HOW THE EX-CANDIDATES FEEL

Post-Election Gossip Recalls How the Nominations Were Made.

Sanderson Reed was a grin on his face yesterday in spite of thistles; Stott ruminated and was silent; Courtney counted up the lagging returns in the hope of pulling out at the finish; Nottingham declared it is the greatest election he has ever seen and County has ever voted to a man; and Storey boasted that he had spent \$4000 in the campaign and that he would be the next Mayor.

Republicans were of the general opinion that had Storey been renominated by the Republican convention he would have been renominated by the convention he could have been elected. To this opinion Democrats generally acceded. Democrats also confessed that had J. C. Moreland or John F. Logan or Charles F. Lee been nominated by Republicans for District Attorney, they would have been elected.

Courtney was scratched by many Simon Republicans, who thought he was a weak man. Simonites vented on Courtney their dislike of the ruling Republican regime. They also attacked Reed and Stott. All this is admitted by Republican workers. It is too patent for denial.

Responsibility for Stott's nomination is cast on T. C. Powell and C. A. Burkhardt, who were the chief advisers of the council of Judge Carey. Representing the Matthews influence desired Stott's

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nomination. Stott's workers were able to combine the 18 Simon votes in the convention with enough Matthews votes to win the nomination. The nomination had, however been promised to McDowell, who was supported by influential business interests.

The same interests obtained Reed's nomination, though against the best judgment of Carey. As showing Carey's reluctance, one of his utterances may be recalled from the day prior to the state convention. "Well," said he, "I suppose we shall have to accept Reed." W. F. Matthews lent his influence to Reed's nomination because he was impressed with the wishes of the commercial interests.

Courtney was put forward by the Matthews people, but so were Dan J. Mahoney and C. W. Hodson, who made
