LITTLE GIRL GETS ASHORE

Alton Man Takes Friends of His

ALTON, Ill., Aug. 5.—While bathing in the Mississippi River tonight, Michael Riley, his daughter and six of the latter's friends, were drowned. One child who was in the party was rescued. The dead: MICHAEL RILEY, 32 years old. ELIZABETH RILEY, 11 years old. ALLIE RILEY, 14. LUCY PATTER, 14. LIZZIE PATTER, 14. BESSIE BRUM, 14. MYRIE BRUM, 10. RUTH MARSHALL, 11.

Riley lived near the river in the southern part of the city and was accustomed to bathe on the beach in front of his home after his return from work. Tonight his little daughter begged to go with him, and Riley took her and seven of her friends to the beach with him.

PORT REPLY UNSATISFACTORY
United States Fleet Will Remain in the Mediterranean.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Minister Lehmann has notified the State Department from Constantinople that he has failed to receive the expected satisfactory reply from the Sultan touching the rights of American citizens in Turkey. While the negotiations will continue, it is supposed that the American battleship fleet will be detained at Gibraltar to strengthen the Minister's hands in the conduct of these negotiations.

Cabinet Considers the Question.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Secretary Hay's return to the city from his summer home was signalled by consideration at today's Cabinet meeting of important matters concerning American foreign relations. The Secretary had not completed his vacation, but returned to Washington at this time on account of the developments in this country's relations with Turkey. The whole question was considered by the President and his Cabinet in the light of information received by cable today from Minister Lehmann at Constantinople.

This Government has been pressing the Porte for an answer to our representations as to the rights of Americans to establish schools and other educational institutions in the Turkish Empire and one was promised. Such rights have been accorded other nations, but have been withheld from America. After the meeting Secretary Hay declined to say whether, if any, information had been received. Secretary Morton's replies to similar inquiries indicated the probability of immediate action by his department bearing on the Turkish question.

The situation was regarded as sufficiently grave as to warrant some change in the United States naval vessels in the Mediterranean. While it was not decided to stop the home-coming of the fleet of big battleships due at Gibraltar in a day or two, the determination was reached to hold Admiral Jewell, commanding the European squadron, which was separated from the battleship squadron, and is now at Villafraanca. They will remain in that vicinity until further orders, or at least not to come further westward while the negotiations are pending.

PIGMIES FROM AFRICAN JUNGLE
Eight Little Folks Brought Thousands of Miles to the Fair.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 5.—One of the most remarkable trips in connection with the exhibition of the World's Fair was completed when the Rev. S. P. Verner, the Presbyterian missionary, who brought eight pigmies out of the African jungles, arrived in St. Louis. His party included 20,000 miles, 800 miles of which were traveled on foot through the wilds and deserts of Central Africa. The trip lasted eight months.

Mr. Verner was reported killed several times and contracted a tropical fever, from the effects of which he has been ill in New York for several weeks.

Dr. W. M. McLean, chief of the anthropological department of the World's Fair, who talked with Mr. Verner immediately after his arrival here, declared that the pigmies had been of inestimable value to science.

Fraud in Exposition Tickets.
CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—St. Louis lions have just discovered that conductors on various railroads and certain scoundrels of Chicago and St. Louis have been engaged in a conspiracy to defraud the exposition tickets. It is declared that instead of the tickets being sold at the regular rate, the conductors have been turning them into the company, conductors have been selling them to scoundrels.

In many instances when tickets to St. Louis and return were presented, conductors are said to have taken the whole ticket, giving the passenger a return coupon that already had been used. It is estimated that in this manner Chicago and St. Louis roads have been defrauded out of \$200,000.

LOCKOUT IS CERTAIN.
New York Building Trades Will Accept Employers' Challenge.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The striking building trades unions were said today to be preparing to accept the challenge of the Building Trades Employers' Association, which has ordered a lockout of all the unions which have ordered strike of the subway and elsewhere in the building trades is practically certain. When the ultimatum of the employers was sent out two days ago, the strikers were given until today to return to work. The ultimatum stated that unless the demand was met by the strikers the affected unions "will be out on the street on Monday."

At the Building Trades Employers' Association today it was announced that none of the unions had reported for work, and that consequently the lockout threatened by the employers will become effective.

Unofficial statements were made which show that about 40,000 men associated with the Building Trades Alliance will be affected. Charles L. Edgill, president of the association, said that from the building trades' standpoint it was merely a question of maintaining a mutual agreement made between the association and the labor unions about a year ago. This agreement, which had for its purpose the mutual betterment of conditions, according to Mr. Edgill, has been violated by the men.

Depositors Make a Run on a
Stockyard Bank.

