### IMPROVING OREGON LINES

BOUTHERN PACIFIC BEGINS EX-TENSIVE WORK.

Building Steel Bridges, Filling Tres ties and Laying Heavy Rails-Faster Trains Will Result.

The Oregon lines of the Southern Pacific will soon be in as good condition as those in California and other states, and within a year trains are likely to make the trip between Portland and San Francisco much faster than the present schedule

The work now under way is the ere tion of steel instead of wooden bridges in many places and the filling of many trea-ties with solid earth. Two steam shovels are already engaged in the latter work and a third will be added next week.

equal number is employed in filling and ballasting the O. R. & N. lines. E. E. Calvin, general manager of the Harriman lines in Oregon, expects to ar-range to lay a considerable amount of mew rails on the mountain sections of the Bouthern Pacific in this state this Sum-mer. The present rails weigh only 56 and 62 pounds to the yard, but the new rail will weigh 80 pounds and will gradually be continued the whole length of the road

between Portland and San Francisco.
All these improvements combined will render it safe to travel much faster over the Oregon lines than has been the custom hitherto. It is necessary to slow down at all wooden trestles, and trains cannot run safely at high speed on light rails, especially in wet weather and on sharp

With the pending improvements com-pleted, the Harriman lines in Oregon will have been brought up to the standard set for Western roads in recent years. Many millions have been expended in such work on the Northern, Central and Southern Pacific roads, until the hauling power of each locomotive has been immensely in-creased, the speed of trains increased, the omfort and safety of passengers enhanced and operating expenses greatly re-duced. In fact the Western roads are fast coming up to the high standard set by those of the densely populated East and this year's work in Oregon will bring her roads up with her neighboring states.

#### HEAVY TRAVEL TO ST. LOUIS.

Exceeds Expectation of Rallroad Men and May Require More Trains.

The number of people who have gone t the St. Louis Fair from the Pacific North-west at this early period in the season has been a surprise to railroad men. It was not expected that any considerable number would go for at least a month after the opening as it was well known that the Exposition was not completed, but it is estimated that already 1800 persons have gone from this section.

The indications are that there will be a ous increase in the number of pe ple who go to the Exposition, and the rall-roads are already considering the proba-ble necessity of increasing train service. Flastbound travel is running pretty close to the capacity of their present train and if it should still grow as it does no more trains will be needed to carry it.

#### THROUGH ROCK ISLAND CAR

Will Be Run From Portland Over New Line to St. Louis.

Another routs to St. Louis has been opened through the completion of the St. Louis, Kansas City & Colorado Railroad, a part of the Rock Island system, which has just been put in operation. It is intended to run a through Rock Island car over this line to St. Louis, beginning soon after June 1, the car to start from Portland over the O. R. & N. and run over land over the O.
