

CAUSE OF PLOTS

Fairbanks Shows Effect Democratic Power.

CHANGE WITH M'KINLEY

Country Began to Prosper When He Carried Out Pledges.

CREDIT DUE TO PROTECTION

Roosevelt Has Followed in Footsteps of His Predecessor, and by Any Test His Administration Is Eminently Satisfactory.

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, Vt., Aug. 29.—Senator Charles W. Fairbanks, of Indiana, delivered his first formal speech of the campaign here this afternoon. Large numbers of people from all parts of Windsor County and from Western New Hampshire were present. The demonstration was arranged particularly as a welcome from the people of Windsor County to the Indiana Senator, whose father was born within its limits. Senator Fairbanks' address was in part as follows:

The four years succeeding General Harrison's defeat will not be soon forgotten. They stand in sharp contrast with the years of Republican administration, both before and after. They were four years of arrested development, of panic and distress without a parallel in American history. Field, factory and mine suffered alike. Armies of unemployed thronged the country, hopelessly seeking for an opportunity to work, regardless alike of either the number of hours or the rate of wages. To many from foreign shores who have since then sought our hospitality, and to many of the young men of our country, who for the first time will exercise the highest privilege of an American freeman this may seem an overdrawn picture. There are many of our countrymen who will confirm it with testimony gathered in their own hard experience.

In 1895 the American people resolved to return to the Democratic administration and to Republican policies. We came into power pledged to overthrow the Democratic tariff law and to enact in lieu of it a genuine protective measure. In due time we put upon the statute books the Dingley law. Prosperity returned and spread her blessings among all sections and all peoples within the ample limits of the republic.

Three years ago our great and beloved leader in the contests of 1896 and 1900 fell at his post of duty. His successor has since then administered our National affairs with conspicuous ability. He has been an earnest student of the country's needs. He has been conscientious and untiring in the discharge of his great responsibilities. He has been inspired by but one purpose, and that has been to do well the work committed to his hands.

Judged by any test we may apply, the administration of President Roosevelt has been eminently satisfactory. The last three years have been years of exceptional prosperity. Prosperity has not been confined to limited areas, but has extended throughout the country.

"As in 1892 the Democratic party now denounces 'protection as a robbery of the many to enhance the few,' and pledges itself to overthrow the Dingley law, through a revision and reduction of the tariff. What will be the result of such a policy? We will find a most conclusive answer in the four years of the last Democratic administration. Let the American people take the Democratic platform and the record of the last administration in one hand, and the Republican platform and the record of the Republican administration during the last three years in the other, and pronounce their potential judgment."

Senator Fairbanks expects to return to New England after his speech at Kansas City, September 6. He also will deliver an address at the annual dinner of the Home Market Club in Boston.

Will Arrive in Chicago Today.
CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—Senator Fairbanks will arrive in Chicago tomorrow evening from New England and will leave here at 11:30 o'clock the same night for Marion, Kan., where he will open the Kansas campaign with a speech Thursday afternoon.

HAND ON THE HELM.

Turner Makes the Democratic Chairman a Figurehead.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 28.—(Special).—George Turner, Democratic nominee for Governor, has surrounded the state committee, which he had no voice in choosing, with friends, and will be able not only to dictate on all questions of politics, but to know that his wishes will be carried out no matter where he may be.

Floyd L. Daggett, Turner's personal representative in the state committee, will be vice-chairman, and Henry Drum, whom Turner preferred above all others for Lieutenant-Governor, will be chairman of the advisory committee. These two men will be at the Democratic state headquarters and their recommendations to the de facto chairman, J. W. Goodwin, will have all the prestige of the Turner approval.

Turner came to Seattle two days ago on a visit that combined business, politics and pleasure. His business was connected principally with the Alaska Central Railroad, of which he is a director. His politics had to do with the completion of the organization of the Democratic State Committee. His pleasure was in buying, if the location pleases him, a summer home somewhere on the Sound. He is to inspect a place near Tacoma.

The present Democratic committee, it is understood, was selected in April. The county committees were chosen by their respective county committees under a policy inaugurated by Charles G. Turner, who acted during one campaign as state chairman. The selection in April was designed to give the Bourbons an early organization in the state, and it accomplished this purpose. A chairman was chosen in May, when Turner was a candidate for Vice-President.

The Line of Action.

It was realized at that time that Turner would not be nominated for Vice-President; that the Republican State Convention would turn down McBride, and that Turner would be named by the Democrats for Governor and be in line for a Senatorship if one was loose. But the state committee organized with Turner insisting he would not accept the Governor's nomination and upon independent lines.

J. W. Goodwin, of King, who was elected chairman, was friendly to Turner, though he lacked in state experience. At

that, Goodwin had a varied career in King County politics and is not a bad man to pick up to head the state committee. He is probably as good a man as could have been chosen at the time. But the fact looks out that he was not a Turner selection in the sense that he was chosen to manage a Turner campaign.

There is no question in the minds of the men who are having voice in the position, but that he would have preferred the nomination of Henry Drum for Lieutenant-Governor above that of any other man. But Drum was not named.

Friends Put in Good Places.

