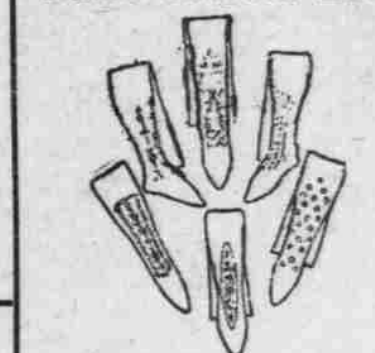

INCLINED TO BLAME DUMONT.

St. Louis Official Shows Aeronaut Was Not Careful of Airship.

ST. LOUIS, June 29.—Lieutenant-Colonel H. P. Kingsbury, U. S. A., Commandant of the Jefferson Guard, who has been investigating the attempted destruction of the gas bag of Santos Dumont's airship, made his report to President Francis, of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Company, tonight. Commandant Kingsbury says in part:

"I learn from Lieutenant Walsh, of the Secret Service, who has investigated the matter thoroughly, that Mr. Hudson told him several times yesterday afternoon spoke to Mr. Dumont of the advisability of placing special watchmen over the balloon and placing the cover on the box. This Mr. Dumont did not do, only partially replacing the cover, as he stated he desired to get all the air possible in contact with the balloon. If air had been essential to the balloon, as much could have been obtained if a strong wire netting had been placed over the top of the box, the cover of which was only about half removed, anyway."

"One of Mr. Dumont's assistants is said to carry a large, strong knife. Owing to the strength of the numerous folds and thicknesses of the balloon envelope, some such knife as this would have been necessary to cut the balloon."

"A casual examination of the building in its present condition could not fail to convince any one that even with a vigilant watchman it would be a very simple matter for a determined person to do what was done last night."

"I am told Mr. Hudson stated today that the balloon could be repaired here, at least temporarily, in two to five days."

"The above report is a compilation of personal observations, reports of my subordinates and conversations with the Secret Service men."

Charles F. Morrison, who was arrested and confined in the Fair Police Station on a charge of having wielded the

knife on the gas bag, was released tonight, the authorities being of the opinion that there was not sufficient evidence to justify holding him. It is stated that Mr. Dumont will leave at once for Paris, taking the gas bag with him, and return to the United States, probably within six weeks.

Two Fair Buildings Dedicated.

ST. LOUIS, June 29.—Wisconsin Day was celebrated at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition today. Governor La Follette made a short address, and the building was presented to the exposition by ex-Governor Hearl, president of the Wisconsin State Board of Managers. The West Virginia State building was also dedicated today. Governor A. B. White accepted the building for his state. The principal address was made by Hon. John T. McElraw.

NEW YORK, June 29.—(Special).—Miss Mary Ogden, of Yonkers, N. Y., today married Laurence Latourette Driggs, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Channing Driggs, of Portland, Or., in St. Andrew's Church, Yonkers. Mrs. David Gregg, of Great Barrington, Mass., a sister of the bride, was matron of honor. The bridesmaids were two sisters of the bride, the Misses Helen and Katherine Ogden. Mr. Driggs, who is a graduate of the University of Michigan, class of '98, had as his best man Alfred T. Ogden, a brother of Miss Ogden. The ushers were Leonard Couderd Fuller, Leeds Johnson, Andrew Murray Williams, Harris T. Lindberg, Horace C. Cooley and David Gregg. A reception followed the ceremony.

July Dividends Nearly Up to Average

NEW YORK, June 29.—Despite several suspensions of payments by industrial companies and occasional omissions by railroads the total of July dividends apparently will fall but little below the

record figures of last Summer, while it runs slightly ahead of the total for last January. Dividend payments due July 1 are estimated at \$3,500,000, and in the payment of \$3,250,000. The only noteworthy feature of the statistics is a decline of over \$2,000,000 in payments by industrial concerns as compared with July, 1903. This is accounted for, however, by the suspension of dividends on the common stock of one great corporation.

FORTY-ODD FIREMEN OVERCOME

Gas Mains Break While New York Fire is Raging Fiercely.

NEW YORK, June 29.—Forty-three firemen, four of whom will probably die, were overcome by smoke and gas at a fire today in the sub-cellar of the double five-story brick building, at Nos. 483 and 485 Broadway, extending through to Mercer street. Half a hundred employees were driven from the building and the damage inflicted by fire, water and smoke was estimated at between \$100,000 and \$200,000. ASSAILED BY GERMAN TRADE.

