Municipal Judge Hogue directed the proceedings, issuing orders that Attorney Logan should not ome to a halt before he had reached the uter limits of the courtroom doors

because the attorney had objected to a number of questions he was putting to a witness for the defense, in a case Attorney Logan was defending.

"If you are asking those questions on behalf of the state, I object, and if you are asking them in behalf of the defense I wish to say I do not desire them," Attorney Logan had said, and this was what had brought the magistrate's wrath upon him.

After Attorney Logan had declined pressing invitation to seat himself and find insisted upon making himself heard the military display was started by Judge

"Attorney Logan, you will leave the room," ordered his honor. "Officer Ham-mersley, conduct Mr. Logan from the room," added the court when the attorney

Mr. Logan then gathered up his coat and hat and other accourrement, executed an about-face and led the procession in single file, passing in review before the spectators' bench and passing out the door, spectators' bench and passing out the door, Officer Hammersley came to a half just inside the outer railing, faced about and returned to his post as soon as the other portion of the detachment had disappeared. After staying out in the cold a few minutes Attorney Logan returned to find that the court's ire had cooled and that he was indeed quite welcome to remain. He continued with his case and the proceedings were concluded with all ings were concluded with all

tranquility.

The case in question was that of the State against F. D. Stuart, manager of a delivery company, who was charged with cruelity to his horse. The man had several witnesses on hand to establish that it is not cruel to prod a horse with a half-inch awi attached to the end of a horse. Armstrong, who said that he was a horseductor, was the star witness. He gave testimeny to the effect that thrusting the weapon into the horse was not any more cruel than usuing spurs. He also said he had examined the horse in question and had found no marks of abuse. It was after he got through that Judge Hogue essayed to question him on his views of cruelty and got in the mix-up with Attorney Logan. The brunt of the testimony for the de-

The brunt of the testimony for the de-fense was that back in the woods of Min-nesota these goads, like Stuart used on his horse are regarded with favor. As-sistant District Attorney Adams took oc-casion to remark that the devices were undoubtedly about as humane as a bull-fight, and suggested that if they are to be allowed in Portland it would hardly he fair to restrict builfighting.

The case was finally postponed until April 5, in order that Stuart may have time in which to get a statement from the Minnesofa Humane Society as to how they regard these goads. The court announced his desire to give Stuart every reasonable chance to defend himself, as he intends to send him to the County Jali if convicted of the charge.
