FATHER DOES NOT BELIEVE SON SHOT HIMSELF.

Ernest Vogt, Who Was Afraid to Tell Parents of Mortal Wound, Is Buried.

The funeral of little Ernest Vogt, who died Tuesday afternoon from the effects of a pistol shot wound, were held yesterday afternoon from the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Vogt, in Montavilla. Rev. August Krause, of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, was in charge, and many of the friends of the stricken family were present. As pall-bearers, playmates of the dead boy were selected as follows: John Moore, Clifford Duncan, Paul Friedwald, Erwin Crouch, Otto Miller and Ross Barnes.  
At the close of the services the playmates of the dead boy carried the casket containing his body to the hearse, and the interment took place in Brainerd's cemetery.

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## LANDINGS ARE SECURED.

Work on the inclines on the West

and East Side landings for the Sellwood ferry will be begun in a short time. Edward D. Curtis and J. M. Nickum, members of the Sellwood ferry subcommittee, made a discovery yesterday while overhauling the records at the Courthouse which establishes the fact beyond dispute apparently that the county has a road open from the Whitehouse road down to the Willamette River, at the place the committee has fixed the West Side landing. They found even the petition for the opening of the road, and traced the proceedings down to the conclusion.

Mr. Curtis says that he is entirely satisfied that the county owns the road down to the river all right. The proceedings seemed perfectly regular and beyond all dispute. It will be necessary to go to some expense in excavating under the Southern Pacific track, but the discovery of the county road down to the landing will save between \$1500 and \$2000. On the East Side at the foot of Spokane avenue, there is also clear sailing. U. S. Marquam, who claims an exclusive ferry franchise, says that he will not interfere, but is willing to give a deed to the county. ## TWO STILL IN THE GAME

SALEM AND ALBANY HAVE NOT DISBANDED TEAMS.

Hope to Hold Men Together and Play a Series, With Occasional Matches With Outsiders.

SALEM, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—While the Oregon State Baseball League has not disbanded, it is certain that no more of the series of league games will be played. The Eugene team disbanded yesterday and refused to meet Albany. Tonight the Roseburg team announced its decision not to play this week's series in Salem, and the team left for home.

The Salem and Albany teams declare their readiness to complete the games according to schedule, and talk of trying to enforce the \$200 bonds given by the Eugene and Roseburg teams for performance of their part of the league agreement. What will be done is entirely in doubt.

The directors of the Salem Club held a long meeting tonight and discussed the situation in all its phases. A similar meeting was held at Albany and the managers held conferences over the long-distance telephone. The principal effort will be to hold the Albany and Salem teams together and arrange a series of games between these two, with what games can be picked up occasionally with other teams.

Apparently the teams in the league have not found the games profitable and see nothing encouraging in the future. People are going off on vacations and attendance at the games has been diminishing. Expenses have been heavy, although the league was organized upon a conservative basis as seemed possible.
