

## HE PICKS PARKER

Dubois Says He Is Only Man Democrats Have.

## TALK OF CLEVELAND IDLE

Idaho Senator Says Bryan Would Thus Gain Control.

## TURNER ARRIVES WITH BOOM

His Friends Are Making a Little Stir—Cannon Says Let Convention Do What It Will, He Has Had Enough of Bolting.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 30.—(Special)—The political cauldron began to simmer today, when several new booms for the Democratic Presidential ticket were set afloat. The boom of ex-Attorney-General Judson Harmon, of Ohio, was formally launched today, when Judge Ditty, of Ohio, opened headquarters at the Jefferson Hotel, and announced that Judge Harmon was a candidate for the Presidential nomination, if it were to go to the Middle West. It is understood that M. E. Ingalls, of Cincinnati, and other prominent Ohio politicians are backing Harmon.

The strongest candidates for the head of the ticket are still Judge Parker, of New York and Congressman William R. Hearst.

Charles E. Russell, one of Hearst's lieutenants, reached this city today and opened headquarters at the Jefferson Hotel.

"The race is between Parker and Hearst. Mr. Hearst is strongly in the fight and he is going to stay in. The un-instructed delegates will settle it. There are many of these and anybody has a chance for the nomination."

Senator Fred Dubois, of Idaho, came in tonight and when asked what he thought of the Presidential outlook said he saw nothing but Parker.

"Who will they nominate after they have beaten Parker?" was asked.

"Would it be Cleveland?" he continued. "Why, there is more than a third of the convention will stay here until the election before allowing the nomination of Cleveland. The attempt to nominate Cleveland will throw the convention into the hands of Bryan. The convention will nominate Parker, because it has no other man to nominate."

Senator Dubois declares that he will get an anti-politician plank in the National platform. That will be his principal work while in St. Louis. He says the Republicans feared they would lose Utah, Idaho and Wyoming if they declared against polygamy, but he says that a strong declaration of that kind in the Democratic platform will carry those states for the Democratic party.

## Turner Arrives With His Boom

Ex-Senator George Turner, of Washington, came to St. Louis today with a small, but earnest Vice-Presidential boom. The States of Idaho and Washington are instructed to vote for Mr. Turner for that position, and the few delegates from that region are making a little stir about a Pacific Coast man for second place pending the time when all interest in the convention will be swallowed up in the talk of the nominee for President and the platform.

Ex-Senator Frank J. Cannon, of Utah, says he will not bolt this convention.

"Eight years ago I bolted the Republican Convention in this very town, and I have grown gray since that time trying to find proper political terminal facilities. Let them put anything they please in the platform and even nominate Grover Cleveland and I'll watch the other fellows walk out if they want to, but none of it for me. I have had all I want."

Best Canadian, who is Senator Teller, of Colorado, and Senator Dubois, of Idaho; ex-Senators Pettigrew, of South Dakota, and Charles A. Towne and Representative John A. Lind, of Minnesota, as delegates to the coming Democratic Convention, all of whom bolted the Republican National Convention held in St. Louis eight years ago.

Senator Jones, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, will arrive in St. Louis tomorrow.

Senator Gorman, of Maryland, and William Jennings Bryan are being spoken of tonight as the two candidates for the chairmanship of the committee on resolutions. The fight for the position promises to be a hot one. Senator Hill, of New York, is also said to have an eye on the position. Senator Gorman, if he is selected, will present a platform drawn on the lines of the platform adopted in the Maryland State Convention. This platform is extremely conservative and promises tariff adjustment wherever the State necessary.

Henry D. Clayton, of Alabama, National committeeman from that state, said tonight that while Alabama delegates were not instructed for Parker, they would undoubtedly be with him. Clayton favors a conservative platform.

## DIRECT VOTE NOT WANTED.

Michigan Republicans Defeat Resolution to So Name Governors.

DETROIT, June 30.—The Republican State Convention today nominated the following ticket:

Governor, Fred M. Warner, of Farmington; Lieutenant-Governor, Alexander Maitland; State Treasurer, Frank P. Glasgow; Secretary of State, George A. Prescott; Auditor-General, Dr. J. B. Bradley; Attorney-General, Charles A. Blair; Superintendent of Public Instruction, P. H. Kelley; member of the State Board of Education, L. L. Wright; Land Commissioner, W. H. Rose.

The platform, which was very short, indorses the platform adopted by the National Convention at Chicago; indorses Roosevelt and Fairbanks, and expresses confidence in a memorable victory for the state ticket and "our fearless leader and typical Republican, Theodore Roosevelt."

The amendment to the resolutions prepared by Congressman William Alden Smith and Senator Simmons, pledging the party to the nomination of Governor by direct vote, was defeated by a vote of 75 to 304.

Congressman Hamilton, in the course of his address, said:

### WAITING FOR DEMOCRATS.

Popular Nominations Will Depend on Action Taken at St. Louis.

DES MOINES, Ia., June 30.—The state Populist convention to select delegates to the National convention at Springfield, Ill., July 4, convened here today. Twenty-one delegates and 21 alternates were named, with instructions to vote for ex-Congressman Waller for Vice-President at the National convention. No state ticket was named. Said Chairman Norman:

"Most of our people are waiting to see what the Democrats are going to do at St. Louis. If Bryan and Hearst are kicked out and the Tammany ring wins out, there will be a large following to come into the Populist party. The action of the Democrats at St. Louis will influence to a considerable extent the action of the National Populist convention at Springfield."

### Populists Might Indorse Hearst.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 30.—J. A. Parker, of Louisville, Ky., chairman of the National Committee of the People's party, arrived here today to see if all arrangements had been completed for the National Convention of the party, which will convene on Monday, July 4. Mr. Parker said he thought if the Democrats nominated Hearst he might be induced by the People's party. He stated that Thomas E. Watson, of Georgia, probably would be the nominee of the People's party for President, and Samuel M. Williams, of Vincennes, Ind., for Vice-President.
