The record read, "on motion of Mr. Wittenberg" the plant was ordered installed "for the use of the football team." 'How is that?" inquired Mr. Witten-

erg. "I did not make such a motion intention was that the plant should be for the use of all the pupils, and I would like to have the record so state."