All this is introductory to the story of yesterday's conference. Turner came here to talk state politics with the chairman of the state committee, whom he did not choose. He discussed all phases of the campaign and particularly the choosing of an advisory board to direct the chairman's action. He had his close friend, Daggett, made vice-chairman of the state committee and given control over the assignment of speakers; then he had his friend Henry Drum, whom he esteemed close enough to himself to be named for Lieutenant-Governor, chosen to head the advisory board.

Under the plan of campaign that Turner outlined, Daggett will come from Spokane to take charge of the speakers' bureau. He will have entire charge of the pyrotechnic features of the fight, assigning speakers where and when he wills. Henry Drum will have a desk at state headquarters to advise the chairman of what he believes should be done for the success of the Democracy.

Naturally with Daggett and Drum in committee headquarters, Turner will be left for State Chairman Goodwin to do, in an emergency, but accept their advice, otherwise the Turner dictum, and that is what is expected.

Keeps Plums to Himself.

There was a story printed in a Puget Sound paper a short time ago to the effect that Turner would give out an interview within a short time declaring that under no circumstances would he be a candidate for United States Senator. According to this story, the proposed interview was to be given for the purpose of strengthening the legislative fight and Turner's own canvass for Governor.

There will be no such interview. Turner is not going to make any announcement of his future plans. From the standpoint of practical politics he does not believe it necessary. From the more important standpoint of ambition he believes it dangerous.

There is a general feeling throughout the state that Turner is eager to carry the Legislature; that he cares nothing for the gubernatorial berth, but is making a fight in the hope that he can be returned to the United States Senate. Turner would be put in the position of denying that he would accept an election to the Senate if he denied the story and this he will never do. He said as much while he was here.

Shut Out of a Seattle Banquet.
All the mix-up that has occurred over the failure of Secretary Shaw to reach Seattle in time for a banquet with the Young Men's Republican Club Saturday night could have been avoided, but it was unexpected, and no one took precautions. The original programme for this state banquet was arranged two days before his departure for Spokane and Seattle dates.

Senator Ankeny wanted him to visit Walla Walla, and Senator Foster wanted the Spokane. The Young Men's Republican Club arranged privately for a Walla Walla meeting and the latter for an address on Sunday before the Y. M. C. A. As a result the Seattle banquet was abandoned Saturday night and an elaborate entertainment Sunday had to be abandoned.

Mayor Whips Council Into Line.

Mayor Ballinger has all but won a complete victory over the members of the City Council. His political ambitions suggested a Councilmanic election. He refused to accept the possibility of suing for terms that was intended to entrap him, and has broken the backbone of the opposition.

Democrats in a Dilemma.

The Democratic State Committee has been asked to allow George Turner and Stephen Judson to deliver speeches before the Yakima County Convention next Saturday. To do so would be to open the door to the Democratic party, something that had been reserved for Spokane.

To turn down Yakima is impossible, and the State Committee is put to the necessity of finding a satisfactory method of satisfying the county without allowing Turner, at least, to speak there. An answer must be given Monday.

The Republican State Committee is planning to begin an energetic and aggressive campaign next month. State Chairman E. B. Palmer has been in Alaska, called to that district on mining business, but he will return this week and immediately begin the work of shaping up the Fall fight.

The itinerary of speakers and the programme for opening meetings has not been completed, but the actual speaking campaign will begin about the middle of the month. Organization work has been under way for several weeks, and the Republican fight is in good condition. The aggressive effort that follows will be pushed steadily.

Prominent Hawaiian Newspaperman.

HONOLULU, Aug. 29, via San Francisco, Aug. 28.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—N. M. Whitney, founder of the Pacific Commercial Advertiser, is dead in Honolulu from heart disease, aged 80 years. He came to Hawaii in 1859 and in 1862 he started the Advertiser. He was its editor for over 20 years and was editor of the Planter's Monthly up to a year ago. He was also the editor of Kuokoa, a native newspaper, having wide circulation. In 1880 he became the head of island Postoffice affairs, establishing the present system.

Now One of the Richest Women in World.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28.—The wife of W. W. Wright, head of the firm of Powers & Weightman, manufacturing chemists, who died a few days ago at the age of 31 years, was probated today, his entire estate, valued at more than \$6,000,000, being left to his daughter, Mrs. Anna M. Walker, widow of the late Congressman J. C. Walker, who is the only surviving child, becomes sole proprietor of the extensive chemical works, which makes her one of the richest women of the world.

Fate of Assassin Not Yet Fixed.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 28.—The statement in these dispatches last week that Sassony, the assassin of Minister of the Interior von Plehve, had been sentenced to death, proves to be incorrect. The question as to whether the assassin will be tried by court-martial or by a civil court, has not yet been decided. It is expected that the Emperor will appoint a new Minister of the Interior as soon as he returns from the Don.

Man Shot by Officer Dies.

SILVER CITY, N. M., Aug. 28.—City Marshal William Kilburn, who was shot by Howard Chisworth while trying to disarm him last night, died from his wounds today. Chisworth killed Constable Rodriguez and wounded two others before he was stopped by a lawless shot from a shotgun in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Collier. The trouble was the result of a cowboy fight.
