

TRACK TEAM GOES

Multnomah Athletes Are Off For Victoria.

TO COMPETE AT VANCOUVER

Spokane Athletic Club is a formidable rival—Oregon Men Strong in Hurdles, Pole-Vault and Jumps.

Twelve men left for Vancouver, B. C., last night to represent the Multnomah Club in the annual track meet of the Pacific Amateur Athletic Association, July 2. They were Captain Oscar Kerrigan, H. W. Kerrigan, manager; Peterson, Smithson, Williams, Gamble, Jansen, Saunders, Wilcox, Gilbert, Coates and Gates.

Captain Kerrigan came nearly being left behind, but obtained leave last night and went with his team.

The chances are favorable to Multnomah in winning the championship. As in last year, though the Spokane Athletic Club, its chief rival, is better organized this year than last and instead of merely having nearly all the athletes in the State of Washington in it, has the whole state complete and a large slice of Idaho. Multnomah draws on the Valley colleges, contingent to Portland, but that is all. However, Multnomah has a strong team and has more than a fighting chance to win out. All the team needs is five firsts and with its seconds and thirds will sweep the honors once more. The first contest are the hurdles, high and low, the pole vault and the ground weight. To win Smithson or Williams must capture the 100 or 200 dashes or the quarter-mile run. There is a hint that may spoil things. By some mistake, the 220 hurdle, a standard event, was left out of the programme. And it so happens that if Multnomah is sure of one event that is, for Coates holds the Coast record in 1934. But as all the weights, events in which Multnomah is short, are included, it is likely that the event will be allowed in spite of the omission.

The two other competitors for the championship beside Multnomah and Spokane are Vancouver and Victoria, B. C. Neither of these can hope to win out altogether, but can make a big difference in the others' scores. The sprint and the hurdles, the pole vault and the jumps are Multnomah's strong events, and it is unlikely that either of the Canadian teams will spring a dark horse in these. But where they are likely to come out strong is in the weights and the distance runs and that is where they will cut into Spokane. And by doing so they will aid Multnomah directly.

The fight is going to be in the sprints. That man Pearson can go out and run the 100 yards in 19 seconds flat whenever he wishes, and it will need the combined efforts of Smithson and Williams to defeat him. If it is done, it is likely that other calculations do not go wrong. Multnomah will come out victor.

A big aid to the team has come in the 66-pound weight throwing of "Bud" James. He and Mitchell of the N. A. C. are the only men in the world who do this trick with the swing around the head. That way James can throw the weight 23 to 30 feet.

The high jump is going to be doubtful, as Bert Kerrigan's knee is still weak, and he can hope to do only six feet at the best. But if he does that, he is reasonably sure of the event.