STRIKERS NOT IN THE RUSH

Visit of Deputation From Montana
Stock Association Gives Rise to
Rumors of a Peace
Conference.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—The strike in the packing-houses had a counter attraction today in the excitement attending a run on the Drovers' Trust & Savings Bank, which is in the stockyard. The rush of the depositors to the bank started early today because of an unfounded rumor that one of the packers' representatives had withdrawn his money from the institution, and reports that the bank was used by the packing companies as an adjunct in paying employees who have taken the places of the strikers.

All day long hundreds of depositors stood in line to withdraw their small deposits. When closing time came this afternoon a thousand persons were waiting for the bank to open tomorrow.

The bank determined to meet the emergency, called in extra tellers, and the place was kept open until every depositor who presented his money had been satisfied. The packing windows were closed after 8 o'clock tonight. Nearly two hours before that time the last man in line had been paid his deposit in full.

Thousands Withdraw Deposits.

It is estimated that more than 300 depositors called and withdrew their deposits during the day. When the run was at its height the bank withdrew \$100,000 of its deposit with the Commercial National Bank and the amount from the First National Bank in order to prevent any possibility of the bank being unable to meet its obligations promptly.

"We have plenty of money to meet any kind of run," said Vice-President William A. Tilden tonight after the bank had been closed for the night. "We had more than \$500,000 in our vaults, and besides the \$200,000 taken from down-town banks we received offers of assistance from the First National Bank of Chicago, the National Park Bank of New York and the Standard Trust Bank of New York."

None of these offers will be accepted, as we have on hand all the money we need. Our windows will be kept open until all depositors are satisfied. 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men tempting inducements to break away. Pressure was also being brought upon strikers' wives through direct individual appeal.

To offset this, the leaders figured on the return of President Donnelly to arouse enthusiasm and prepared a monster demonstration for tomorrow with the same end in view. While feeling sure of the men, it was admitted that it is not easy to hold hungry families in line. Efforts were therefore especially directed towards impressing the women with the vastness and solidity of the strike, and with the necessity of remaining firm.

Efforts to bring about a peace conference were today explained as being due to the cattle shippers and to the Union Stockyards & Transit Company—both neutrals who have lost heavily through the strike. At the instance of both neutral Agent Skinner, of the Stockyards Company, visited the strike leaders yesterday. Finding them receptive, he gave a banquet today the subject of an arrangement was met with the packers. Believing, however, that the situation was not without possibilities, he returned to the strike leaders, who were awaiting him at the Transit House.

In the meantime, the strikers had attempted to bring pressure to bear on the packers from the inside. The packers, who had acquired information from which the inference was drawn that the strikers' position was stronger than had been believed. In consequence, when Mr. Skinner returned he found the strikers' leaders unwilling to make any marked concessions.

While Mr. Skinner was conferring with strike leaders, representatives of the packers casually appeared, giving rise to an impression that important negotiations were actually under way. An impression that was not lessened through the fact that confidential men from the packers shadowed every movement of the strike leaders from that moment on. It was declared today, however, that nothing had been developed tending to point toward immediate peace.

Strikebreakers continued to pour into the yards today. The new arrivals included a number of men from the packers. The recruits were frightened into hysterics by a series of terrific explosions, caused by strike sympathizers placing dynamite caps and saltpeter on the tracks. No property damage resulted.

President Donnelly and Secretary Wilson, of the Ice Wagon Drivers' Union, conferred today on the subject of delivering ice to retail dealers who buy from packers whose plants are affected by the strike.

Early today Celestine Chera, aged 22 years, a French Canadian, employed at the Armour plant, was badly beaten by three men at Fifty-fourth and Halsted streets.

CONTRACTING FOREIGN LABOR

In view of the fact that President Nicholson, of District No. 1, in a public statement, proposed that Judge Gray be asked to settle the question, it is likely that the whole matter eventually will be submitted to Judge Gray.

Swarming into Devil's Lake.
DEVIL'S LAKE, N. D., Aug. 5.—John McKinney, chief registration officer, and a large force of clerks, who will have charge of the reservation registration, have arrived from the Rosebud Reservation. Tomorrow all notaries public will be called together by McKinney and pledged to charge no more than 25 cents each for making out registration papers, then blanks will be given out, and the rush will be on, although registration will not start until Monday. Hundreds of persons are arriving on every train from the East and West.

Crowded Trains to Devil's Lake.
ST. PAUL, Aug. 5.—Crowded trains marked the first days of low rates to Grand Forks, N. D., and the Fort Totten reservation, and several hundred men who have not utilized their homestead rights left during the forenoon for North Dakota to try for some of the rich land the Government is offering. It is estimated that fully 15,000 of those who were unsuccessful applicants for Rosebud lands will try for the new reserve farms.
