PREACHER TO LEAD CORPS

Rev. Franklin Baker, of Eureka, Writes That Cadet Corps of Congregational Church Will Make Trip Next Year.

In order to see the Lewis and Clark Ex-position 100 boys and young men are going to walk a distance of several hundred miles from Eureka, the metropolis of Humboldt County, California. The cacet corps of the First Congregational Church is the organization that will make the long march. The expedi-tion will be headed by Rev. Franklin Baker, paster of the church. The corps pects to start on the long journey late in the Spring, after the close of the school year. It is estimated by Mr. Baker that a month's time will be required to com-plete the journey, the route of which will lead through much mountainous country in Del Norte County, California, and Jo-sephine, Douglas and other counties of

In his communication to the Exposition management Mr. Raker says the idea is meeting with the enthusiastic support of both cadets and their relatives, and that he already has the assurance of an at-tendance of 75 young men and boys rang-

ing in age from 12 to 18 years,

IN MEMORIAM.

The passing from this brief carthly existence to the eternal spirit life of such a man as Otto Martin Rosendale at the early age of 4, causes us to pause and marvel at the inscrutable ways of Providence. He had served in the German and French armies and was prominent as a mining engineer, having been frequently summoned as an expert by the United States Government officials. He was a master of the German, French, Spanish and English languagee, and his papers and addresses commanded attention wherever presented. His death came suddenly at Kalama, Wash, Wednesdaynight, August 24, from suffocation, caused by fire in his bedroom, supposed to have started by a match he dropped on the floor, which set the room on fire after he had gone to sleep. He leaves a sorely afflicted widow and one little daughter to mourn his death.

Otto Martin Rosendale was born at Coethen. Dukedom of Anhalt, Germany, July 7, 1860, and received his primary education in the military school at Lichtenfelde, Germany; passed examination and entered the polytechnicum at Carisruhe, Baden, and left this institution to enter the German army; served in the Engineers at Straasburg, Alace-Lorraine and attained the rank of First Lieutenant After an honorable discharge from the French serve in the rank of First Lieutenant and saw active service in Tonquin, having charge of engineering and heliographic work during the campaign of 181-4. After an honorable discharge from the French service he conducted exploration work for an English company in Japan, and in 1855 came to the United States, where he had charge of mines he Nevada, Aritafagasta (Chile), Kansas, British Columbia, Coocur d'Alenes, Utah, and then came to Portland, where he penned an office as consulting engineer and metallurigist. He had the finest laboratory in Portland.

The funeral took place Friday afternoon from his late residence and at the Portland Crematorium, and was conducted by Rabbi Levine and Willamette Lodge, A. F. & A. M., the solemn and beautiful ritual of the order being emphasi
