

RETREAT TO THE HILLS

THIBETANS NO LONGER RESIST
ADVANCE IN OPEN.Swoop Down on British Columns in
Endeavor to Cut Lines of
Communication.

GYANGTSE, June 5.—The military situation in Tibet has undergone a considerable change during the past ten days. The Tibetans have abandoned the plain and retreated into the hills, where they endeavor from time to time to cut the British lines of communication.

The force of Tibetans at Jong is very large, while it is rumored that another force is being massed at a point between Raling and Khamtse. The report that the Tibetans have been using leather-bound wooden cannon is entirely untrue. They have no cannon, but plenty of fangs and Russian rifles.

AGED WOMAN MURDERED.

Mystery as to Motive, as Jewels Are
Not Taken.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., June 5.—Mrs. Mattie E. Carls was found dead at her home here today. Her body was lying under her bed and was badly bruised. It is believed that she was murdered, but the motive for the crime was not taken. The body was found in the room where the body lay, and two diamonds were on the dresser.

Mrs. Carls was an aged woman, and as far as known had no relatives. The police have not as yet found a clue to the mystery.

Diamond Thief Brought Back.
KANSAS CITY, June 5.—Blanche Ryan, charged with the theft of \$500 worth of diamonds from a woman at Chihuahua, Mexico, was arrested at Little Rock by a Deputy United States Marshal who is to be brought to Kansas City, where she will be held until extradition papers are made out. The theft of the diamonds is stated to have occurred four months ago, and since then officers have chased the woman miles.

It is stated that Secretary of State Hay has given the matter of extradition his personal attention. Mrs. Ryan said that authorities have requested that the Ryan woman should be turned over to them as a concession in return for the surrender by Mexico of Charles Kratz, wanted in St. Louis for alleged bootlegging.

Witness of Bookmaker's Death.
NEW YORK, June 5.—Relatives and friends of Frank T. Young, the bookmaker and racehorse owner, who was killed in a cab while riding with Mrs. Nan Patterson Saturday morning, were in consultation today with a lawyer. Subsequently it was said that a witness would be produced at the inquest tomorrow. The testimony would certainly result in a definite charge of murder being preferred against some one.

Beyond the fact that the promised witness is named "Billy" the dead man's friend would say nothing as to his identity.

Mrs. Patterson is Washington Girl.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—It was ascertained tonight that Mrs. Nan Patterson, who has been arrested by the police of New York City in connection with the shooting of "Cassius" Young, the turfman, is a Washington girl. Her father, John B. Patterson, is well known in real estate circles of this city.

It was stated tonight that Mr. Patterson was in New York City after his daughter's arrest. Members of the family remaining in the city today positively refused to discuss the subject of the Young shooting.

Jewels Stolen From the Fair.

ST. LOUIS, June 5.—Gold and jewels to the value of \$100 have been stolen from the German Colonial exhibit in the Palace of Agriculture at the World's Fair. There was a clew. A reward of \$200 has been offered by the German Imperial Commission for the return of all the jewels and the arrest and conviction of the thieves. In all 115 pieces of jewelry were stolen.

RUSSIA HAS NO NEWS.

Communication With Port Arthur
Is Entirely Shut Off.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 5.—The government appears to be without fresh information today of any sort concerning Port Arthur. The authorities are skeptical over the story of smoke and heavy detonations at Port Arthur, which may have been caused by the Japanese passing over mine fields on the landward side. Even this, they say, is a doubtful supposition this early in the siege.

Route of Russian Cossacks.

TOKIO, June 5.—General Kuroki, in his official report of the engagement on Friday between Cossacks and Japanese near Chalmachi, states that the Cossacks were completely routed and compelled to retreat, leaving a large number of dead behind. The Japanese casualties were one killed and three wounded.
