

MORROCCO TO END

France Will Withdraw From Newfoundland.

TERMS MADE WITH BRITAIN

Amount of Indemnity Will Be Left to the Hague Court.

MOROCCO FIGURES IN TREATY

Spanish Objection is of No Consequence, as No Territory is Involved, and France Will Deal With Her Later.

PARIS, April 5.—Foreign Minister Delcasse had a long conference today with Paul Cambon, French Ambassador at London, relative to the Anglo-French colonial treaty, settling several long-pending issues, principally in regard to Morocco, Egypt and Newfoundland. M. Cambon will return to London tomorrow, and it is the expectation that the treaty will be signed toward the end of the present week. The main points are settled, but there are some details capable of causing delay. For example, the Newfoundland government does not wish the French fishermen to retain the right of catching their own bait off shore. However, this is considered a minor detail, and not likely to affect the general agreement. France surrenders her sovereignty over the Newfoundland shore, and receives an indemnity. The latter is two-fold. First, for French individuals giving up property along the surrendered shore, and second, for the French government's relinquishment of its sovereignty. The reports current, setting forth the amount of the indemnity are inaccurate, as it is the present intention to submit the amount of the indemnity to the Hague tribunal. Morocco will figure in the treaty, and, according to the French view, will be the most important subject. Spanish objections at first seemed to threaten this portion of the treaty, but it is now perceived that Anglo-French interests in Morocco are entirely distinct from Franco-Spanish interests. Spain's interests are political. Those of Great Britain are commercial. Spain seeks the partition of Morocco, so that she may control a portion of the country. France opposes the partition, believing the future of the country depends on its unity. Great Britain has no territorial ambitions in Morocco, and through the treaty will safeguard her commercial rights and insure against fortifying the coast opposite Gibraltar. Therefore, France and Spain will adjust the political future of Morocco, but indications are that the present treaty will so strengthen the French position that her North African empire will eventually stretch westward to the Atlantic. The Egyptian agreement does not affect Great Britain's protectorate over Egypt, being confined to the administration of the Egyptian Delta. Great Britain having a larger latitude in disposing of the surplus without the concurrence of France, France gets improved facilities in reaching Lake Tchad and other points in French Central Africa. This concession is a partial return for the surrender of her sovereignty over the Newfoundland shore. The question over the New Hebrides will not be included in the agreement, owing to the difficulties of adjusting it through the insular and colonial authorities.

RAILWAY BILL IS MODIFIED.

Canada Finds Money Market Demands New Terms to Grand Trunk.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 5.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in the House today, presented the modification of the Grand Trunk Pacific contract of last session. In doing so he spoke of the Egyptian Delta, the necessity of a transcontinental road, the necessity of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and the question of developing the waterways and connecting the Yukon with the Western centers of Canada. The modifications, which were necessary to the financing of the Grand Trunk Pacific, owing to the changed condition of the money market, these amendments were not otherwise important. R. L. Borden, leader of the opposition, strongly criticized the modifications, saying the undertaking would cost \$100,000,000 in all. He moved an amendment that the House do not ratify the proposed amended contract, but instead that there should be an immediate construction and control by the Dominion of such lines of railway in the West as the Government country required; that the Inter-Colonial line be extended to Georgian Bay and thence to Winnipeg; and that the canal system and inland waterways be extended and that the terminus of the Pacific and Pacific be equipped. The debate, it is expected, will continue several days.

Nicaragua Seizes Schooners.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, April 5.—According to official news received here, six Cayman turtle schooners were seized by the Nicaraguan Government last week and their crews arrested and conveyed to Gracias a Dios. Immediately on receipt of the news the Cayman Commissioner forwarded a dispatch to the Government here, and the latter is now communicating with the British Foreign Office on the subject.

Small Anti-Jewish Disturbance.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 5.—Rumors have reached here, which, however, are unconfirmed, to the effect that a small anti-Jewish disturbance has taken place at Gomel, in which about 100 Jews were attacked. A free fight resulted and, according to the reports, some Jewish butchers drew their knives and wounded four Christians. Several Jewish stores were destroyed, but there were no fatalities.

Guarding Against Anti-Semitic Riots.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 5.—The Governor of Bessarabia has proclaimed a strict prohibition of gatherings in the streets and private houses; also of the carrying of weapons. This action was taken in consequence of threats of anti-semitic disturbances.

Import Duty on Petroleum Probable.

LONDON, April 5.—The Daily Mail says there is reason to believe that in the forthcoming budget Austen Chamberlain, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, will propose an import duty on petroleum and petroleum products, probably a penny per gallon.

Great Festival Opens Today.

ROME, April 5.—The great Gregorian festival, which will begin tomorrow, will be opened with divine service by the Vicar of Rome, Cardinal Respighi.

Many distinguished persons from other countries have already arrived in Rome.

Cabinet Crisis in Chile. SANTIAGO DE CHILE, April 5.—Another Ministerial crisis is imminent, and the present coalition of parties in the Cabinet will probably give way to a new party formed of the Liberal element.

