BRITISH TAKE THIBETAN FORT

Handful of Soldiers Are Successful Over 7000 Men.

GYANTZE, Thibet, July 6.—The pincarrow fort near here, held by 7000 Tibetans, was captured by a mere handful of British and Indian soldiers today. The excitement of the long day culminated in the scaling of a breach in the walls of the fort by Lieutenant Grant, who was followed by a mixed company of Gurkhas and Fusiliers. They climbed the cleft rock in the face of a fire and a fusillade of stones which were hurled on their heads by the frantic Tibetans. A stone struck Lieutenant Grant, wounding him off his feet, but he recovered himself and was the first over the breach.

The fort is on a rugged rock 300 feet in height. At dusk the battle was over, and though fatal bursts of musket fire still could be heard, the British held the fort, which dominates the town and the monastery beyond.

GERMAN LOAN OF THE DISCOUNT BANK

LONDON, July 6.—The Associated Press learns from a High British source that exchanges of views are taking place between America and Great Britain with respect to Thibet. Being a dependency of China, the fate of Thibet is of considerable importance, especially to America; not that Americans have interests of value in that country, but because of its acquisition by any other power would mean a violation of principles of the integrity of China, which is the keynote of Secretary Hay's Far Eastern policy, to which Great Britain has given adherence. It is understood that the British Government frankly disavowed any ulterior purpose regarding the Thibetan territory, reiterating that it has no intention to permanently occupy Thibet, and that Great Britain's motives are those already proclaimed to the whole world. In view of this declaration, the British Government announced that Brigadier-General MacDonald's expedition is expected to retire as soon as the purposes for which it was organized have been achieved.

AMERICA ASKS HER OBJECT.

Britain Assures Her She Has No Ulterior Motives in Thibet.

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DESCRIPTION OF THE FORTIFICATIONS.

LONDON, July 6.—The Gyantse gong, or fort, is built on a rocky granite sheer 100 feet from the plain. The western face is absolutely impregnable. On the southern side, opposite the British camp, which is some 2400 yards distant, the rock rises somewhat broken. On every level spot stands a ruined building. The road to the top runs zig-zag up to the southern face of the fort. Along the road the Tibetans had erected a series of diagonal walls. Twenty-seven cannon were mounted along this face. On the east and north the rock slopes gradually to a mesa-

WOMAN SENTENCED TO BE HANGED.

PHILADELPHIA, July 6.—Mrs. Catherine Danz, convicted of murder in the first degree for poisoning her husband, William C. Danz, was today sentenced to be hanged. An appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court by Mrs. Danz's counsel.

George Hossey, a negro "voodoo doctor," was recently convicted and sentenced to death in connection with Danz's death. The testimony at the trial of Hossey and Mrs. Danz was to the effect that the woman had procured poison from Hossey which she administered to her husband.

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
