**TO EXTEND BELMONT STREET**—W. G. Howell, of the Mount Tabor Improvement Association, is circulating a petition to the County Court for the opening and extension of Belmont street from Sunny-side to the end of the electric car track. Part of the extension is already open and the center is occupied by the street railway. In places it is but 15 feet wide and in others 40 feet. A uniform width is wanted. Some of the property owners have already given strips of their land, but others hesitate. If this movement succeeds, Belmont street will be opened to the Willamette River over Mount Tabor, about half way between Hawthorne avenue and the Base Line road. There are some jogs on the way, but these will not interfere with the project.

**WOOD WAGON RUNS AWAY**—While driving down the Base Line road from West avenue, Henry Johnson, a wood hauler, lost control of his team Thursday evening with the result that the heavy wagon rolled to the bottom of the hill at a high rate of speed.
