demurrer of Carey and Matthews, and in refusing to issue a restraining order as to them, placed its decision solely upon the ground that they were not showing to have done anything contrary to law. As to Sheriff Storey and Jailers Jackson and deputy, the Court held that the injunction was never a proper remedy, that no precedents for such action by an equity court had been or could be discovered; that the farthest any court had ever gone was to restrain election judges from receiving illegal votes, but to do that the judges must be made parties to the suit, and probably the illegal voters themselves. The Court also said that clearly the prisoners could not vote, that they could not acquire a residence in the County Jail, and that they themselves and any one aiding them in voting would be liable to criminal

prosecution, and indeed that probably the election judges would be liable criminally in receiving their votes if they were advised of the facts. In brief, the refusal of the Court to grant the order was based solely on the inapplicability of the equitable remedy of injunction.

As to County Clerk Fields, the Court was in doubt, and for the present overruled the demurrer. The County Clerk was drawn into the case as the custodian of the registration records, and Estes asked in his complaint that the Court order the Clerk to strike the names of the prisoners who have registered from the registration books, but Judge Sears did not think on the showing made he had jurisdiction to do so, so the demurrer as to Fields was provisionally overruled, and G. C. Moser, attorney for Estes, was allowed five days to file an answer.

P. P. May, one of the attorneys for the defense, in arguing the case made the point that the Court has no jurisdiction. Counsel said it is the duty of judges and clerks of election to see that there is no fraudulent voting, and that he presumed the judges and clerks of election were honest and would not permit men to vote who came from the jail. The attorney said Messrs. Matthews and Carey by no possible circumstance could be said to have had anything to do with the registration of any prisoners, and ought not to have been named as defendants in this proceeding. "The case was not brought," said Mr. May, "with any idea that the Court has any jurisdiction, but simply to get it into the newspapers to griddle us." Continuing, the attorney stated that no one knew or could tell if the prisoners did vote that they would vote on the day of the election. He repeated that the matter was one entirely for the judges and clerks of election to handle.

G. C. Moser, attorney for Estes, read the complaint showing that Carey is a candidate for delegate in Precinct 18, in which the jail is located, on the Independent-Republican ticket, and is opposed to the re-nomination of W. A. Storey for Sheriff and consequently interested in seeing that the prisoners in the jail do not vote. Mr. Moser said the complaint set out the facts in plain language, showing that the prisoners believed the prisoners would vote the Regular Republican ticket, and that the defendants believed they would vote that way. Counsel said: "I concede I don't know how they will vote, but I want them enjoined from being taken from the jail to vote just the same. For some reason they don't want this injunction suit, or the Sheriff enjoined from taking them from the jail to vote."

Mr. May—If that is all you want, why don't you sue the Sheriff?

Mr. Moser—If you will let me say what you through the papers we will not have to sue anybody.

Mr. May reiterated that the judges and clerks of election could be looked to for relief, if it was necessary, and Mr. Moser asked if his client must stand by the polls from 7 o'clock in the morning until 7 o'clock in the evening to see that these men were not voted, and to challenge them if they tried to vote. Counsel said: "The judges may be honest, but these men are registered voters. It happens to these defendants if this registration is cancelled and these men are not allowed to vote? If you don't intend to vote them at the primary election in Precinct 18, why object to the cancellation of their registration?"

Mr. May—Because we don't care to have a decree of this Court entered which charges us with the crime of election fraud, you don't care to charge us with it except in a general way.

Mr. Moser continued his argument, saying it expressly appears that the prisoners are not qualified voters, and their registration ought to be cancelled. It would do the defendants no harm, and would be a protection to the electors of Precinct 18.

J. C. Moreland, who also appeared as counsel for the defense, said that plaintiff had a complete, adequate remedy at law. If the votes were received, anybody who had anything to do with it would be guilty of a crime. Injunction was not necessary where there were so many protections and safeguards provided by law.

"As far as the defendants are concerned," said Judge Moreland, "I don't care if these registrations are cancelled or not, but the Court has no jurisdiction. I am authorized by Sheriff Storey to

CAREY TRIES TO CHEAT THE VOTERS
