MANY CARNIVAL SPORTS

OUTSIDE CITIES TO ENTER A NUMBER OF HOSE TEAMS.

The Fourth of July Will See Impromptu Races and Games on Multnomah Field.

The Carnival and the crowds of out-of-town visitors who are already beginning to throng the streets are providing an excellent collection of spectators for any form of athletic sport that is attempted. And the idle sightseers will have an opportunity within the next week to see a good deal of that sort of thing about the Fourth of July. Though on that day there will not be much more than a double-header baseball game, the days immediately preceding and following that date will furnish so much that the visitors will hardly be able to do justice to both the Carnival and the attending sports. To add to the possibilities in the way of games, other people get busy competing in many games, the Mardi Gras authorities have some exhibitions to present in the way of track events and fire-hose competitions that are creating rivalry already, especially among the towns competing in the hose drill.

This hose drill, which takes place July 1 and 2, will be unique to most of the citizens of Portland and the Carnival visitors. It is an old-fashioned sport and the more interesting for that. It is a survival in a way, for before the days of modern fire apparatus hose carts were run to fire and water pumped by volunteer fire departments in the cities these institutions have passed with the coming of modern fire engines; but in the towns they survive. Astoria now has the crack company of the state, but there are other aspirants from the Valley, and there will be in the competition teams from Albany, Corvallis, Vancouver, The Dalles, Oregon City and Independence. With this bunch to win out against Astoria will have to be in perfect form.

The schedule of races and the rules as published by the Mardi Gras committee follow:
First race—Hub and hub, shall be run 100 yards, two teams together, each team, winners of each heat shall run the final heat. First prize will be \$50; second, \$25. If more than three teams contest in race the prizes will be: First prize, \$40; second prize, \$20; third, \$10.
Second race—Wet test race, shall run 75 yards to hydrant, lay 75 yards hose, attach nozzle to plug and get water. The time of this race shall be taken from time of leaving scratch until water leaves end of nozzle and laid on ground. First prize, \$40; second prize, \$20. If more than three teams contest in the race the prizes will be: First prize, \$30; second prize, \$15; third prize, \$10.
Third race—Dry test race, shall run 75 yards to hydrant, attach hose, lay 75 yards hose and attach nozzle. Time of this race shall be taken from time of leaving scratch until nozzle is attached to hose and laid on ground. First prize, \$40; second prize, \$20. If more than three teams contest in the race the prizes will be: First prize, \$30; second prize, \$15; third prize, \$10.
Fourth race—New York test race, shall run 75 yards to hydrant, attach hose to plug; lay 75 yards of hose, attach nozzle, obtain water, change second section of hose with last section of hose, attach nozzle and obtain water. Time of this race shall be taken from time of leaving scratch until water is obtained the second time. First prize, \$40; second prize, \$20. If more than three teams contest in race prizes will be: First prize, \$30; second prize, \$15; third prize, \$10.

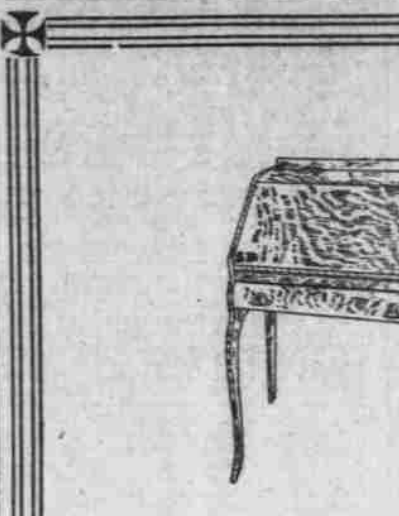
Rules—In all races where joints are coupled there shall be at least one turn. The officials shall consist of one referee, three judges, three timekeepers and one starter. Three officials shall be selected from towns with representative teams. All starts of races shall be by pistol shots. All teams will be given passes to all parts of the Carnival. All teams shall consist of 12 men each.
These exhibitions will be held on the open street downtown. The Mardi Gras also intends holding on the Fourth of July impromptu sports with field and track events on the Carnival grounds at Multnomah Field, where the running track has not been disturbed. This will be mainly for the benefit of the strong and fleet among the visitors who can enter on the spot. There will be races for men and women, all taken in the true Carnival spirit, with no attention paid to records, but everything in the spirit of fun.

It is about all the Carnival will do for itself, but there will be plenty going on about town. The number of amateur baseball games that will be played during the three days, Saturday, Sunday and Monday, the Fourth, is beyond compilation. Field events will be held on the emblems of a diamond marked upon the ground for ready for a number of games during the day. Professional ball will be on tap constantly at the Vaughn-street grounds, and on the Fourth, in the afternoon, there will be a contest between two teams, so that the reddest-faced fan in town can have his fill.