American Customs Law Held to Be Unjust in Several Particulars.

BERLIN, June 29.—An important memorial on the American customs administration and German trade has been presented by the League of German Manufacturers to Chancellor von Buelow, Baron von Buelow, Secretary of Foreign Affairs; Herr Mueller, Prussian Minister of Commerce and Industry, and to Herr Buelow, German Consul-General at New York, who are now in Berlin. The memorial is based upon material which the league collected in accordance with a resolution adopted in 1903, and was written by the Saxon manufacturer, Alfred Poleschow, who was sent to the United States to collect information among importers. The league summarizes its views in the following five points:

"First—The American Government should be prevailed upon to accept German manufacturers' declaration, sworn to before American Consuls, as evidence of value in all cases."

"Second—It is necessary to reintroduce the former privilege of appealing directly to the American Treasury Department, because, under the present practice, a decision rendered by the general appraisers cannot be 'overthrown' even when the courts find it to be erroneous."

"Third—The general appraisers should be required to communicate to the importer sentenced the penalty and duty and reasons for the board's decisions, so that the importer can defend himself."

"Fourth—The practice of classing German goods sold in the United States as 'praisers' cannot be 'overthrown' even when the courts find it to be erroneous."

"Fifth—Shipments of goods and samples should not be detained in public warehouses, as hitherto, under the buyers' refusal to take the goods because of too late delivery, the samples are no longer available for the approaching season."

The memorial complains that such retention now occurs, even when bond of security is offered. It concludes with

reference to the importance of the German market to American exporters, as being much greater than that of the American market to Germany, and argues, therefore, that it is only a question of how the German Government acts in the matter which will decide the response of the American Government to the wishes of the German manufacturer.

GUNBOAT ORDERED TO HAYTI.

Germany Wants Guards Who Assaulted Minister Punished.

BERLIN, June 29.—The German gunboat Panther, now at Newport News, received orders by cable to sail for Port au Prince today.

(The sailing of the Panther for Port au Prince is due to the decision of Germany to insist upon the punishment of the Palace Guards who recently threw stones at the German and French Ministers, while the latter were driving past the palace.)

Cruiser Will Arrive Today.

PORT-AU-PRINCE, June 29.—The French cruiser Jurien de la Graviere will arrive here July 1.

America Will Not Intervene.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—It is said the State Department never has taken the ground that the smaller republics ought to be protected by the United States as against reclamations by European powers for violated contract obligations in international obligations, such as it is alleged is involved in this attack on the foreign Ministers. So, if the demands made on Hayti by France and Germany are not excessive or oppressive, in the judgment of the State Department, there will be no interference by this Government, but developments will be watched with keen interest to see that the line is properly drawn and undue punishment is not inflicted. It is not doubted that the Haytian Government will supplement its inadequate letter of apology by punishing the guilty guards when it realizes it cannot look for intervention by this country.

LIBERAL CLUB DISRUPTED.

Significant Political Development in Britain.

LONDON, June 30.—A significant political development, which calls out much comment from all the morning newspapers, is the disruption of the Liberal Union Club at yesterday's meeting, when 64 members withdrew, after announcing their resignation from the club.

The trouble arose over a resolution to send representation of the club to the Liberal Unionist Council. By a majority of 108, composed of the followers of Joseph Chamberlain, the club decided to be represented in the council, and when the result was announced, the minority of 64 immediately withdrew and formed a new club under the name of the Unionist Free-Trade Club. The Liberal Union Club has been recognized as a powerful organization, thoroughly representative of the Liberal Unionist party.

Remains of Galdi Taken to Cathedral

MANILA, June 29.—The remains of Archbishop Galdi, the apostolic delegate in the Philippine Islands, who died June 28 of heart disease, were today taken from the Papal Legation to the Cathedral, where the body will lie in state. On Friday Archbishop Harty will celebrate a requiem mass, assisted by the Right Rev. Dennis J. Dougherty, bishop of Nueva Segovia; the Right Rev. Thomas A. Hendrick, bishop of Cebu, and Monsignore F. Z. Rucker, bishop of Jaro.

Automobile to Thunder Mountain.

NAMPA, Idaho, June 29.—(Special).—L. C. Van Riper, president of the Wardenhott mines, in Thunder Mountain, will arrive here with his son tomorrow and together they will at once start for Thunder Mountain in an automobile. Nearly a month ago Mr. Van Riper distributed

gasoline along the route for the trip. A very heavy 35-horsepower motor will propel the machine. This will be the first automobile to make this trip.
