Now, laugh, Seattle. Laugh that fabled, supercilious cackle of the "We-told-you-so's," for didn't Mique Fisher's crew of Bengals take the opening game of the closing season by a 7-to-3 score. Go ahead and laugh, Seattle. It won't hurt you. Neither will it establish proof of your nasty insinuation that Portland would play indifferent ball because they wanted Tacoma to win. Laugh out loud, Seattle, but if you'd been out to the Twenty-fourth-street grounds yesterday afternoon, you'd have seen a corking good game, even if the Dugs did toss off the matinee after they had it in lock.

It took Bobby Keefe and Willie Thomas to win for Tacoma, but if Ike Butler's support had been gill-edge at the critical time the bells would have tolled for the locals. Both Butler and Keefe were a trifle wild in the evening, and both issued a pass to the first man up, and each meant a run. Ike came back to earth before Fisher's star, and he held the Royal Bengals safe until the sixth canto. Here the Tigers showed their claws and pounded four safe swats over the infield roof. McLaughlin slashed out a screamer to right that sent in the two runs which tied the proceedings. Previous to this the Dugs toyed with Keefe's concoctions, shoving one run over in the third and one in the fourth. In the third Keefe, after his own misplay and that of Sheehan's, filled the cushions on the Dugs; should have pounded out a victory right then, but Bobby settled down, and the lone one was the best the Dugs could negotiate. He took sick, and Thomas relieved him in the fifth.

That's all there was to it for the locals. Thomas talked Tiger gibberish, smiled and slid his curves over, and the Dugs were as helpless as a kid at a grown-up picnic. Those Tigers were simply prolonging the agony, and they wanted to repay the fans for sitting out in the land of blench. They saved the best for the last, and in the ninth they clawed, chewed and swallowed the Dugs. Graham, first up, skied to Nadeau. Thomas hit to left, and Wes Willie Campbell fozzled Doyle's shin-socket and not only missed a double play but failed to get Thomas at second. Sheehan's single brought Thomas home. Nadeau singled one at Raynolds that slammed him in the ribs instead of the glove. Doyle rammed over the plate and Sheehan registered on Lynch's long fungo to McCredie. Casey's bling scored Nadeau.

Nadeau and McCredie as a dying gurgle hit safe, but the next three up went out in order. Then Mique Fisher put on his coat and quitted sweating. Jack O'Connell and Jim McDonald did the double-umpire act, and the plan worked admirably.

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BLOCK RACING NEWS

Officers File Many Messages at Brighton Beach.

POOLROOM MEN ARE FRANTIC

Detectives Assert They Wanted to Ascertain if Commercial Business Was Being Sidetracked for Benefit of Sports.

NEW YORK, July 19.—Police Inspector Brooks and 40 detectives went to the Brighton Beach racetrack this afternoon and blocked all racing news sent over the Western Union wires by filing scores of messages after each race. Between 2 o'clock and 4 o'clock the police had filed 400 telegrams, and sent a similar number of telephone messages. The poolroom men were frantic over this action, and what little news they received had to be sent from outside wire sources, and was very late. The service for newspapers was also delayed.

Inspector Brooks declined to explain his action, but some of the detectives were more talkative. They said that complaint had been made that commercial telegrams were being sidetracked by the Western Union in favor of racing messages. No one but the poolrooms had a chance at the racetrack telegraph office, it was said. A test case was being made, explained the detectives, to see how much there was in the complaint.

SEEKS PRICELESS RELIC.

J. P. Morgan Believed to Have Purchased Gope Stolen in 1902.

NEW YORK, July 19.—It is stated in a special dispatch from Rome that the London correspondent of the Herald, that the Pope has commissioned Cardinal Vanutelli, who is about to visit Ireland, to try to obtain from J. Pierpont Morgan the priceless ancient cope which was stolen in 1902 from the cathedral of Assisi.

The cope mysteriously disappeared while repairs were being made to the cathedral and though the government took measures for its recovery, they were unsuccessful. It now transpires that the cope was sold to Mr. Morgan, who has lent it to the South Kensington Museum, where it is at present on view. The cope is a beautifully embroidered piece of work, done in France in the 13th century. It was presented to the Assisi Cathedral by Nicholas IV. The entire ground is of gold thread, on which are worked 15 exquisite panels of religious subjects.

The museum authorities believe that the cope is of English, not of French workmanship.

Heated Spell in Chicago Broken.