The river sports, which are one of Portland's big attractions, will not be neglected. The Yacht Club has decided whether to have a race on the Fourth or for a cruise during the three days of virtual holiday. And though they will probably freeze to the cruise idea and a dozen or fifteen larks and knots boats will put off down river Saturday for a cruise on the Columbia, the Rowing Club will do the honors.
There will be races for junior fours and doubles and for single sculls Saturday afternoon. The races will be in the nature of tryouts for the big Northwest races July 22 and 23. The senior crew is picked and will probably race in the big event without further change. The boat will be pulled by King, stroke; Ball, three; Kirkley, two, and Luders, bow.
Three junior fours and four doubles will race. The fours are: No. 1—Norcross, stroke; Greenman, three; Ambrose, two, and P. Smith, bow. No. 2—Dent, stroke; Farley, three; Ormandy, two, and Frohman, bow. No. 3—Smith, stroke; Vandeleur, three; Wagner, two, and Peterson, bow. The doubles will be McCabe and Peterson, Durham and Steiner, Marshall and Rosenfelt, and Hopen and Taylor. Three single scullers are entered in the race. Patton, Gloss and Lambersen. The finish of this race will be opposite the boathouse, which can constantly be viewed from the Madison-street bridge.

Tracey May Fight Again.
When Tommy Tracey went down to defeat Joe Gans, at the Exposition building, the local bonfire declared that it was his last battle in the ring. Tommy had intended to keep his word, but of late several fight promoters have been after Tracey, and now there is talk of his being matched to fight Rufus Turner, the Stockton, Cal., boxer. Tracey has not yet made up his mind to take on Turner, but if he does, Tommy wants something to say about the weights. If the match is made, the battle will be pulled off at Seattle.

cell in the County Jail. He came with the officer from his home in Portsmouth with his horse and buggy which was furnished by the jail. Ellis was not informed what he was wanted for except that the Sheriff wanted to see him. When he arrived at the Courthouse he was taken to a circular room where he was held for a while. He was then taken to a cell in the County Jail without resorting to force.
Soon after he was placed in the lock and key, he sent out a note which was delivered to the County Judge, stating that he was trapped in jail, and asking that someone be sent to see him immediately. The note is written on a circular dated Long Beach, Cal., March 30, 1902, in which Ellis is recommended by five ministers and nine business men as an evangelist in good standing. Several of the signers state that they have known him for over 20 years and others for lesser periods. The circular also contains a memorandum to railroad officials recommending Ellis for favors.

SUSPECTS HER PARTNER.

Mrs. W. Zinkan Desires to Withdraw From Saloon Business.

Mrs. W. Zinkan, who alleges that on October 30, 1902, she advanced to Fred Peterson sufficient money to start a saloon at the northeast corner of Third and Everett streets, yesterday filed suit in the State Circuit Court asking to have the partnership existing between them dissolved, and for the appointment of a receiver.
The plaintiff in her complaint sets forth that Peterson has not conducted the business in good faith, and has not accounted to her for the profits, except \$600 and has appropriated to his own use more than \$1000 which he received to divide with her. Mrs. Zinkan alleges that they entered into a contract on October 30, 1902, by the terms of which she was to advance the money for the business, and also provide a bartender. She says at the end of one year the partnership was continued, but Peterson refused to make a settlement with her or to turn over the bills due and payable and expense accounts. Mrs. Zinkan asserts that she holds the lease of the premises. Dell Stuart and William Foley appear as her attorneys.

WOMEN IN WRANGLE.

Care of Cancer Patient the Cause of Much Dispute.

Mrs. W. A. Brace, who has been taking care of Mrs. Emma Nyman for the past six months and furnishing her with a home and medicine, states that Mrs. Nyman is indebted to her in the sum of \$250 for medicine and nursing and ought not to leave her house until the bill is paid. Mrs. Brace admits that she declined to allow Mrs. Nyman to go with Mrs. Osborn and Mrs. Williams when they called for her on Sunday, and explains as a reason for her conduct that they came with a truck and disturbed the peace and quiet of her home on the Lord's day, which she considered highly improper. She says further that the language used by her visitors was improper. Mrs. Nyman is still at the residence of Mrs. Brace, and while Mrs. Brace says Mrs. Nyman desires to go to the house on Kirby street, which Mrs.

Osborn, Mrs. Drake, Mrs. Williams and others have had built and furnished for her, Mrs. Brace does not express an opinion as to how soon Mrs. Nyman will reach the place.
"She is not able to do any work," said Mrs. Brace, "and she needs the care of a nurse continually. The proper place for her is the County Hospital. I have denied myself the pleasures of life, church and lodges and in every way for Mrs. Nyman. The statement that I asked her to make over \$50 insurance to me is not true."

County Tax Sales.

In compliance with the statute County Clerk Fields on the first Monday in July

will turn over to the Sheriff a list of property to which the county has heretofore acquired title, on account of unpaid taxes, to be sold to the highest bidder. The County Court has authority to continue the sale from day to day, and will probably postpone the sale from time to time for a week or two.

New Suit Against Baillet.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—Latus Baillet, mining promoter, is again called into the courts in connection with the shares of a company in which he was interested as an officer. The White Star Mining Company, Limited, today filed a complaint in the Superior Court against Baillet, alleging that he was an organizer of the com-
