

CHEER TO PARTY

Oregon Election Makes East More Hopeful.

HARD BLOW TO DEMOCRATS

Idle for Them to Try to Minimize Their Defeat.

NEW PLURALITIES TOO GREAT

New York Mail and Express Characterizes the Result as Most Noteworthy in That State is First to Go on Record.

NEW YORK, June 7.—(Special.)—In an editorial tonight, the Mail and Express says:

"Oregon's reply to Democratic invitations to betray its past is clear and decisive. At the election yesterday, Blinger Hermann, the present Representative from the first district, was elected over his Democratic opponent by at least 6000 votes, and in the Second District Congressman Williamson secures a re-election by probably 10,000 votes over the opposition candidate. This shows that the state may be counted as solidly Republican on National issues, for pluralities thus far indicated are larger than for many years past.

"The result is all the more noteworthy because in state matters the Democrats were able to elect their candidate for Governor in 1902, though by a plurality of 276. This demolished a Republican plurality of 10,000 in 1898, the previous gubernatorial election, and reversed McKinley's plurality of 12,161 in 1900. The prestige of this exploit was of little advantage to Democrats at the election yesterday, however. The state takes its stand in the Republican column, the first to declare itself this year.

"It will be idle for the Democrats to try to minimize their defeat. The Oregon election was the first of the year, which had a bearing on National affairs; the first to offer a 'line' on the result of the coming Presidential contest. Its issue can only dishearten the Democrats. It is most helpful and hopeful to the Republicans."

NO COMFORT TO DEMOCRATS.

Oregon is More Solidly Republican Than Ever.

NEW YORK, June 7.—(Special.)—In an editorial tonight the Globe and Commercial Advertiser says:

"The Democrats of the country will not be able to extract either comfort or encouragement from the result of yesterday's election in Oregon. Four years ago, in a precisely similar election, the Republicans carried the state by a plurality of about 8000 for the highest candidate on the ticket, and by a plurality of about 3000 in the First Congressional District, and about 9000 in the Second. Now they are said to have a plurality of 10,000 in the state, about 6000 in the First Congressional District and about 10,000 in the Second. It was deduced from the result four years ago that not only was the state certain for the Republicans in the ensuing Presidential election, but that the figures of the returns showed conclusively that there had been no diminution in Republican strength throughout the country as a whole.

"It was thought that a change favorable to the Democrats had been in progress in Oregon because the Democrats elected their candidate for Governor in 1902 by 276, and because at a special election for Congressman in the First District in June of last year the Republicans had a plurality of only about 2000. The result of yesterday shows that these Democratic hopes were delusive, and that the state and inferentially the Northwest section, of which it is a part, is as solidly Republican as it was in 1896 and 1900."

SHOWS REPUBLICAN GAINS.

Oregon Vote Also Shows People Want Roosevelt Re-Elected.

NEW YORK, June 7.—Speaking editorially tonight, the Evening Sun says:

"If the Congressional election in Oregon which took place yesterday could be regarded as an index to the general result in November, there would be no change in the Presidency or the House. It takes about a week to get full returns from the two Oregon districts, but the early figures indicate that Hermann, Rep., has carried the first by 6000 to 2000 plurality, and Williamson, Rep., the Second District by a plurality of 10,000. In 1902 T. H. Tongue, Rep., had a plurality of 712 in the First, and J. N. Williamson, Rep., 839 in the Second. When complete returns are at hand it will probably be found that there have been net Republican gains."

CALIFORNIA CROPS SUFFER.

Continued Drying Winds Have a Serious Effect.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The Weather Bureau's weekly summary of crop conditions says:

While too cool for best results in portions of the Lake and Missouri valleys and Northern Rocky Mountain districts, the week as a whole has been very favorable in the districts east of the Rocky Mountains. The North Pacific Coast also experienced a favorable week, but in California nearly all crops were injured by continued drying north winds.

Winter wheat has suffered somewhat from heavy rains in portions of Oklahoma. On the North Pacific Coast the crop has advanced favorably, and is heading in California it is maturing rapidly, the late sown having been seriously damaged by hot winds.

Engineers Conclude Their Work.

LOS ANGELES, June 7.—The sixth biennial convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers reached final adjournment tonight. The closing session was spent in the installation of officers and the clearing up of matters of minor importance, which has not

been previously disposed of. Most of the delegates will depart for their homes tomorrow.

