FOUR SMALL FIRES IN AN HOUR.—From the persistence and frequency with which fire bells rang and whistles blew early yesterday afternoon, the city fathers might have been able to tell that there would be other cases of "much ado about nothing." By some freak of chance four alarms were sent in about the same time and in different parts of the city. Fire apparatus dashed in every direction and there was great excitement for a time, but there was not enough fire to have fired an egg over at any of the four sources of alarm. The first was at Ninth and Duane streets, where a chimney was burning out; Russell street, in Lower Albina, where there was a small blaze at the Pacific Hotel; First and Clay streets, where several shingles on a roof had caught fire from a chimney, and Williams avenue and Madison street, where there was another chimney burning out. The principal loss was in fire-damaged property.

WILL RETURN TO HIS FORMER CHURCH.—Rev. C. C. Poling, Ph. D., president of the Dallas College, of the United Evangelical Church, was in the city yesterday, closing up some business preparatory to returning to Johnston, Pa., where he expects to return to the church he left 20 years ago to come to Oregon. Mr. Poling was first stationed on the East Side before he went to Dallas. He has been steadily weakened under his duties, and he was given leave of absence from the Dallas school and will spend two years in the Johnston. By letter he learns that his old church in Johnston desires him to return there, which he will probably do. However, Dr. Poling says he certainly will not remain in the East, but will return to Oregon.

HOW TO MAKE THE RAINBOW.—The statement that the Charles R. Spencer would continue its run through the Dalles over the Cascades, even when the locks are closed on account of high water, retarded several old rivermen yesterday morning when they were told that the Spencer would not be allowed to pass. The old rivermen wonder whether Captain E. W. Spencer is going to try the same every day on his run through the Dalles.

TO REPAIR EIGHTH-STREET BRIDGE.—Councilman Dan J. Sherritt, of the Seventh Ward, is trying to raise money to assist in repairing the East Eighth-street bridge across Stephens Slough, which has been closed for nearly a year. If a reasonable sum is subscribed the Executive Board will order the work done. As the property-owners along the bridge, who are the building of this bridge on some technicality in the first place, throwing the cost on the city, the authorities now feel that the city should not be called upon to pay for repairs. Councilman Sherritt is doing all he can to get the bridge repaired and opened to the public.

ROMAN CATHOLIC FEAST DAY.—The Feast of the Ascension was celebrated in the Catholic Church of the Holy Communion city yesterday by masses, sermons and instruction. The services were such as are held every Sunday, masses being read at 8, 9 and 10 A. M., and the elevation and rosary with the May hymn in the evening. Services are held every evening during May, the month devoted to the adoration of the Blessed Virgin. At the Episcopalian church the Ascension service was celebrated in the morning, but there were no evening services. This day is not observed in Protestant churches.

DEATH OF RESPECTED WOMAN.—One of Albina's most respected women, Mrs. F. W. Schroeder, died yesterday at the North Pacific Sanatorium after an operation for appendicitis 11 days ago. She was a member of Burek Lodge, Degree of Honor, and also of Hoffman Lodge No. 2. She was highly respected and well liked by everyone that knew her, as is her husband, F. W. Schroeder, who was for years the oldest street-car man on the Upper Albina line, and who has been married with her four grown children, Mrs. James Hyde, Fred C. Herman and Henry F. Schroeder.

WANT FIRE-CAVE FARM.—At a meeting of the Milwaukee Improvement Association last night it was decided to ask the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company to grant the residents of that place a fire-cave farm to Portland. William Schneider, vice-president of the association, in the absence of President Richard Scott, Mr. Schneider suggested that the company be asked to restore the 15-cent round trip tickets from the city to the fire-cave farm. F. H. Lecher urged that Milwaukee make an effort to secure a five-cent fare and that the railway company be urged to continue its golf-links car to Milwaukee, giving it a 20-minute schedule. On motion the following committee was appointed to take the matter up with the railway company: F. H. Lecher, Louis Streib and William Schneider.

MAY LOSE FRANCHISE.—Unless the Oregon Traction Company, the holders of the franchise of the Hillsboro suburban road, make some move toward actually beginning work upon the line by June 1, in all probability the Council will rescind the franchise and declare it void. At the meeting of the street committee of the Executive Board yesterday afternoon the subject was discussed, being brought up by two street contracts for the improvement of Northrup street, both of which are held up pending the laying of the electric-line track on that street. Members of the Executive Board have become tired of being told that negotiations for the right of way, etc., were progressing nicely. They seriously doubt if the road will ever be built under the present franchise.

WAS JUST TRYING TO KISS HER.—David G. Van Houten, whose family troubles have been taking up more or less of the police authorities' time for the past six months, was picked up by the police yesterday on the warrant secured by Minnie Van Houten several days ago, in which she charges him with assaulting her. Van Houten denied that he assaulted his wife, saying his only act was to kiss her a couple of times and take a revolver, which she had for his special benefit from her. He will be kept in durance vile until \$300 is put up for his appearance for trial. He denies he has been trying to evade arrest, insisting he has been up the river on business.

FIREBOAT ON A TRIAL TRIP.

Builders Send "George H. Williams" on First Spin.

Streams of water 400 feet long played from the monitor of the fireboat George H. Williams yesterday morning as she passed through the bridges on her builders' trial trip. About 9:30 the new fireboat was started for a run down the river to the flouring mills, and it was on the river trip that the water tower and monitor were turned loose. The Williams and Iron & Steel Works, the builders of the fireboat, report that every portion of the mechanism worked to perfection. The official trial trip will be held May 22, according to present plans. A number of fire chiefs of neighboring cities will be invited, as well as most of the local officials.

Nothing now remains for the builders to do but to touch up the boat with a finishing coat of paint. The watchdog of the water front is now lying in her berth at the foot of East Washington street, where the last finishes will be put on without delay.

The George H. Williams has a unique feature in the water tower and flashlight upon no other fireboat, so far as known. It is to be used as street water towers, the purpose being to throw a stream over some high object close to its side.

Railroad Switch on City Land.

OREGON CITY, Or., May 12.—(Special.)—R. Koehler, of the Southern Pacific Company, was in the city yesterday in consultation with the city authorities as to the extent of the company's rights in this city. By the recent decision in the Supreme Court, the municipality was given absolute title to a stretch of land bordering on the bluff that has heretofore been claimed by the railroad corporation.

On this disputed tract the Southern Pacific people have built and are now operating one side-track in excess of any other concessions that were ever granted by the city. The company now desires to erect a large water tank in this city and make other improvements, and the purpose of Mr. Koehler's visit at this time is to arrive at an understanding with the city authorities.

There is a disposition on the part of the members of the City Council to realize for the city something in the way of revenue from the railroad people if any more concessions are to be made. In this connection the city authorities will ask the railroad people to provide an underground crossing for the South End road.

Shoppers to Work Nine Hours.