From cable advices received from Tientsin yesterday it appears that Stanley Washburn, special correspondent of The Oregonian, Minneapolis Times and Chicago Daily News, and Richard H. Little, of the Chicago Daily News, were held prisoners on board their dispatch boat, the Fawen, in the harbor of Niu Chwang, for the past ten days, and their Japanese servants thrown into prison. Through the efforts of Mr. McCormick, United States Ambassador at St. Petersburg, the correspondents were released on April 4 and permitted to return to Tientsin, but their servants are still in the Russian jail at Niu Chwang. The offense of these war correspondents seems to be the employment of Japanese servants, which although non-combatants, seem to be included in the Russian designation of contraband of war.

ing the Sinit, having fought off the enemy's ships for a long time in the darkness, was himself wounded, and his chief engineer and six men were killed. "With his machinery disabled, and the helm of the Sinit damaged, Lieutenant Krinsky decided to cease firing, but, fearing to leave the open entrance to the harbor, he approached the shallows near Golden Hill and got off in a boat with another officer to extinguish the fire on the nearest steamer, and to render aid to the 12 Japanese who had been wounded. "The Otavaj sent surgeons to care for the wounded, and boats were sent to the other steamers at a terrible risk to cut the wires connecting the torpedoes which the Japanese had arranged to destroy the steamers. "The fires on the ships were extinguished."

Low Water Delays Gunboat.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—It was learned today that the officials of the Navy Department expected that the gunboat Helena would have left Niu Chwang before this, in fact, Saturday last was set for the day of departure. Press reports, however, indicate that the water in the harbor is very low at this time, and the gunboat may be obliged to wait for a Spring tide before going to Shanghai.

Russians Drawing Japanese On.

PARIS, April 5.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Echo de Paris says that the Russian general staff is convinced that the Russians will wait a week or two before attacking the Japanese. They are now busily engaged in fortifying the mouth of the river. The correspondent says the Russians are seeking to draw the Japanese on by sending small groups across the river.

Wounded From Port Arthur.

PARIS, April 5.—The correspondent of the Matin at Harbin, telegraphing yesterday, says: "A hospital train arrived here today from Port Arthur with 13 wounded and five sick. They were in the care of four sisters."

Nominated for Consul at Hankow.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—The President today sent to the Senate the nomination of George A. Anderson, of Illinois, to be Consul at Hankow, China.

Servia for the Russian army in the war in the Far East has been dismayed at the receipt of a telegram from the Emperor of Russia, thanking the members of the committee and the volunteers for the Russian sympathy, but declaring, however, that the services of the Servians would not be required.

The Emperor's telegram came as a complete surprise. One thousand applications from volunteers already had been received and the medical examination of the candidates had been set for next week. The news created something of a sensation at the festival for the benefit of the Russian Red Cross Society, at which King Peter and many persons distinguished in Russia were present.

RUSSIA WILL APPEAL THE CASES

She Contends Japan Took Ships Before War Was Declared.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 5.—Russia has completed arrangements through the French Minister at Tokyo to appeal the cases of the Russian merchantmen now before the Japanese prize courts. Three Japanese lawyers have been engaged to present the cases. Appeals will be made on various grounds.

Most of the ships were taken before the actual declaration of war, several of them were captured on the high seas, having left port before the outbreak of hostilities, and others were detained in Japanese ports, notwithstanding Japan's declaration allowing Russian ships in port a certain exemption period. There were experiments at the St. Nicholas and Warsaw depots today embarking troops on and landing them from provisions. The Landwehr class reserves of this province, will be given six weeks training at the Krasnoye Selo camp, beginning April 20. The Emperor has ordered the payment of a gratuity amounting to 18 months' pay to the officers and men of the Varig and Korietz.

Many Are Returning to Vladivostok.

Vladivostok, April 5.—The military situation is quiet. There is no evidence of the presence of the enemy in the region. The prices of necessities of life are very high on account of the lack of provisions. Lard is selling at \$2 for a tin of 25 pounds.

Many of the inhabitants who left Vladivostok at the outbreak of the war are returning.

No Sign of the Japanese Fleet.

PORT ARTHUR, April 5.—There are no signs of the Japanese, and there is no notable change in the situation. Grand Duke Boris has left Port Arthur to join the field force.

Chicago Benefit for Red Cross.

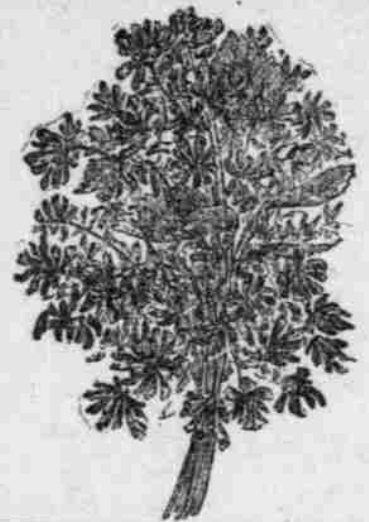

STRIKE RIOT COSTS LIFE.

Union Men Battle With Greeks and One of Their Number Is Dead.

CHICAGO, April 5.—The strike rioting at the American Can Company's plant in this city today was fiercer than it has been at any time and one man, John Nichols, lost his life by a bullet fired, it is said, from a train on which a number of nonunion men were being taken back to the city after the conclusion of the day's work.

The fighting began early in the morning, when 300 Greeks, who have been employed during the strike, attempted to come to the factory. They were met at the gates by a large number of union pickets, who attacked them with stones and clubs. Those of the Greeks who had entered the factory came pouring out, armed with knives and revolvers, and attempted to attack the union men and their sympathizers who were making the assault. The police, after a desperate fight, managed to keep the two bodies of men apart, drove the Greeks into the factory and dispersed those on the out-