LIBERTY STILL DENIED HER.

Woman With Turfman Young When Shot Must Wait on Judge.

NEW YORK, June 7.—Mrs. Nan Patterson, who has been held in the Tombs Prison in connection with the mysterious death of Caesar Young, the wealthy bookmaker, was today taken before Justice Clarke, of the Supreme Court, on a writ of habeas corpus. The courtroom was crowded.

When proceedings were begun, Attorney Brown produced a copy of the affidavits on which the woman is held by the Coroner. Attorney Unger, for Mrs. Patterson, referring to the affidavits, said they were contradicted by a paper which purported to be a return, but was in such shape that he doubted that the District Attorney's office was responsible for it. He then demurred formally to the return.

Mrs. Patterson never took her eyes from her counsel's face as he was making the argument, but she gave not the slightest indication of nervousness or anxiety over the outcome. From all her demeanor showed, she might have been one of the half-dozen women spectators in the courtroom.

Assistant District Attorney Sandford said it would be a great pleasure to the Coroner if he could discharge the woman, but he could not under the pure question of law. The information had been laid before him that a crime had been committed.

The Assistant District Attorney went on to describe the wound, and said the woman was the only one who was near the dead man.

"The pistol was held so close to the coat that it could not have been held by any one but the defendant or the dead man, and from the nature of the wound the dead man could not have returned the pistol to his coat pocket," said Mr. Sandford, as he asked the court to dismiss the writ.

Justice Clarke announced he would take the papers and announce his decision later. The crowd was hustled out of the courtroom and Mrs. Patterson taken through the Justice's chamber to the street and in a carriage to the Tombs. It is understood that the grand jury will be asked to take up the case tomorrow, in view of the possibility that Justice Clarke may decide that Mrs. Patterson is not guilty under her commitment by the Coroner. This commitment, it is said, does not name the charge on which she is held.

Detectives are slowly tracing the history of the revolver which caused the horseman's death. Around the ownership of the weapon may revolve a solution of the whole affair. Young's friends all assert that he never carried a pistol, and the intimates of "Nan" Patterson declare she had a horror of weapons.

Some progress has been made in tracing the revolver, enough to indicate that it may have been purchased in San Francisco. It was manufactured in Springfield, Mass., bore the factory number 7500, was purchased by a firm here and sold by them in 1898 or 1899. The firm's records for those years have been destroyed, but the dealers express the belief that the revolver was among a lot shipped to San Francisco. If this should prove true, the owner of the fatal weapon may be identified, as four of the persons directly connected with the tragedy are well known in San Francisco.

A strict search of the pawnshops has failed to develop any information which would lead to the belief that the revolver was purchased in this city, and the detectives are hopeful that a valuable clue may be obtained in California.

James Dooley, a deckhand, is reported as having told a strange story regarding the sale of his revolver to a stranger in the Broadway, near the scene of the shooting, a short time before Young and Mrs. Patterson are known to have been there. He asserts the man treated him several times in a saloon, and upon learning he had a weapon, purchased it, saying he wanted to shoot a woman. Little credence is placed in the story.

HARD FIGHT ON IN KENTUCKY

Issue Is Between Governor Beckham and Anti-Machine Men.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 7.—The Kentucky Democrats will hold their State Convention tomorrow for the purpose of naming delegates at-large to the National Convention at St. Louis, and to elect state central and state executive committees. It is likely that a hard fight will be made for an instructed delegation. One side are arrayed Governor Beckham and his administration forces, supporting Lewis McQueen, of Bowling Green, for chairman of the State Central Committee. Opposing them is what is known as the anti-machine element, led by United States Senators Blackburn and McCrory and Congressman D. H. Smith, supporting Congressman J. N. Kehoe for chairman of the State Central Committee. Among Governor Beckham's supporters have a majority of the instructed delegates, only about half the delegates are instructed, and politicians are in the dark as to the real strength of the opposing forces.

The administration leaders are for Judge Alton B. Parker, and most of the leaders of the opposition are inclined toward the New York man.

Odell Keeps It to Himself.

PARIS, June 7.—Governor Odell, of New York, when asked concerning the results of his conference with Ambassador Porter, said they went over the New York situation, as the direction of the campaign depended upon his getting the views of the various leaders. However, he did not deem it desirable to make a formal statement, as the State Convention would not occur until September. Mr. Odell added that, whatever may have been said during the conferences relative to the nomination for the Governorship and without prejudice to any other candidate, was mainly tentative.

Nominated for Congress.

Twentieth Illinois District, Henry T. Rainey, Democrat, renominated.

BROKER KILLS ANOTHER.

Apparently on Good Terms Up to the Time of the Tragedy.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 8.—Richard T. Pruesner, a well-known broker of this city, shot and killed Miles McDonnell, a member of the Boston Metropolitan Stock Exchange, early this morning. Both men were interested in the company and had been on good terms until just before the tragedy. Pruesner had been drinking heavily, and left a restaurant, went to his office and got a shotgun. He then went to the Ten Eyck Hotel, where McDonnell was rooming, and going to Pruesner's room, shot him dead. McDonnell's home was in Jamaica Plains, where he had a wife and three children.

FINALLY ARREST NEGRESS.

Detectives Batten In Door of Home of Woman Wanted for Blackmail.

NEW YORK, June 7.—Detectives tonight battered down the heavy front door at the residence in the city of Mrs. Eliza Elias, the negro woman who is charged with obtaining nearly \$700,000 from aged John B. Platt by blackmail. They then placed her under arrest on a warrant charging her with extorting money. Elias was in bed when the warrant was served.

HEARST IS DOWNED

Colorado Convention Refuses to Instruct.

THE VOTE IS MOST DECISIVE

Friends of the Editor Capture Several Caucuses, but Lose at Last—Kansas City Platform Is Indorsed.

PUEBLO, Colo., June 7.—The Democrats of Colorado today named delegates to the National Convention at St. Louis as follows:

First district — Delegates at-large, Charles S. Thomas, Charles J. Hughes, Jr., T. J. O'Donnell, Denver; district delegates, Charles B. Ward, Boulder; Harry Elmsley, Denver; Second district, delegates at-large, A. P. Seeds, Cripple Creek; Alva Adams, Pueblo; George E. West, La Plata; Third district, John H. Voorhees, Pueblo; J. H. Robeson, Clear Creek. Judge John I. Mullins, of Denver, was unanimously elected National Committeeman.

The delegation goes uninstructed. The Hearst people captured the caucus held by the Second district delegates, but when they attempted to pass a resolution instructing for Hearst through the convention, it was turned down by a vote of 379 to 108.

Indorses Kansas City Platform.

The platform indorses the Kansas City platform of 1900, and instructs delegates to use all honorable means to secure a platform in harmony therewith; demands the enforcement of all anti-trust laws; demands a complete revision of the tariff and the placing of all trust-made goods on the free list; demands the admission into the Union of Arizona, Oklahoma and New Mexico; demands that the people of the Philippines be insured their independence at the earliest possible moment; opposes giving National banks the power to, in any manner, control the circulation of the money of the Government; demands swift and sure punishment to the perpetrators of the Cripple Creek outrage; declares for law and order, but condemns Governor Peabody for deporting men from their homes; pledges just treatment to both labor and capital; condemns the Republicans for extravagance in state financial affairs, and holds the Republicans responsible for the failure of the Legislature to enact an eight-hour law.

Strong resolutions commending Mr. Bryan were adopted. Charles J. Hughes, of Denver, was chairman of the convention.

The District Caucuses.

At noon the delegates of the two districts went into caucus, and it was then that the first Hearst demonstration was made. In the caucus of the First District delegates, no fight developed, but in the Second District the Hearst followers, led by R. P. Montgomery, ex-Speaker of the House, put through a resolution instructing their nominees to support Hearst. The Hearst people won by a large majority, but when the Hearst resolution came up for ratification in the convention, it was snowed under, the combined strength of the delegates from the First District going against it.

In the addresses during the afternoon before the convention, Governor Peabody's policy was severely criticised by ex-Governor Charles Thomas, Senator Thomas M.

an extra session of the new Legislature will be held next December for the election of a Senator and that the Governor is in perfect accord with the Republican state leaders.

George L. Oliver tonight informed the state leaders and the Governor that he did not wish his name to be further considered in connection with the Senatorship. His reasons for this act were purely private and personal, and has no connection with the probability or improbability of his selection.

Senator Taliferro Renominated.
